

Before you begin your house hunting, it can be crucial to try to get a mortgage pre-approval. After reviewing and verifying some of your financial information, lenders will tell you how much money they'd be willing to let you borrow. Getting pre-approved can speed up the sale process and demonstrates to sellers that you're serious about buying.

Here's a closer look at how you could benefit from a mortgage pre-approval and what it takes to get one:

Narrows the scope of the housing search

On a very basic level, buying a home is like deciding where to go for dinner. Although the possibilities may seem endless, you'll need to stick to your budget. Ask yourself, "how much house can I afford?" and stay within that range. Otherwise, you may end up regretting your decision. A mortgage preapproval ensures that you can focus on looking at homes that you can afford, since a lender provides you with a letter saying how much money you could get from it for a mortgage.

To obtain a pre-approval, you'll need to provide your would-be lender with some financial documentation, including a copy of your credit report, tax returns, pay stubs and checking and savings account statements. This helps financial institutions determine your creditworthiness. It's best not to switch jobs just before applying for a mortgage and to avoid racking up additional debt between getting pre-approved and actually trying to borrow the money. As long as there aren't

any dramatic changes in your personal finances, it's fairly safe to assume that the lender will let you borrow the stated amount.

How pre-approvals help buyers

When looking at homes, a pre-approval letter can be a great tool with which to impress sellers. This document indicates that you're serious about buying. More importantly, it shows you'd probably get the needed financing and that you have the backing of a lender to go through with a deal. Having that kind of support could even give you additional leverage when negotiating the final price of a home.

The takeaway

Before applying for a pre-approval, work on improving your credit score. Reduce your debt as much as possible while making sure not to accumulate any more of it. These moves will make you look like a better risk to lenders.

WELCOME NEIGHBOR STL CELEBRATES REFUGEE **CHEFS WITH "THE BIG SUPPER CLUB"**

Welcome Neighbor STL, an organization that serves refugees and immigrants in St. Louis, has announced that their popular annual fundraiser will be returning on March 29 from 6-9pm at The Majorette (7150 Manchester Rd). Tickets start at \$100 a person and sponsorship opportunities are available.

The fundraiser, called The Big Supper Club, is a spin on the nonprofit's regular Supper Club events. At a Supper Club event, one of their refugee chefs is hired to cater a meal and proceeds from the event go directly back to the refugee chef. It is an opportunity for the event's guests to learn about the refugee's culture and try their food. It's also a way for the refugee to learn about business and earn income. Welcome Neighbor STL has 80 chefs from eight different countries. Since the program started in August 2017, they have hosted 218 Supper Club events for 15,930 people and raised

At The Big Supper Club fundraiser, refugee chefs will share their culinary skills with appetizers, dinner, and desserts from multiple countries, including Afghanistan, Syria, India, and countries in West Africa. Ten refugee chefs will be making 11 different dishes ranging from kibbeh, chicken biryani, lola kebab, mantu, melktert, and much more.

In addition to music, international food, drinks, and great conversations, three of the refugee families that Welcome Neighbor STL works will be sharing their story in the form of videos

"At the Big Supper Club, we promise to feed your soul and fill your heart with stories of rebuilding lives and rebuilding hope," says Jessica Bueler, the Executive Director of Welcome Neighbor STL.

March is National Nutrition Month, an annual campaign designed by the Academy of Nutrition and Dietetics. This month-long effort puts nutrition front and center, and has been celebrated since 1973. This year's awareness campaign encourages consumers to "Fuel for the Future." During the month of March, keep in mind that good nutrition does not have to be restrictive or overwhelming. Small goals and changes can have a cumulative healthful effect, and every little bit is a step in the right direction.

Eat with the environment in mind. Buying foods in-season and shopping locally when possible benefit the planet and may also help keep food costs down. Although no pre-determined distance officially defines "local," a set number of miles from a center point is often used. Because dairy is perishable, processing plants are usually located near dairy farms; meaning most milk in Illinois and Missouri is produced, processed and sold locally.

