

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

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

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Laumeier Sculpture Park's Largest Sculpture to Undergo its Largest Conservation Ever

Laumeier Sculpture Park will complete a major restoration of Alexander Liberman's THE WAY in 2023







At a soaring 100 feet high and a hefty 55 tons, Alexander Liberman's The Way was the first massive artwork purchased for Laumeier's collection, and it remains the Park's largest piece. Over the years, it has become Laumeier's signature sculpture, a favorite of Park goers, and an icon for the entire region. Made of 18 salvaged steel oil tanks, The Way will undergo its largest restoration in its 40+ year history throughout the spring and summer of 2023.


Care and conservation are ongoing needs for any art collection, but arguably the most pressing for those that are in outdoor settings like Laumeier, where works are exposed every single day to extremes of temperature and precipitation, bird and animal residue, and touching by Park visitors, among other factors. Since its completion in 1980, The Way has had minor treatments and was re-painted in 1996 and 2011. However, the current combination of faded and patchy paint, chipped concrete, and corroded metal indicate that it is time for the work's most thorough conservation ever.

Phase one of The Way conservation project was a structural, material, and concrete base assessment. A 3D scan of the sculpture was created and used to evaluate the structure and metal materials of the oil tanks. This phase started in fall of 2020 and is now complete.

The upcoming restoration phase will be a carefully choreographed execution of the needed repairs, focusing on three main elements: metal, cement, and paint. It will begin with a material blasting of the sculpture using an eco-friendly abrasive to remove layers of paint and primer. Any areas that have metal rot, rust, or other signs of damage will be replaced or repaired. Welding will be used to blend new metal seamlessly with the existing structure. Once all repairs have been finished, the entire surface will be primed and then painted in "Toreador Red," the sculpture's signature color, and a topcoat applied to seal paint layers and provide additional protection from the weather. The Way is currently fenced off to visitors to prevent public access, and the restoration work is planned to begin in April and be completed by late summer. A celebration event will be planned in the fall, once all the work is finished.

The team overseeing the conservation initiative consists of Laumeier curatorial staff, members of the Getty Conservation Institute of Los Angeles, and the preferred conservator for the estate of Alexander Liberman, Crosby Coughlin. Coughlin has overseen all restoration work for The Liberman Trust since 1999 and has been advising Laumeier's staff on the ongoing maintenance of The Way for almost twenty years. Various local contractors will perform the metal, cement, and paint work.

The expected cost for completing the needed restoration work is \$335,000. Laumeier is currently conducting a fundraising campaign to ensure that the entire conservation project is fully funded. The St. Louis Walk of Fame is located along six blocks of Delmar Blvd., which has been named "One of the 10 Great Streets in America" by the American Planning Association. The attraction honors notable people from St. Louis, Missouri, who have made contributions to the culture of the United States. All 150+ inductees were either born in the Greater St. Louis area or spent their formative or creative years there.

District Announces New Brentwood Middle School Principal

The Brentwood School District is excited to welcome Dr. Doug Wehner as principal of Brentwood Middle School for the 2023-24 school year, effective July 1. The Board of Education



approved his hire on Tuesday, April 18.

Dr. Wehner joins Brentwood with more than 25 years of experience as a teacher and school administrator. He currently serves as the assistant principal at Wydown Middle School in the School District of Clayton.

"Dr. Wehner is an educational leader with a proven track record of creating safe and inclusive learning environments and utilizing data-driven decision-making to close learning gaps," said Superintendent Dr. Brian Lane. "He understands the importance of building authentic relationships with all stakeholders, with a focus on professional growth, accountability and academic excellence. We are excited to welcome him to the Brentwood community."

Dr. Wehner began his career as a social studies teacher at Wydown Middle School. After four years in the classroom, he transitioned to teaching and administrative roles in New York, Vermont and California before returning to the area as the Director of College Preparation at College Bound St. Louis. He rejoined Wydown Middle School as the assistant principal in 2012.

"It was clear during the interview process that the Brentwood School District cares deeply about student growth, academic achievement and the social-emotional wellness of its students," said Dr. Wehner. "I am honored and excited to become a part of the Brentwood family as the next principal of Brentwood Middle School."

