City of Glendale Seeking Public Feedback on Upcoming Comprehensive Plan, 'Blueprint Glendale'

The City of Glendale is launching an effort to create and adopt its first Comprehensive Plan, called "Blueprint Glendale," with a public workshop later this month.

The workshop will take place Tuesday, June 25, 6-8 p.m. in the auditorium at Glendale City Hall, located at 424 N. Sappington Road. The theme for Blueprint Glendale is "Embracing Today, Planning the Future." At the workshop, residents will be able to share what they value about the present of Glendale and their hopes for the future.

The project is led by H3 Studio, a professional planning services team contracted by the city, which will also develop recommendations for revisions to the city's zoning code. City Administrator Frank Johnson said Blueprint Glendale will serve as a policy guide for city staff and elected officials on long-term decisions about developr

policy guide for city staff and elected officials on long-term decisions about development, services, infrastructure and other high-priority issues facing the municipality.

The workshop will begin with a presentation from H3 Studio on a draft version of the community's vision, goals and objectives, which were developed in collaboration with a steering committee composed of residents, business owners and city officials. This will be followed by small group discussions where attendees can share thoughts and written feedback.

There will be additional opportunities for the public to weigh in as the Blueprint Glendale is developed and refined over the coming months, according to Johnson. Brentwood High School Celebrates the Class of 2024



The 96th graduating class of Brentwood High School has distinguished itself with exceptional achievements, earning over \$1.6 million in scholarships and securing postsecondary college and career opportunities. Principal Dr. Edward Johnson highlighted these accomplishments during the school's commencement ceremony on Saturday, May 18 in the BHS Auditorium.

Of the 49 graduates in the Class of 2024, 38 will pursue higher education at two- or four-year colleges. Students submitted 216 applications to 104 institutions nationwide, selecting 22 different schools to continue their academic careers, including Florida State University, Missouri University of Science and Technology, and Washington University in St. Louis. Additionally, two graduates have qualified for postsecondary support through Missouri Vocational Rehabilitation, which offers employment and training services for students receiving special education services.

Dr. Johnson inspired the graduates to chase their dreams with confidence, resilience and adaptability, embracing uncertainty as a catalyst for growth and innovation. He also praised their collective spirit, leadership and diverse talents.

"The Class of 2024 has left an indelible mark on the record books of Brentwood High School history," said Dr. Johnson. "You're writing 700-page novels, fixing up and selling cars, earning black belts in Taekwondo, obtaining your real estate license, singing in choirs, playing in bands, publishing and illustrating your own book of poems, serving as camp counselors, running your own businesses and engaging in many other unique and impressive endeavors."

Senior class reflection speaker Amelia Favazza recounted her journey through the Brentwood School District, from carefree preschool days to the pressures of middle school, eventually finding a balanced approach in high school. Embracing a more relaxed mindset allowed her to prioritize meaningful relationships, passions and the present moment over academic validation. Favazza encouraged her classmates to adopt this perspective as they face future challenges, reminding them that "it is just never that serious."

District Selects Next McGrath Elementary School Principal



The Brentwood School District Board of Education voted on May 7 to hire Dr. Kelsey Grammer as the next principal of McGrath Elementary School, effective July 1, 2024. Dr. Grammer currently serves as the district's English language arts curriculum coordinator and is a former fifth grade teacher at McGrath. "Dr. Grammer is an experienced

educational leader with extensive expertise in teaching and learning, intervention, research, data analysis and professional development," said Dr. Amy Zielinski, incoming superintendent of schools. "More importantly, she values the social-emotional well-being of the students, staff and families she serves, and she is committed to building trust, support and a sense of belonging for all members of the McGrath community."

Dr. Grammer brings 14 years of experience to her new leadership role, including seven years working alongside students, staff and families in Brentwood. As a McGrath classroom teacher, she served on the District Professional Development Committee and led schoolwide professional development workshops for English language arts and math.