Stay nourished and save money. When the price of food and other goods goes up, buying healthful foods may not be a priority. Yet many healthy foods are filling, cost less overall and can help manage or reduce the risk of certain chronic diseases. "Dairy foods offer high nutrition and economic value. No other beverage comes close to offering the same nutrition as real dairy milk, which contains 13 essential nutrients in every glass," states Maggie Cimarolli, registered dietitian for St. Louis District Dairy Council.

Eat a variety of foods from all food groups. Fruits, vegetables, grains, protein foods and dairy all play a role in fueling healthy bodies. Choosing a variety of foods is important, as foods can differ in the nutrients they provide. Eat foods in various forms including fresh, frozen, canned and dried. "Milk, cheese and yogurt pair well with all food groups. Cheese with whole grain crackers, yogurt with fresh fruit and milk with a meal are great options," notes Cimarolli. Follow MyPlate's Daily Recommendations for each food group to get the nutrients needed at each life stage.

Make tasty foods at home. To add variety to a regular eating routine, try new flavors and foods from around the world. Learn cooking and meal preparation skills to save money and discover creative ways to use leftovers rather than tossing them out. Making a large batch by doubling a recipe will save time in the kitchen. Extra portions can be saved for meals later in the week, or frozen in individual containers as leftovers for future use.

Finding ways to include favorite foods while getting needed nutrition is important at any age. Whether cooking for one or for a large family, small changes can provide "Fuel for the Future." Putting these simple tips into action during National Nutrition Month will help create habits that deliver lifelong health benefits. Turkey Sweet Potato SkilletPacked with protein and flavor, this dish will be a family favorite. Double the recipe to serve leftovers later in the week and to save time in the kitchen.

Ingredients

2 tablespoons butter

1 tablespoon garlic, minced

1 pound ground turkey

1.5 tablespoons ground cumin

2 teaspoons chili powder

½ teaspoon salt

½ teaspoon pepper

1 cup onion, diced

1 yellow bell pepper, diced

3 small or 2 large sweet potatoes, peeled and diced small (about 3 1/2 cups)

34 cup chicken broth

½ cup mozzarella, shredded

½ cup cheddar, shredded

¼ cup cilantro, chopped Instructions

In a large skillet, heat butter over medium heat. Add garlic and cook for 1 minute. Add ground turkey. Cook turkey until browned.

Add cumin, chili powder, salt and pepper. Stir well to incorporate.

Add onion and bell pepper and cook for 3-4 minutes. Add diced sweet potato and broth. Stir and cover with a lid for approximately 6-8 minutes until the sweet

Remove lid and add additional salt and pepper if desired. Top with shredded cheese. Remove skillet from heat and garnish with fresh cilantro before serving.



Brentwood Celebrates Grand Opening of New McGrath and BECC



















Students, families, community members, elected officials, business partners and district leaders celebrated the grand opening of the new McGrath Elementary School and Brentwood Early Childhood Center on Feb. 25 during a community open house event that drew more than 600 attendees.

The event kicked off with an official ribbon-cutting ceremony, followed by self-guided tours of the brand-new, state-of-the-art elementary school and early childhood center.

"A project of this magnitude does not happen in isolation," said Superintendent Dr. Brian Lane. "It takes a community coming together to support high-quality education for all students, and that is what has happened in Brentwood to make this possible."

Construction on the 60,000-square-foot building was completed in December 2022. It features flexible, collaborative learning spaces that are designed to engage students and support innovative instruction. There are 18 total classrooms, as well as dedicated spaces for art, music, physical education, counseling, intervention and special education services.

The building has separate, secure main entrances for both McGrath and BECC that meet school safety and security best practices. This includes a visitor management system to screen guests in each main office before granting access to the rest of the school. The McGrath gymnasium also serves as an ICC 500 storm shelter, which meets FEMA specifications and provides near-absolute protection in extreme weather events.

This project was made possible by Prop E, a \$29 million bond issue to enhance safety, accessibility and student learning at the district's two elementary schools and early childhood center. The building was designed by HTK Architects, managed by Navigate Building Solutions and built by ICS Construction.