Dr. Wehner earned his Bachelor of Arts in History from Indiana University Bloomington, Master of Arts in Secondary Education from the University of Missouri-St. Louis, Master of Science in Educational Leadership from The City College of New York and Doctor of Education in Educational Leadership from Maryville University. He will replace Brentwood Middle School's current principal Dr. Andrew Loiterstein, who is retiring after more than 25 years in public education.

Board of Education Reorganizes, Welcomes New Member

The Brentwood School District Board of Education held its regular monthly meeting Tuesday,



April 18. During the meeting, the board welcomed new member Ryan Dodson and recognized outgoing secretary Chris Perkins for his service to the community.

Perkins administered the oath of office to Keith Rabenberg, Lindsay Spencer and Dodson, signifying the start of their three-year terms. Rabenberg is serving his 10th term on the board, while Spencer begins her third term. All three ran unopposed in the April 2023 election.

The board also elected new officers, which are as follows:

The board thanked Perkins for his three years of volunteer service to the Brentwood community, which included overseeing the successful completion of the new McGrath Elementary School and Brentwood Early Childhood Center.

"Chris has been a dedicated advocate for our students, staff and families," said Superintendent Dr. Brian Lane. "His commitment to high-quality educational opportunities in our community has been outstanding, and we are grateful for his service."

As elected representatives of the citizens of the Brentwood School District, the seven-member Board of Education serves as the governing body for the community's public school system. The school board sets district policies, selects the superintendent of schools, adopts the annual budget and determines the tax rate.

Board members serve three-year overlapping terms with two or three members elected each year. Board members, who receive no salary, are committed and concerned citizens who devote countless hours working on behalf of students and the educational interests of the Brentwood community.

"Reed has demonstrated a true metamorphosis as a student at Brentwood High School," said Glasgow. "He no longer speeds down the hallways with his trademark baseball cap drawn down to hide his face. When he gets frustrated in difficult classes, he applies learning strategies and a growth mindset to overcome his feelings. In four years, Reed has grown from a struggling freshman into a college-bound senior who will pursue a degree in game design! He tutors other students in math and chemistry, and his smile lights up our school hallways."

"Isabel is the most surprising superhero you will ever meet," said Glasgow. "Despite significant personal trials, she does not complain, shut down, or stop doing her best. She has physical challenges but marches onto the court or field as a cheerleading squad member with pride. She is an active member of the student activity council, our coffee shop manager, and mother hen for the students in her class. Isabel is not content to stop at completing her academic goals - she is determined to be part of the school culture at Brentwood."

The Special School District of St. Louis County provides special education services to all students with disabilities in St. Louis County - more than 24,000 this school year. The district also operates two technical high schools that offer a wide range of career and technical education opportunities to more than 1,400 area high school students.

Middle School Students Welcome Real-World Professionals for Career Day













More than 25 business professionals shared their experiences and insights about their respective fields as part of Brentwood Middle School's inaugural Career Day on Friday, April 21.

From healthcare to multimedia journalism, this event highlighted a wide range of career options and gave students a glimpse into the real-world applications of the skills they are learning in the classroom. Each professional had a direct connection to the Brentwood community, including parents, residents and local first responders.

Students had the opportunity to attend four 20-minute breakout sessions to learn more about the different career paths that were represented. The event also included an exhibit hall, which allowed students to engage directly with the professionals and ask questions about their individual career journeys.

"It was exciting to see our students connect with real-world professionals," said school counselor Anne Bosche. "We are grateful to all of the volunteers who took the time to share their expertise and inspire our students to begin planning their own career paths."

Brentwood High School Hosts Inaugural Sophia Rivera Invitational

For many years Brentwood High School has hosted a track and field invitational, but this year was different. On April 17th, the annual meet was given a new name: The Sophia Rivera Track Invitational, named after an alumna who continues to excel at the sport.

In honor of the newly named meet, Sophia Rivera returned to Brentwood to celebrate her achieve-



ment. "I love it, honestly, I've come back a few times after college," said Rivera. "But this is the first time I've been back after the school has been renovated," said Rivera. "Brentwood is such a family, I loved spending time and making good friends here." The athlete who currently attends Mizzou graduated from Brentwood in 2016.