In her current role, Dr. Grammer works with school and district leaders to coordinate consistent English language arts instructional practices. She helped develop a districtwide framework for educators to share ideas, enhance their teaching practices and create learning environments where all students can reach their full potential. These professional learning communities focus on data analysis, setting team goals and differentiating instruction to support learning, growth and achievement for all students.

Dr. Grammer is a member of the district's Multi-Tiered System of Support leadership team, which empowers teachers and specialists to develop intervention strategies based on individual student needs. She also leads professional development opportunities related to personalized learning and tiered intervention, ensuring continuous growth and improvement for Brentwood educators.

"The students, staff and families of McGrath Elementary School have always held a very special place in my heart," said Dr. Grammer. "Together, we can ensure McGrath is a joyful place where all members of our school community feel a sense of belonging rooted in trust."

Dr. Grammer earned her doctorate in educational leadership from Saint Louis University. She also holds a bachelor's degree in elementary education and a master's degree in learning, teaching and curriculum from the University of Missouri-Columbia, as well as a specialist in educational leadership from SLU.

White will attend the University of Iowa in the fall and plans to study elementary and early childhood education. Woodman will attend the University of Central Missouri and is considering studying education or history.

Farewell Open House Rekindles McGrath Memories



More than 100 members of the Brentwood community came together to bid farewell to the original McGrath Elementary School during a special open house on Wednesday, May 15. With the demolition of the school scheduled to begin this summer, this event provided attendees with an opportunity to take one last trip down memory lane, exploring the halls and reconnecting with old friends from their time at McGrath.

"It was great to see so many members of our community step back in time and relive memories from their elementary school years," said Andy Hartnett, director of facilities. "The original McGrath played a significant role in the lives of so many in our community, and the new McGrath will continue to serve our students, families and community for generations to come." The new McGrath and Brentwood Early Childhood Center opened its doors last fall. It was made possible by Prop E, a \$29 million bond issue approved by the Brentwood community in June 2020 to enhance safety, accessibility and student learning at the district's two elementary schools and early childhood center. Mark Twain Elementary School is currently undergoing extensive renovations, including a complete transformation of the existing structures and a new two-story addition. These renovations are scheduled for completion this summer. The final phase of Prop E involves demolishing the original McGrath building and undertaking sitework to improve outdoor learning, play and parking on the McGrath-BECC campus. A permanent playground specifically designed for preschool students will be located in front of the BECC main entrance. During the demolition and sitework, a temporary preschool playscape will be set up in the grass courtyard near the McGrath main entrance.

Senior speakers Cora Urhahn and Haven White also offered words of inspiration, reflecting on their high school experiences beginning during a global pandemic.

"Remember where you've been and what you've been through, because those experiences will help guide you as we each part ways and begin a new chapter," said Urhahn.

"We have spent four years preparing, testing, writing, doing everything we need to do to get to this point," added White. "The doors of opportunity will be wide open, and I hope you take every chance that comes your way."

The Class of 2024 earned 81 scholarships, including 18 A+ Program candidates and eight Missouri Bright Flight recipients. Six students received National Career Readiness Certificates, five completed career and technical education programs and earned industry certifications, five were awarded the Missouri Seal of Biliteracy and one committed to play sports in college.

This year's graduating class also included 22 National Honor Society members, five German Honor Society members, five Spanish Honor Society members, four French Honor Society members and one Honor Thespian.



Brentwood High School senior Haven White has achieved a remarkable milestone by self-publishing a book of poetry. "How to Feel Better" is a heartfelt collection that blends fiction and nonfiction to document the emotional journey of a teenage girl navigating the complexities of growing up in a rapidly changing world.

"I had Haven in my fall semester of Creative Writing and was blown away by her talent," said Julie Cohen, BHS English language arts teacher. "She is a tremendous poet with a keen eye for detail and imagery." Surrounding the permanent preschool playground will be a hard-surface play area, a learning garden and a pavilion for use by both preschool and elementary school students. The west side of the campus will feature two grass playfields and 31 additional parking spaces for visitors and staff. All of the new

CORPSE FLOWER SET TO BLOOM AT THE MISSOURI BOTANICAL GARDEN



A rare Amorphophallus titanum plant is expected to bloom soon at the Missouri Botanical Garden.