Community Color Run Set for Saturday, April 8



Brentwood and Clayton Forge Football Partnership

The Brentwood and Clayton school districts have agreed to a high school football partnership for the 2023-24 school year. The partnership was recently approved by each school district's Board of Education, as well

as the Missouri State High School Activities Association.

While technically called a "cooperative sponsorship," the move is essentially a merger of the football programs at both Brentwood High School and Clayton High School that provides a solution for a



sport that has seen a decline in participation in recent years.

The combined program will be able to field both varsity and junior varsity teams, providing student-athletes with valuable opportunities to play and progress at the proper pace for their individual skill levels. Increased participation will allow inexperienced players to develop at the junior varsity level and keep varsity players from having to play offense and defense for an entire game due to low numbers.

All planning and football-related activities will be managed by both high schools and their respective athletic departments. Some initial details about the combined program include:

The program will practice at Gay Field in Clayton.

The program will split home games between Brentwood and Clayton high schools.

The varsity football team will remain in MSHSAA Class 4 and compete in the St. Louis Suburban Conference.

The program will wear blue and orange uniforms with both Brentwood and Clayton on the jerseys, as well as a custom Brentwood and Clayton helmet logo.

In the coming months, the athletic departments at both schools will be working together to finalize additional details, including coaches, equipment and offseason training schedules. The program will officially start practicing in August.

St. Louis native Wade Stauss enjoying 'dream' being in spring training with Cardinals

JUPITER, Fla. – For a kid born and raised in St. Louis, who grew up going to games at Busch Stadium and had posters of Albert Pujols, Yadier Molina and Jim Edmonds on his bedroom wall, it was a phone call that Wade Stauss will never forget.

Stauss was sleeping in that morning in January at his home in Chesterfield when the call came, informing him that he was being invited to the Cardinals' major-league spring training camp.

"I woke up really quick," Stauss said.

Stauss had to be certain that he wasn't dreaming, and he still kind of feels that way every day he walks into the Cardinals' locker room and sees his name on the back of a jersey with uniform number 99.

"It doesn't feel real," Stauss said. "I'm really here. We are really doing this. It's hard to put into words. It's just been a dream."

Stauss is one of 10 catchers in the Cardinals' camp, a necessity in spring training to handle all of the extra pitchers who need somebody to throw to.

A graduate of the same high school, Lafayette, that produced Ryan Howard, David Freese and Luke Voit, Stauss was not drafted out of Southeast Missouri before another unexpected phone call changed his plans to go back to school and pursue a master's degree in business administration.

He was invited to a tryout camp, then signed by the Cardinals a week later in 2021. He has spent the last two seasons splitting his time between Palm Beach and Peoria.

It's the time that he has spent around the players on the major-league roster the last few weeks that Stauss has enjoyed the most, believing that what he is learning now will stick with him long after he goes back to the minor leagues.

"I came to Jupiter one time when I was real young, when I was seven," he said. "It was 2006, and I remember seeing Adam Wainwright and Yadi walking in. Today I got to catch Waino for the first time and got to talk to him for a little bit. He's just such a great baseball mind and leader. You can learn so much from him."

Because players in the minor-league camp often have an opportunity to see the major-leaguers, Stauss was able to meet and talk with Molina and Pujols last spring during his first spring training in the organization.

He had almost met Pujols years ago, when he was in first grade.

"I went to school with his kids and one day at recess his daughter Bella kicked me down the slide," said the now 23-year-old Stauss. "I exaggerated and acted like I was hurt because I thought maybe they would call me into the office and I could meet him.

"Last spring he came up to me and said, 'I'm Albert Pujols' and held out his hand. I was like, 'Man I know.' I didn't have a chance to tell him that story."

Stauss has not played in a game so far this spring, and he knows those opportunities will be limited. That does not diminish his experience, however.

"It's priceless," he said. "Playing time and at-bats are great, but just what you learn behind the scenes will stick with me."

Stauss already has had one spring training moment to remember, even it it was over almost as soon as it happened.