While at BHS, Rivera was one of the throwers on the track team; some events she competed in were javelin, shot put, and discus. She added, "The throwers went to every meet as a game, and we just had the most fun going to state."

Coach Long, BHS's current head track and field coach, coached Rivera throughout her years at Brentwood. "Her attitude has been to always work hard and do her best and she is very humble," said Long. "It was simple to coach Sophia, she has been throwing since 5th grade. She was already knowledgeable about what to do for training."

With her club track and field team, in 2015, Sophia won her first award as the Girl's Shot Put Champion in Missouri. After that, she proceeded to win the National Championship in the indoor shot put three times. She is a multi-state champion in multiple events including javelin and outdoor shot put. In 2015, she also placed 2nd in the 2015 World Youth Championships.

Rivera is now 24 years old and is working on a master's degree at Mizzou but is still able to compete at the collegiate level because of losing a season to injury and then losing a season to COVID-19. "It's very different doing a sport in college," she said. "One thing I miss is being able to do multiple sports. The training is very intense but it's a cool opportunity, we just got back from California." For students interested in a college sport, Rivera advised, "Don't underestimate the power of rest, an injury can take you out faster than you can think. Make sure you enjoy what you are doing." To note, Rivera is currently ranked 83rd in the WORLD for the Women's Javelin Throw.

Bone Health is as Easy as 1-2-3

May is Osteoporosis Awareness Month! Research shows that dairy foods are integral for building and maintaining a lifetime of healthy bones because they contain nutrients like calcium, protein, vitamin D, phosphorus, potassium, and magnesium. "Getting these key nutrients in with 3 servings a day of dairy is important at every stage in life," states Maggie Cimarolli, nutrition educator with the St. Louis District Dairy Council.

1-2-3 age groups...

It is crucial for children and adolescents to consume enough dairy. Up to 90 percent of bone mass is accumulated by the age of eighteen. Children who achieve peak bone mass reduce their risk for developing osteoporosis, a bone-crippling disease, later in life.

Adults also need to focus on dairy consumption throughout their lives. Bone loss and a reduced ability to replace bone tissue begins around the age of forty. Adults who consume a bone-healthy diet, engage in exercise, and eliminate bad habits like smoking can avoid premature bone loss and reduce the risk of fractures.

Seniors with strong bones have a decreased risk of falls and fractures, which can affect mobility and independence. Seniors actually require more calcium, dietary protein, and vitamin D to maintain healthy bones than younger people do.

1-2-3 servings...

The Dietary Guidelines for Americans recommend everyone age nine and above get three daily servings of low-fat or fat-free dairy to support bone health. One serving of dairy is one cup of milk, one cup of yogurt, or 1.5 ounces of cheese. "There are so many ways to work more dairy into your diet to achieve the 3 servings per day recommendation," states Cimarolli. Some examples include: making oatmeal with milk instead of water, preparing a veggie-packed salad with shredded cheese, blending a yogurt and fruit smoothie, layering a lunchtime sandwich with cheese, or simply enjoying a glass of cold milk.

1-2-3 Key Nutrients...

Calcium is a major building block of the skeleton. In fact, 99 percent of the calcium found in the body resides in the bones. When the body isn't supplied with enough calcium, it takes it from the bones which weakens them. Dairy foods are the most readily available source of calcium. One serving of dairy provides one-third of the total daily needs.

Protein is essential for building and preserving bone mass. Dairy foods are a good source of high-quality protein.

Vitamin D helps the body absorb calcium and ensures the correct renewal and mineralization of bones. Many dairy foods are fortified with vitamin D to support calcium absorption.



Kitchen House Hummus Recipe

Yield: 3 ¾ to 4 cups hummus

1 ½ cups dried garbanzo beans (also known as chickpeas)

½ cup freshly squeezed lemon juice (about 3 large lemons)

1/4 cup olive oil

2/3 cup tahini

4 cloves garlic, peeled and roughly chopped 1 ½ teaspoon kosher salt

1 ½ teaspoon ground cumin

½ teaspoon pepper

Cold water, if needed, to thin the hummus Smoked paprika for garnish

Notes: Yields may vary by the age of the dried beans. Add any excess beans to salads or soups, or make chickpea salad.