Commonly known as a titan arum, or "corpse flower," it is a large, fast-growing plant in the Aroid family. The plant, native

to Sumatra, Indonesia, is known for the intense, foul odor emitted from a tall spike of small flowers, often lasting just 24 hours. The smell and plant coloration mimic rotting flesh to attract pollinators such as flies.

Although an increasing number of titan arums exist in cultivation, the plant is listed as Endangered in the wild by the International Union for the Conservation of Nature (IUCN) Red List of Species.The Garden grows these plants as part of its commitment to plant conservation. A titan arum can take five to ten years to grow from seed until it is ready for its first bloom. Since 2012, the Garden has hosted at least 14 Amorphophallus titanum blooms.

This plant, Millie, is blooming for the first time at the Garden! A gift from Greater Des Moines Botanical Garden, Millie is a sibling to "Horace," a corpse flower that recently bloomed at Como Park Zoo & Conservatory.

Garden Horticulturist Emily Colletti has curated the Garden's aroid collection, which includes the corpse flowers, for 22 years and been present for each of the Garden's corpse flower blooms. Even after 14 blooms, each one still feels special, she said.

"Each corpse flower is like one of my plant children. Each bloom is unique but the same in comparison," Colletti said. "I cannot wait to see what Millie has to teach me about this wonderous giant of the plant kingdom."

Millie is currently located in the Linnean House at the Garden. Viewing is included with Missouri Botanical Garden admission of \$16 for adults and free for children ages 12 and under. St. Louis City and County residents enjoy discounted admission of \$6 and free admission on most Wednesday and Saturday mornings until noon. Missouri Botanical Garden members are free.

Colletti estimates Millie will bloom between June 9 and 12. The corpse flower usually opens quickly and in the late afternoon with the peak bloom usually occurring after dark. The Garden plans to open late on the evening of the bloom. The Garden will update its social media pages with more details about when the corpse flower is set to bloom.

Circus Harmony was founded in 2001 with the mission to help children defy gravity, soar with confidence, and leap over social barriers, all at the same time! Notice is hereby given that the Board of Aldermen of the City of Brentwood at Brentwood City Hall, 2348 S. Brentwood Blvd., Brentwood, MO 63144-2097 will hold a Public Hearing on Monday, July 15, 2024 at 6:00 P.M. on:

Text Amendments to Division 2 Home Occupations of Article V Supplemental Regulations of the City's Zoning Ordinance to Comply with Recent State Legislation that does not allow the City to enumerate permissible or prohibited home businesses, or require a business license. Instead, the City can enact only certain regulations to ensure that the business does not adversely impact the residential neighborhood. Staff has drafted the regulations, within the confines of the City's limited authority, to address maximum occupancy of structures, parking, traffic, exterior conditions and other effects from home-based businesses. These amendments will ensure that the City's regulations of home occupations are consistent with this recent state law.

This meeting is open to the public. As provided in the Zoning Regulations of Brentwood Missouri, the above items will be discussed and considered by the Planning and Zoning Commission for recommendation to the Board of Aldermen and all persons interested in said matter will have an opportunity to be heard. Brentwood Public Library Awarded Grant From The Missouri Humanities Council

The Missouri Humanities Council (MHC) has awarded a grant of \$652.00 to the Brentwood Public Library in support of the project "Summer Reading Club: Adventure Begins at Your Library". CITY ADMINISTRATOR REPORT

A. Climate Pollution Reduction Grant

The Parks and Recreation Director shared that last year the East-West Gateway Council announced they were developing a St. Louis climate action plan funded by the Climate Pollution Reduction Grant. They were putting together a regional submission for the grant, and funding it - so Sustainability Commission "shot for the moon" by including solar panels on top of the Community Center, EV Trash truck, EV street sweeper, and police vehicles, and charging stations for these vehicles.

Now MoDNR is taking over the grant and would be willing to support all of our requests, however, they now are only partially funding this, and want us to take advantage of any tax credits available especially for the solar array which is a 30% credit equaling \$160,000. They want us to take advantage of public charging stations (they pay 90% for public and only 60% for private).