It was the final day of spring training last year. He was on a back field at the Cardinals' complex when one of the organization's hitting coordinators told him to get his stuff and head over to the main stadium for the Cardinals' game against the Marlins.

In the ninth inning, he got a chance to bat – and lined the first triple he had hit since 2019, matching the total number of triples he hit in four years of college baseball.

"That was a fun phone call home," Stauss said. "I told them I hit a triple and they said, 'No you didn't. You're slow.' It all happened really quick. I was driving away saying, 'Did that really happen?'

"Now being out here, being around the guys, putting the work in, I'm definitely taking more in this time."

And it's those lessons that he will take with him this season, when he moves out of the major-league clubhouse and goes down the hall to the minor-league locker room, and the lessons he will take with him when the minor-league season begins.

"Just the way they carry themselves, the way they take care of the small things," Stauss said. "How open they are to communication. They are masters of routine. They know what their body needs, what nutrition they need.

"It's just little things you pick up and take it in and then immediately try to apply it. You see the results right away. It's like, 'Wow, that's why these guys have had such successful careers."

There was even a lesson Stauss learned from Wainwright that had nothing to do with baseball.

"Wainwright was talking yesterday about cleaning up the bathroom," Stauss said. "That's the way the Cardinals work. Wainwright said, 'This is how you be a big leaguer."

Stauss still tries to follow a piece of advice he and others new to the organization received after signing from John Mozeliak, the Cardinals' president of baseball operations. "He told us, "Just choose one thing every day to get better at," Stauss said. "It doesn't have to be on the field. It can be in the locker room. It can be training wise or nutrition wise. Just choose one thing to try to focus on each day to get better at. You just build small things on top of each other.

"That's something I really look to do. I want to see where it takes me."



Pictorial St. Louis A Topographical Survey Drawn in Perspective A.D. 1875

This is a reprint of the 1971 version of the original book. The book was painstakingly scanned from the original in my collection. PICTORIAL ST. LOUIS: The Great Metropolis of the Mississippi Valley A Topographical Survey, Drawn From Perspective 1875.

Illustrations by Camille N. Dry and designed & edited by Rich. J. Compton.

Over 220 pages of illustrations and descriptions of life in St. Louis in the late 1800's. The preliminary drawings for this work were made early in the spring of 1874. After a careful consideration of the subject, it was determined to locate the point of view so that the city would be seen from the southeast, believing that to be the most advantageous in all respects. Accordingly, the point of site was established on the Illinois side of the river, looking to the northwest, and at sufficient altitude to overlook the roofs of ordinary houses into the streets.

A careful perspective, which required a surface of three hundred square feet, was then erected from a correct survey of the city, extending northward from Arsenal Island to the Water Works, a distance of about ten miles, on the river front; and from the Insane Asylum on the southwest to the Cemeteries on the northwest.

Every foot of the vast territory within these limits has been carefully examined and topographically drawn in perspective, by Mr. C. N. Dry and his assistants, and the faithfulness and accuracy with which this work has been done an examination of the pages will attest. Absolute truth and accuracy in the representation of the territory has been the standard and in no cases have additions or alterations been made unless the same were actually in course of construction. In a few cases, important public and private edifices that are not yet finished are shown completed, and as they will appear when done.

All the buildings within the limits of the survey in July, 1875, are shown; and a very large number of those executed or commenced since that date have been also introduced, the pages having been constantly corrected up to the last possible moment before publication.



NEW BUSINESS

Bill No. 6446 - An Ordinance Amending Chapter 100 of the Brentwood City Code Relating to Suspension and Debarment of Vendors - First Reading Only

The City Attorney did the first reading of the Bill and presented the information.

The process of debarment is commonplace at the Federal and State level. Staff is recommending the Board consider adopting a similar process, which enables the city to address inadequate or inappropriate performance or conduct on the part of vendors and contractors the city deals with. It establishes a process to put the vendor on notice if a problem should occur. This would keep them from doing business in the city for an appropriate amount of time. This helps ensure that vendors are sensitive to the need to perform well and consistently, and handle conduct appropriately. This gives the

city a tool to use. Hopefully it is rarely used, but this makes it available if needed.