You may substitute thoroughly rinsed and drained canned chickpeas for convenience.

Combine all ingredients except the smoked paprika in the bowl of a large food processor or in a high-speed blender and process until smooth. If the hummus is too thick, thin with cold water, added 1 to 2 tablespoonsful at a time.

To serve as a spread, turn out a cup of hummus into a bowl and sprinkle the top with smoked paprika. Serve with toasted bagel, pita, crackers or crudites.

Store in a tightly covered container in the refrigerator for 5 to 6 days.

Optional: To assemble the Very Veggie Sandwich: Spread hummus on the bottom half of a toasted bagel. Top with thinly sliced cucumbers, then sprinkle on chopped red onion and sliced black olives. Top with greens (at Kitchen House they used kale), then add a slice of Swiss cheese, or the cheese of your choice, and cover with the top of the bagel.

'Extinct' Snails Return to the Wild

Zoo keepers from four institutions, including the Saint Louis Zoo, have released thousands of tropical snails into their French Polynesian island homes. These snails were bred in various zoos in an effort to reintroduce several snail species, a few of which are extinct in the wild.

Partula snails once populated the South Pacific Islands, from Palau to the Society Islands, including Tahiti and Moorea. These snails, however, experienced a devastating decline when the predatory rosy wolf snails (Euglandina rosea) were introduced to the islands in the 1970s as a form of biological control. In the 1980s, scientists began to notice the rapid decline of Partula snails and zoos began to create ex situ (protecting a species outside its natural habitat) assurance populations.

The Saint Louis Zoo WildCare Institute has provided funding for staff, equipment for field surveys, the construction and monitoring of predator exclusion reserves, and reintroduction efforts. This month, Saint Louis Zoo Zoological Manager of Invertebrates Kayla Garcia participated in the most recent reintroduction effort in Tahiti.

"I am incredibly proud of the successful collaboration and teamwork both in the field and at home that went into seeing Partula reintroduced back into the wild for the first time since 2019. This was a win for the ongoing conservation efforts of these highly endangered snails," said Kayla.

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
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

Pictorial St. Louis A Topographical Survey Drawn in Perspective A.D. 1875

This is a reprint of the 1971 version of the original book. The book was painstakingly scanned from the original in my collection. Each page is reproduced in high resolution and coil bound so the pages lay flat while viewing. Printed on 12" x 18" high quality acid free paper. A nice edition to your historical book collection. Perfect coffee table book as people are attracted by the cover art.

PICTORIAL ST. LOUIS: The Great Metropolis of the Mississippi Valley A Topographical Survey, Drawn From Perspective 1875.

Illustrations by Camille N. Dry and designed & edited by Rich. J. Compton.

Over 220 pages of illustrations and descriptions of life in St. Louis in the late 1800's. The preliminary drawings for this work were made early in the spring of 1874. After a careful consideration of the subject, it was determined to locate the point of view so that the city would be seen from the southeast, believing that to be the most advantageous in all respects. Accordingly, the point of site was established on the Illinois side of the river, looking to the northwest, and at sufficient altitude to overlook the roofs of ordinary houses into the streets.

A careful perspective, which required a surface of three hundred square feet, was then erected from a correct survey of the city, extending northward from Arsenal Island to the Water Works, a distance of about ten miles, on the river front; and from the Insane Asylum on the southwest to the Cemeteries on the northwest.

Every foot of the vast territory within these limits has been carefully examined and topographically drawn in perspective, by Mr. C. N. Dry and his assistants, and the faithfulness and accuracy with which this work has been done an examination of the pages will attest. Absolute truth and accuracy in the representation of the territory has been the standard and in no cases have additions or alterations been made unless the same were actually in course of construction. In a few cases, important public and private edifices that are not yet finished are shown completed, and as they will appear when done.

All the buildings within the limits of the survey in July, 1875, are shown; and a very large number of those executed or commenced since that date have been also introduced, the pages having been constantly corrected up to the last possible moment before publication.