They have asked for a quick turn-around and we would need to submit it by the deadline tomorrow, so grant can be completed and submitted by April 1st.

We anticipate we will receive the ITC solar credit, and if we do the public charging stations, then our obligation for these two projects would be about \$199,000 as the city commitment. We would pay for this with FEMA money (when approved).

The cost for the solar array was determined by a quote from Exceptional Energy. We hope to get another. The tax credit is basically a reimbursement of cost. It was noted that the return on the investment is about 10 years for the solar array.

Discussion took place noting several thoughts: There are many big projects on the city platter; we don't want to leave significant money for these items on the table: this may not be the most urgent priority for our funds; sustainable incentives will most likely be available in the future; solar array has been a priority for many years; there is confidence in the FEMA funding but they are just not quick; there is concern for the tax credit funding and uncertainty with the budget; we can follow the letter of commitment (its non-binding) Motion was made by Alderwoman Tice and seconded by Alderwoman Sims to enter into the submission of a grant for the solar array for the community center and for public charging stations to the MODNR Climate Pollution Reduction Grant. Discussion: Alderman Gould asked if the public charging stations would be installed at the Recreation center - and the Director responded maybe a few, but they would be other places, like City Hall, etc. He noted the new Brentwood park is limited on space. Alderman Gould expressed concern for the speed of decision and commitment with so many unknowns. Alderman Plufka agreed with concerns expressed by others.

Ingredients

3 pounds fresh strawberries, hulled and sliced

1/4 cup white sugar

- 1 quart heavy cream
- 1 (6 ounce) container lemon yogurt
- 1 (3.3 ounce) package instant white chocolate pudding mix
- 2 tablespoons coconut-flavored rum, or to taste, divided (Optional)
- 2 (16 ounce) prepared pound cakes, cubed
- 2 pints fresh blueberries, or as needed

Directions

• Sprinkle strawberries with sugar in a bowl; stir to distribute sugar, and set aside.

• Chill a large metal mixing bowl and beaters from an electric mixer.

• Pour cream into the chilled mixing bowl, and add lemon yogurt, pudding mix, and about 1 tablespoon of coconut rum; beat until fluffy with an electric mixer set on medium speed.

• Spread a layer of pound cake cubes into the bottom of a glass 10x15-inch baking dish, and sprinkle cubes with remaining tablespoon coconut rum. Cover pound cake with a layer of strawberries; sprinkle blueberries over strawberries. Spread a thick layer of whipped cream over the berries.

• Repeat the layers several times, ending with a layer of strawberries sprinkled with blueberries and reserving about 1 cup of whipped cream; top the trifle with dollops of whipped cream to serve. Refrigerate leftovers.

After finally arriving at its new home, this family owned business, began their renovation of this piece of American dining history.

The Comet Diner now features a chrome and pastels interior complete with a great old time rock and roll sound track. There is also an ice cream shop in the back that is the source of all the malts, shakes and sundaes that are a feature of the diner. You can even get a chocolate milk for your inner child, or your young ones. You will also find some humorous signs on the way to the restrooms.

The Comet Diner is well known for its great service and friendly staff and our server, Carlos, was a perfect example. He is the owner's son and gave us a bit of the Diner's history as well as great service.





igan is famous for its Zender's fried chicken dinners, the Bavarian Inn's German cuisine, the Fudge Factory and the Cheese Haus, but you definitely have to include the Comet











Sue had a chicken bacon ranch wrap with sweet potato fries. It was perfection. Our guest ordered the crispy chicken hoagie. It was a toasted hoagie bun with seasoned crispy chicken bites, lettuce, onions, sliced tomatoes, pickles, cheese and mayo. It was delicious and more than enough to take home for another meal.

I ordered one of my favorite sandwiches, a patty melt. It was a burger with grilled onions and Swiss cheese on grilled rye bread. I asked to switch French fries for home made onion rings, and that was no problem. This was a perfect American diner lunch! Frankemuth, Mich-

PICTORIAL ST. LOUIS: The Great Metropolis of the Mississippi Valley A Topographical Survey, Drawn From Perspective 1875.