Alderman Plufka asked if this ordinance is becoming more common among municipalities in St. Louis County or in Missouri, and if disbarment or suspension is this something that is published somewhere on a list?

It was shared that many larger cities have this, and the City Attorney is bringing this to his clients. Many cities do not have the size or apparatus to enforce this, but it is felt that Brentwood does. A list may not be published but having this available discourages resolutions of disputes with vendors because many bidding processes require disclose of that information. This is impactful for all agencies.

Bill No. 6447 - An Ordinance Relating to Procedures for Issuance and Enforcement of Subpoenas in furtherance of Board of Alderman Proceedings - First Reading Only

The City Attorney did the first reading of the Bill and presented the information.

This item is a recommendation that may be prudent for the city to have available. State law gives the Board of Aldermen the power to subpoena and compel the attendants and witness for production of papers/documents/information required. It may be used in oversight capacity and/or may also be useful for legislative proceedings to compel witnesses to assist in determining if ordinances should be revised in some way or if we should look at new legislation to achieve goals. (Process is similar to how Congress subpoenas folks to appear before committees to share/explain). Giving someone the opportunity to be seen by community and recorded may have a good effect for those who may choose not to obey an ordinance and provides an opportunity for them to explain reason before legislative committee.

Alderman Lochmoeller asked how the process works; how does procedure start and follows though to Board level.

City Attorney explained that if Board feels it would be helpful to have someone testify, they could be invited to do so, but if they choose not, Board could vote to issue/authorize a subpoena. If they fail to appear, it would be filed in St. Louis County Circuit Court to enforce compliance.

This process is reserved at Board level unless the Board delegates that to a committee. Board could issue a subpoena for someone to appear before a committee.

Alderman Plufka asked if this subpoena power extends around the state of Missouri or just in the community. It was thought to be around the state if necessary.

Alderwoman Tice asked if this is happening in other communities and what has prompted this for consideration. The City Attorney stated this came before him with another client and he realized we did not have this. He noted that State law has always given Boards of Aldermen the authority to sub-

poena, but what we did not have was an advanced process for how to do this before finding ourselves in crisis mode.

Bill No. 6448 An Ordinance Reaffirming the Gross Receipts Tax To Be Imposed Upon Utility Corporations Conducting Business Within The City Of Brentwood, Missouri And Matters Relating Thereto; And Providing For The Effective Date Of This Ordinance - First Reading Only

The City Attorney did the first reading of the Bill, and the City Administrator presented the information.

It was stated that the rate increase notice from Spire was sent to all taxing districts last month and districts have 60 days to either:

Reaffirm the current tax rate by state statute - which is 7.5% for Brentwood. Residents are charged zero, and businesses are charged 7.5%, or

Adopt an ordinance approving the increase.

This was taken to Ways and Means Committee who recommended presenting this to the Board for approval affirming the city's current tax rate of 7.5%.

Alderman Wegge noted that while the city percentage is the same, we will be receiving more tax revenue because of the increase from Spire. The City Administrator stated we would still receive only 7.5% and would only receive more if people's usage of service is more.

Alderman Plufka asked why Ways and Means did not just pass this through. The Chairwoman of Ways and Means, Alderwoman Sims, explained that committee wanted to keep the tax rate where it was and not put any additional burden on business owners.



City of Brentwood News – March 2023

Proposition M on the April 4 General Municipal Election Ballot



On April 4, Brentwood voters will be asked to decide on Proposition M, an additional 3% sales tax on adult-use (recreational) marijuana. The language on the ballot will read as follows:

"Shall the City of Brentwood be authorized to impose an additional sales tax in an amount not to exceed three percent on all tangible personal property retail sales of adult-use marijuana sold in the City?"

A "YES" vote will impose a three percent (3%) sales tax on adult-use, recreational marijuana purchases made within Brentwood.

A "NO" vote will not impose a 3% sales tax on adult-use, recreational marijuana purchases made within Brentwood.