ANNOUNCEMENTS, APPOINTMENTS, **PROCLAMATIONS & RECOGNITIONS**

Appointment - Board of Adjustment

Mayor Dimmitt shared information and recommendation for Don Keeling to become a member of the board of Adjustment (See information in BoardDocs).

Motion was made by Alderman Gould and seconded by Alderman Lochmoeller to accept the recommendation to appoint Don Keeling to the Board of Adjustment.

Motion carried by unanimous voice vote.

Metrolink Security Presentation

Kevin Scott, General Manger for Security of Bi-State (since 2019) d/b/a Metro Transit, presented overview of project for Bi-State Development - a Security Assessment for Metrolink (Power Point presentation Available in BoardDocs). He noted some historical background information - (Cordell Whitlock with Bi-State was present as well).

In 2019 Bi-State did a security study specific to Metrolink (Ridership and safety declining since 2018) - Phase 1 - included six areas for review including Security strategy and security staffing, Training regarding Fares and Fare enforcement, Technology, and Crime prevention design. There were 99 recommendations made for comprehensive safety program for overall transit system.

From this came a blueprint for success for moving forward. Many completed, but many require capital funding.

Currently working on the Metrolink Secure Platform plan - this moves plan from open concept to gated secure platform system. (In process now.) Includes updated and increased digital-real time cameras, new gating system, retro fitting platforms with new equipment, and the purchase and installation of new fare collection system. Hope to take all 38 platforms to final design. Adding one additional platform for total 39.

Funding estimate is \$52 Mill. project. Monies to come from Bond refinancing, Illinois Federal stimulus, Bi-State Development capital and American Recovery Plan, and Private sector (which has been secured).

Starting with a phased approach. "Pilot" program of 4 platforms and the gating system -- all will be in Illinois. Allows for learning of system and operation. They will staff these locations until the fare collection system goes online. They will be starting bid process for construction in August of this year. When final design for construction starts (end of the year) then will begin bid process for next phase.

Last component is the Implementation of a Mental Health employment program for services.

Alderman Lochmoeller inquired if the platform design received input/support from Local Police Depts.? Mr. Scott indicated that yes, when they enter into final design phase for construction they will be reaching out to all agencies, and for sure Brentwood Police for the platform in Brentwood.

Alderman Gould inquired about the camera systems and accessibility if needed in local municipalities. Mr. Scott noted that the feed is real-time and live to their system and St. Louis County real time camera center so can be utilized by local agencies if needed.

Alderman Wegge inquired if there would still be two "entry points" (both sides) to platform and Mr. Scott indicated that the gating system would enable entry from both sides on the Brentwood platform.

PUBLIC HEARING

Public Hearing for a New Conditional Use Permit for a Hair Salon and Massage Studio at 9012 Manchester Road

Mayor Dimmitt gavel opened the hearing. Whitney Kelly presented information and introduced Mary Merriweather who is one of the individuals operating the massage studio.

Whitney noted property is under a half-acre and requires a conditional use permit. There is sufficient parking on site. Planning and Zoning approved conditional use by vote of 5 to 0. Mary noted this will be run by her and her daughter (Both in businesses over 20+ years each).

Mayor Dimmit Gavel closed the hearing.

Public Hearing for a Text Amendment Amending Section 400.1870(B) Of The Zoning Code Relating To Corner Lots In The A And B Single Family Residential Zoning Districts To Allow For A Reduction In The Side Yard Setback For Those Properties Along A Minor Arterial Roadway To Allow For A Detached Garage Accessory Structure Per Certain Conditions.

Mayor Dimmitt gavel opened the hearing. Whitney Kelly presented the information regarding properties with frontage on McKnight but not direct access from McKnight. This allows them to use their side-yard with setbacks for garage. Planning and Zoning Commission recommended approval.

Mayor Dimmit Gavel closed the hearing.

MAYOR AND ALDERMEN REPORTS

Mayor David Dimmitt - offered thanks to Alderman Plufka for taking the reins of the last meeting while he attended a legislative conference in Jefferson City. He was helping to address public safety and sales tax issues.