Illustrations by Camille N. Dry and designed & edited by Rich. J. Compton.

Over 220 pages of illustrations and descriptions of life in St. Louis in the late 1800's. The preliminary drawings for this work were made early in the spring of 1874. After a careful consideration of the subject, it was determined to locate the point of view so that the city would be seen from the southeast, believing that to be the most advantageous in all respects. Accordingly, the point of site was established on the Illinois side of the river, looking to the northwest, and at sufficient altitude to overlook the roofs of ordinary houses into the streets.

A careful perspective, which required a surface of three hundred square feet, was then erected from a correct survey of the city, extending northward from Arsenal Island to the Water Works, a distance of about ten miles, on the river front; and from the Insane Asylum on the southwest to the Cemeteries on the northwest.

Every foot of the vast territory within these limits has been carefully examined and topographically drawn in perspective, by Mr. C. N. Dry and his assistants, and the faithfulness and accuracy with which this work has been done an examination of the pages will attest. Absolute truth and accuracy in the representation of the territory has been the standard and in no cases have additions or alterations been made unless the same were actually in course of construction. In a few cases, important public and private edifices that are not yet finished are shown completed, and as they will appear when done.

All the buildings within the limits of the survey in July, 1875, are shown; and a very large number of those executed or commenced since that date have been also introduced, the pages having been constantly corrected up to the last possible moment before publication.

Cyber Security: Protecting Yourself from Phishing Attacks

You work hard for your money, and you know it makes sense to protect it and save it. One of the best ways you can do this is by staying on top of the biggest scamming trends, like phishing.

Phishing is the most common type of fraud, and it relies on human error to be successful. By masquerading as a trustworthy source or sharing a sense of urgency to take action, scammers trick people into handing over sensitive information such as login credentials or account information. These types of attacks can show up as emails, text messages, fake websites, or social media posts.

Ultimately, common sense is your best defense here. Consider these red flags as you assess unsolicited messages you may receive:

1. Does the message rush or pressure you into taking an immediate action?

2. Does the message sound too good to be true?

3. Are they requesting a payment using non-standard methods such as Bitcoin, gift cards or Western Union transfers?

4. Are they asking for the multi-factor authentication code that was sent to your phone or generated by your banking app?

5. Are they asking to verify your personal information, card numbers or login credentials?

Should you receive anything above, DO NOT respond or attempt to contact the sender; just delete it. If the message appears to be from your financial institution, call them directly to verify.

REMINDER: West Community Credit Union will NEVER contact you by a call, text or email asking you for any personal or account information.

If you have given out your personal information on an unsolicited phone call or text message, please contact your financial institution immediately with the contact information located on their website and report it to the ftc.gov/complaint. The information you give can help in the fight against scammers.

Seven Traffic Fatalities, No Boating Fatalities, & No Drownings Over Memorial Day Weekend

Seven people died in traffic crashes over the 2024 Memorial Day weekend counting period of 6 p.m., Friday, May 24, through 11:59 p.m., Monday, May 27, 2024.

Missouri State Highway Patrol troopers investigated the following over the 2024 Memorial Day holiday weekend:



(Note: During the 2023 counting period, the Patrol investigated 287 traffic crashes, which included 117 injuries and 12 of the 13 fatalities. Also, over the 2023 Memorial Day holiday: Marine operations troopers investigated 10 boating crashes, which included no fatalities and two injuries. Troopers made 137 driving while intoxicated arrests and eight boating while intoxicated arrests. No one drowned over the 2023 Memorial Day holiday. Statewide over the 2023 Memorial Day holiday weekend, 13 people died and 403 were injured in 990 traffic crashes. During the 2023 Memorial Day weekend, there were 10 boating crashes which included no fatalities and two injuries. No one drowned over last year's Memorial Day weekend.)