This is for adult-use (recreational) marijuana. The Missouri Constitution allows municipalities to impose an additional sales tax of up to 3% on retail sales of adult-use marijuana with voter approval. Medical marijuana retail sales are exempt from the proposed tax.

At this time, there are no adult-use marijuana dispensaries in the City of Brentwood. If a majority of Brentwood voters approve Proposition M, this approval would allow the City of Brentwood to collect the additional sales tax from adult-use marijuana dispensaries if any such dispensaries are established in Brentwood in the future.

RESTAURANT REVIEWS

Local History, Great Food and Horseradish Vodka

The Old Herald Brewery and Distillery, in Collinsville, Illinois, has something for everyone. Located in downtown Collinsville, it is in the old Herald Newspaper building at 115 East Clay street.

Derik and Whitney Reiser started out to open a pizza pub, but finally decided to continue their home-brewing experience with a craft brewery that would also include a distillery and restaurant. They have succeeded at all levels..

Their beers include every style brewed beverages and they all have a name that is reminiscent of the printing industry. A dark beer is named Printer's Ink, an IPA named Late Edition, a lager named Sports Page Lite and more. There is also a Kolsch style beer named Miner's Coalsch; a Play on words as a tribute to the area's coal mining history. A portion of the sales of this beer are donated to the Miner's Institute for the renovation of the Old Miner's Theater.

Now for the food, Chef Krissana Frawley's background includes Churchill Downs, Beast BBQ and Cleveland Heath in Edwardsville. She has many unique items on the menu that will satisfy any taste.



One appetizer is a must try, popcorn cooked in bacon fat with bacon bits, sea salt and black pepper. Needless to say, it goes great with any of their beers. I'm not much for popcorn, but I can honestly say, I could make a meal of this alone! Another appetizer is the Paper Route pretzel with horserad-ih-mustard sauce and beer cheese.



There are many sandwiches including a PBLT; crispy beer braised pork belly with tomato jam, fresh greens and an herb aioli. We were there for lunch so I tried the prime rib sliders with melted cheese and a horseradish sauce. I had a choice of fries, homemade chips or onion rings. I took the onion rings. It also included a Printer's Ink onion soup dipping sauce. This soup is a house special made from beef broth, caramelized onions, and Printer's Ink stout beer and melted Swiss cheese. If you order the soup itself it also comes with croutons. I thought this would be a somewhat light lunch. It was a full meal.



Sue had the Tuscan flatbread with grilled chicken, artichokes, spinach and a blend of cheeses drizzled with a red pepper sauce. Old Herald's portions are huge. She took half of it home.

Other entrees include various pastas, chicken dishes, risottos and more. There is a children's menu and don't forget desserts. How about fresh beer donuts filled with an IPA lemon curd and tossed in powdered sugar! Unfortunately we were too full to try this, but we will go back to give that one a try.

Before I go on to the distillery, I want to touch on a bit of Collinsville history. Collinsville is the horseradish capitol of the world. They ship ten to twelve million pounds of horseradish roots a year to destinations around the world. Commercial horseradish farming began in the fertile American Bottoms of the Mississippi River around the 1850s by immigrant German farmers. The name horseradish is thought to come for the German word meerrettich which translates to sea radish. The word mare is a name for a type of horse and the German pronunciation was translated to horse radish. Collinsville host a horseradish festival each years with great street food, horseradish tasting, horseradish ice cream and more, along with a horseradish queen. This year's festival is the weekend of June 3rd, 2023.

The distillery calls it's products Ardent Spirits. This is another tribute to the area history. The Collins family first settled here and opened a flour mill and distillery serving the pioneers heading West. Their family minister was a devote prohibitionist and the Collins family decided to close their distillery. They also passed a law that said any land owner that distilled, or sold, ardent spirits must relinquish their land to the County! The Reisers made this, since eliminated restriction, the name of their products..