Regarding public safety –and how how St. Louis County deals with juveniles (17 yrs and under) and the State's point system and formula for crimes/offenses by a minor (went into effect January 2022) – A certain number of points is required before an officer can take a juvenile into custody, but some jurisdictions don't interpret and add the points the same way. So they are trying to get that fixed with an amendment to be consistent with the points system offenses and the ability to hold juveniles for prosecution, as opposed to taking them back to their parents. Also, currently it is not illegal for a minor to be in possession of a gun. (A provision was introduced in a bill to make this illegal, but it was stripped out of the Bill) This makes it very difficult for law enforcement in St. Louis.

The other item was regarding sales tax - a Bill that has been introduced to exclude sales tax on food items. (That would be ok if it was limited only to the state, but some representatives want to apply this to the local governments as well.) This would have a significant impact on Brentwood if passed. We will see a 15% decrease in revenue in 2023. That is devastating as we rely on that money. We made decisions based on this income (i.e., Brentwood Bound - COP's) We would have to cut back significantly on services to cover that debt or institute other taxes (like real estate tax). Senate hopes to slow down this Bill to review the detrimental effect on municipalities.

Also, we had a clean-up last year along Eager and Hwy 40 – and it's in need of clean-up again. Charlie Brennan is heading this up on Friday, March 31st for about an hour or so, and we encourage all to come and participate.

Alderman David Plufka - Ward 1- shared his appreciation for the efforts and great leadership of Mayor Dimmitt. He hopes his work helps turn the tide on these issues. He also wished the Mayor a Happy Birthday.

Alderwoman Nancy Parker Tice – Echoed the Birthday Wishes and thanks to the mayor. She announced the Ward 1 meeting date change - to be held Wednesday, March 8th at Community Center at 6:30.

Alderman Brandon Wegge - Ward 2 - Thanked the Board for the sponsorship/fee waiver of the

P.T.O Ice-skate Mixer this past weekend. It was well attended. Happy Birthday wishes as well to the mayor.

Alderwoman Sunny Sims - Ward 2 - Echoed the Birthday wishes and work in Jefferson City. Alderman Steve Lochmoeller - Ward 3 - Ditto to these

wishes as well.

Alderman Jeff Gould - Ward 3 – Also echoed the wishes and announced that the Ward 3 meeting also had a date change – and is now to be held Wednesday, March 29h at Recreation Center at 6:30.

Alderwoman Kathy O'Neill - Ward 4 – offered a Library report, stating that the library is now a passport acceptance agency. Also, they have acquired 8 new computers (5 for public, 3 for staff) thanks to federal grants from the Institute of Museum and Library Services through the state library

services.

Alderman Jack Shelton - Ward 4 - echoed the well-wishes shared by others.

CITY ADMINISTRATOR REPORT Brentwood Bound Update

Craig Schluter shared Birthday wishes to the mayor, and that the Brentwood Industrial Bridge is now open for use. He presented the regular Brentwood Bound financial update, noting there were no construction costs, some soft costs, and no property acquisition or additional funding sources to report. (Report available in BoardDocs).

Alderman Wegge asked if the tunnel will be open for use by June 3 – and Craig noted that he hopes so, but he has no control as this is a MODOT project.

Alderman Wegge also inquired about the GRG connector being done as well – and Craig said this will not be done in June. There are many steps to still complete on this as well. What will be completed is the Brentwood Park – Phase one and two -33 acres.

NEW BUSINESS

Bill No. 6449 - An Ordinance Authorizing Amending Section 400.1870 Regarding Yard Requirements For Certain Corner Lots In The "A" And "B" Zoning Districts - First and Second Reading

First Reading by City Attorney.

Alderman Lochmoeller asked Director Kelly for clarification on A& B zoned areas, and then why they did not just go for a variance on this? Alderman Plufka answered stating that most properties there don't comply with the ordinance, so it seemed a better practice to amend the ordinance.

Keeps future property owners from having to go through the variance process.

The purpose for the setbacks on corner lots is for aesthetics and for safety, but on McKnight road it's a bit different, thus the new ordinance for this road specific.

Motion made by Alderman Plufka and seconded by Alderwoman Tice for 2nd Reading of Bill. Motion carried by unanimous voice vote.