Troopers investigated all seven of the traffic crash fatalities. Three fatalities occurred in the Troop C, Weldon Spring, MO, area. One fatality occurred in each of the following areas: Troop A, Lee's Summit, MO, Troop B, Macon, MO, Troop E, Poplar Bluff, MO, and Troop I, Rolla, MO, areas.

One person died within the counting period on Friday, May 24, 2024. Rosa L. Rodriguez, 55, of Amarillo, Texas, died when the driver of another vehicle lost control of his

vehicle, left the roadway, struck the concrete median barrier, returned to the roadway, crossed the lane, and struck Rodriguez's commercial vehicle. Both vehicles left the roadway and struck the concrete wall causing Rodriguez's vehicle to jackknife. Both vehicles then continued down the wall until it became a guardrail. Rodriguez's vehicle continued down the guardrail and overturned, while the other vehicle maintained contact with the cargo body of Rodriguez's vehicle until they came to rest. Rodriguez's vehicle then caught fire. The crash occurred in St. Louis County on Interstate 270 westbound, west of New Florissant Road. Rodriguez was not wearing a seat belt and was ejected from the vehicle. EMS personnel pronounced Rodriguez deceased at the scene. A passenger in Rodriguez's vehicle was not wearing a seat belt and sustained serious injuries. The driver of the vehicle that struck Rodriguez's vehicle was not wearing a seat belt and sustained serious injuries.

There were no fatalities on Saturday, May 25, 2024.

Two fatalities occurred on Sunday, May 26, 2024. Crystal P. Hooper, 37, of Monroe City, MO, died when the vehicle she was driving traveled off the roadway, struck an embankment, and overturned. The crash occurred in Marion County on U.S. Highway 61 two miles north of Palmyra, MO. Hooper was not wearing a seat belt and was ejected from the vehicle. Marion County paramedic B. Schrage pronounced Hooper deceased at the scene. A passenger in Hooper's vehicle was wearing a seat belt and sustained serious injuries. The Marion County Sheriff's Office, Palmyra Fire Department, and Monroe City (MO) Police Department responded to the scene.

Patrick L. Shelton, 37, of Benton, MO, died when he was ejected from the golf cart in which he was a passenger then struck by another golf cart. The crash occurred in Bollinger County on U.S. Highway 34 west of Missouri Route Y 12 miles west of Marble Hill, MO. Dr. Anna Delanis pronounced Shelton deceased at the scene. Neither driver of the golf carts was injured.

Four people died in traffic crashes on Memorial Day, Monday, May 27, 2024. Dwayne C. Washington, 44, of St. Louis, MO, died when the vehicle he was driving exited the roadway,

and struck a metal guardrail. The crash occurred in St. Louis County on Interstate 270 eastbound, west of Lilac, MO. It is unknown whether Washington was wearing a seat belt. A paramedic pronounced Washington deceased at the scene.

Danny Luebbers, 18, of Salem, MO, died when the vehicle in which he was a passenger experienced a mechanical failure, traveled off the roadway into a wooded area and struck a tree. The crash occurred in Dent County on U.S. Highway 119 at Missouri Route E. Luebbers was wearing a seat belt. Dent County Coroner Gina White pronounced Luebbers deceased at the scene. The driver of the vehicle and another passenger sustained moderate injuries; both were wearing their seat belt at the time of the crash. The Dent County Sheriff's Office and Salem (MO) Police Department responded to the scene.

William F. Gorman, 89, of Independence, MO, died when the motortricycle he was operating was struck as he attempted to cross U.S. Highway 65. The crash occurred in Benton County on U.S. Highway 65 at Balke Road. Gorman was wearing a helmet at the time of the crash. Dr. Joshua Stilley pronounced Gorman deceased at the scene. The driver of the other vehicle was wearing a seat belt; she was not injured in the crash.

Ronald W. Moore III, 38, of Catawissa, MO, died when the motorcycle he was operating traveled off the roadway and struck the guardrail. Moore was ejected from the motorcycle. The crash occurred in St. Louis County on Interstate 55 north of S. Lindbergh Blvd. He was wearing a helmet at the time of the crash. Dr. Testrake pronounced Moore deceased at Mercy Hospital South.