Their products include whiskey, rum gin and vodka. Many of their spirits are infused with unusual botanicals. Their gin is a perfect example. It is infused with hibiscus and rhubarb. It is a very light pink gin with absolutely no aroma of juniper berries etc. It's a long story, but I have not tasted gin since 1968, but this was marvelous! Needless to say, they also make a horseradish vodka which they say makes an amazing Bloody Mary. I tried it straight and found it to be a very smooth vodka with just a hint of horseradish taste. I took a bottle home.

The Old Herald Brewery and Distillery has a large meeting room, restaurant and separate bar area. They have live entertainment, as well as a patio area and stage for your outdoor pleasure.

They are closed on Monday. Perhaps we will see you there.



Glazed Corned Beef

Serves 6 to 8

I love a corned beef and this one is simple & delicious. But make sure to save some for sandwiches the next day...

Ingredients

1 corned beef - about 4 pounds, the kind from the supermarket with the little packet of spices included

1/2 cup apricot jam

1/4 cup grainy mustard 2 tablespoons soy

Directions

Put corned beef in a large pot (with any spices from the spice pack in the package) cover with water -

Bring to a boil, then turn down to a simmer and cover - cook for approx 2.5 hours

Mix jam, mustard, soy - set aside

Heat over to 400

Remove corned beef from pot, drain and place on a baking sheet lined with foil

Baste with the mustard glaze and cook another 30 minutes (adding more glaze occasionally) until you can push a fork into it really easily

Slice and enjoy

Ingredients

One 16-ounce tube large-sized refrigerator biscuits 1/4 grainy mustard

2/3 to 1 cup corned beef, chopped or shredded 1/3 cup shredded Swiss cheese

Directions

Preheat oven to 350

Lightly grease a baking sheet, remove biscuits from the package and flatten each into a 4-inch circle

Spread about a teaspoon of the mustard in the center of each biscuit

Top with some of the corned beef, then cheese and fold the biscuit over into a half moon - pinch the edges tight to seal

Pierce each biscuit top 2 or 3 times with the point of a small knife and place on the

baking sheet - bake about 25 minutes or until golden brown



Ste Genevieve, Museums and Winery

The Bequette-Ribault House downtown opens May – Oct. for wine tastings from Chaumette Winery. There is a timeline from 1776 telling the American History during the Bequette-Ribault Period. 351 St. Mary's Road, 573-747-1000. The parish of Ste. Genevieve was established in 1759 by Jesuits of Quebec. It was the first organized European settlement in 1876 west of the Mississippi River.

This property is a true lifestyle-destination located 1 hr. 15 min. south of St. Louis on I-55.





The Chaumette Winery is located out of town. Owners, Hank and Jackie Johnson, purchased the small chapel when it was going to be knocked down, the chapel was located in St. Louis County near Ladue Rd. They had the chapel reassembled and added a basement. Today, the chapel is referred as an all-faith chapel, St. Vincents In The Vinyards. Just a note...Kevin and Sue McCarthy got married in the little chapel before it was moved.





This is the ideal place for a wedding and has French Country Villas on the 310 acre property, with 26 acres of grapes. Sip a glass of wine on the deck and watch the sunset over the rolling hills.

If you are a dog lover ask about bringing your dog along.





After your overnight stay head back into the historic downtown and visit quaint shops (Show-Me Shop has Missouri made gifts.) Stop by the Old Brick House Restaurant for a bite in their 1785 dining room. Spend time going through the museums where you can see artifacts and furniture of the period. Hands-On History Children's Museum at the Linden has a wonderful children's shop where your kids can take a step back in time. Kids can play dress up in French clothing.







Walk into the Hall of Giants at the Ste. Genevieve Museum Learning Center (573-883-DINO) you will find immersive exhibits of many educational events, hand-shaped pottery and dinosaurs and fossils of all sizes. The most famous dinosaur is the recently discovered Parrosaurus Missourinsis or our new state dino, a duck-billed dinosaur. It was discovered in southern Missouri at the Chronister site when a family was digging a well on their property. Guy Darrough, the man behind the research, is resident self-taught Paleontologist, geologist, speaker, illustrator and historian. Guy designs the displays and uses live plats for more realism. It has been said the dino site in Chronister MO is "one of the best dino digs east of the Great Plains."