Chief Spiess presented information noting this is a renewal of the contract to house inmates. The cost of detention is still \$50.00 a day, but that the cost to house inmate at the Justice Center requiring infirmary care has increased to \$300 per day. Alderman Wegge noted that there is a typo for one of the items -210.1330 – should be 215.1330 City Administrator noted the change and will have this corrected.







- Put the detector back on the wall or ceiling if it is less than 10 years old.

Additional safety tips:

- A closed door may slow the spread of smoke, heat and fire.
- Test smoke alarms at least once a month by pushing the test button.
- Install smoke alarms in every bedroom, outside each separate sleeping area, and on every level of the home, including the basement. Larger homes may need more alarms. For the best protection, make sure all smoke alarms are interconnected; when one sounds, they all sound.

When the smoke alarm sounds:

If the smoke alarm sounds, get outside and stay outside. Go to your outside meeting place.

Call the fire department (911) from a cellphone or a neighbor's phone. Stay outside until the fire department says it's safe to go back inside.

The Brentwood Fire Department wants to keep everyone safe. Please call 314.963.8612 if you need assistance checking your smoke detector or replacing your smoke detector battery. Always call 911 in the event of a fire or emergency.

Responsible Recycling: Stick with the Six

Know what to put in the recycling bin and what to leave out of the recycling bin.

DO add to the Recycling Bin:

Paper

Flattened Cardboard

Plastic Bottles and Containers

Glass Bottles and Jars

Metal Food and Beverage Cans

Food and Beverage Cartons

Keep these items loose (not bagged), clean and dry. Place these in your recycling container; do NOT place recyclable items in a trash bag or plastic bag.

RECYCLING TIPS

Labels may remain on cans and bottles.

Glass is usually broken during collection or transit, so the lids may be on or off the bottles.

Metal lids may remain with metal cans or be separated, since magnets collect the steel products.

Recycling centers prefer that you leave the plastic cap on a plastic bottle so that the caps do not fall out of the conveyor system.

We'll continue to send other public safety notifications, such as road closures or specific emergency situations, through the CodeRED system.



Springfield, Illinois...Historic Dining

My father's family lived in Springfield, and I lived there for two years as well. Many of my favorite restaurants are still there.

Springfield has long been known as a no-man's land for the Chicago and St. Louis crime families, and has been their retirement place for years. There are many State politicians living there as well. You will find any, and all types of dining at any price range you want. Springfield is a great place to dine.

Many cities are known for a unique food item. Cincinnati has its version of chili. St. Louis is known for our toasted rav's, Imo's pizza, and Ted Drewe's frozen custard.

Springfield is famous for the Horse Shoe sandwich, and the Cozy Dog. These are legendary Springfield food items and we indulged ourselves with both.

The Signature Horseshoe Sandwich was created in 1928 at the Old Leland Hotel by Joe Schweska. He was in need of a new lunch item for the Hotel Restaurant.

As the story goes, Joe came home to wife, Elizabeth, who had recently seen a recipe incorporating a cheese sauce (Welsh Rarebit) and suggested using the blend in an open-faced sandwich. Evidently, Joe liked that idea, because he got right to work developing his own recipe for the sauce using a sharp white cheddar.



His original recipe featured a piece of toast topped with a slab of ham cut from the bone in the shape of a horseshoe and a potato sliced into eight wedges to create the "nails" of the shoe, on a sizzling platter to represent the hot anvil. .

A Horse Shoe sandwich is made with two pieces of toast, your protein of choice, french fries and cheese sauce. A Pony Shoe is served with only one piece of toast and ingredients.

Besides the original ham protein, you may now order almost any protein you like, including hamburger, pork tenderloin, bison burger, lamb, Angus beef, pulled pork, Buffalo chicken, turkey, shrimp, veggie burger, Italian beef, and more, all of which is piled high with french fries, and drenched with the restaurant's respective signature cheese sauce.

We dined at Obed & Isaac's Microbrewery and Eatery in the classic three-story Boothe-Gruundike mansion. The brewery is in a separate house next door, and



their 7th Street Cidery is in a house next to that. There is also a nice patio area between the restaurant and brewery.

Our server, Dan, treated us like old friends. He was great. I had a ham pony shoe, Sue had a Reuben with a side of potato salad, A warm gooey butter cake with caramel sauce, and some bread pudding were an amazing finish for our meal.

Obed and Isaac's menu includes a wide variety of other items for your dining pleasure as well as a full service bar area. We highly recommend a visit, but make sure you come hungry! They also have great Sunday Brunch.

If you are not headed to Springfield you will now find that many St. Louis restaurants are serving horse shoe sandwiches, so give it a try.

The next day we had another Springfield tradition, Cozy Dogs. The signature dish of any Fair or festival is the hot dog on a stick. The corn dog on a stick was created by Ed Waldmire Jr.

while he was in the Air Force in Oklahoma. He found a hot dog baked into corn bread and loved it. The problem was it took too long to cook. Ed came up with the idea to coat the hot dog in a batter and deep fry it. When he came home to Springfield he invented, and patented, a special tool to hold up to six corn dogs on sticks and this made them much faster, and easier to fry.

He originally called them "Crusty Curs" but his wife didn't like that name and they settled on the now world famous name of "Cozy Dog"

In 1946 the Cozy Dog made its first appearance at the Illinois State Fair and in 1949 the Cozy Dog found its place in history at the Cozy Dog Drive In on Rt66. It is still there and you can have breakfast, lunch or dinner for about \$5.00!

When you visit the Cozy Dog Drive In you will also enjoy a huge collection of Rt66 memorabilia including the incredible Rt66 artwork of Bob Waldmire.. Burger Champ to Open in Maplewood

Chris Kelling and Adam Altnether, the ownership team at Elmwood, announced today that the 3-year-old Maplewood restaurant would be converted into Burger Champ (2704 Sutton), a 70-seat, fast casual, griddleburger-themed restaurant, which will open "Wednesday through Saturday night initially, from late lunch through dinner," according to Kelling, ideally in early summer.



Heimburger's Gooey Butter Cake

Yield: 9 servings

Ingredients

Crust:

1 cup all-purpose flour 3 Tbsp sugar 1/3 cup butter or margarine

Filling:

1 1/4 cups sugar 3/4 cup butter or margarine 1 egg 1 cup all-purpose flour 2/3 cup evaporated milk 1/4 cup light corn syrup 1 tsp vanilla

Preparation

Powdered sugar

Crust:

In mixing bowl, combine flour and sugar. Cut in butter until mixture resembles fine crumbs and starts to cling. Pat into the bottom and sides of a 9 x 9 x 2-inch greased baking pan.

In mixing bowl, beat sugar and butter or margarine until light and fluffy. Mix in egg until combined. Add alternately flour and evaporated milk, mixing after each addition. Add corn syrup and vanilla. Mix at medium speed until well blended.

Pour batter into crust-lined baking pan. Sprinkle with powered sugar. Bake at 350 degrees for 25 to 35 minutes or until cake is nearly set. Do not overcook. Cool in pan.

Heimburger Bakery was located at the corner of Baptist Church Road and South Lindbergh from October 1954 to September 1983. The bakery was known for its gooey butter cake.

Gooey butter cake originated in St. Louis in the 1930s. According to legend, a thrifty German baker added the wrong proportions of ingredients into his cake batter. It turned into a gooey, delicious mess.

Rock Hill Public Library Receives \$7,506 in Grants and Debuts New StoryWalk



Rock Hill Public Library recently received several grants via the Missouri State Library. Thanks to these grants, Rock Hill Public Library was able to purchase STEM kits, kickoff Summer Reading and install a new traveling StoryWalk in neighborhood parks.

The Library was awarded \$1,942 from the STEM Kits Grant for the purchase of STEM kits that incorporate classic stories with problem solving, math, and science challenges. Kits are currently available to be checked out by patrons and to be used for library programming.

Awarded \$2,522 from the Summer Library Program Grant in support of summer programs, a teen intern, craft supplies, and three performers: Will Stuck, who will be performing at the Summer Reading Kickoff on May 20th, the St. Louis Zoo, which will be presenting on June 14, and Babaloo at the Summer Wrap Party on August 2nd.

And also awarded \$3,042 through the Spotlight on Literacy Grant for the fabrication and support of a traveling StoryWalk in the City of Rock Hill. Stories will be changed out every two months as it moves from park to park.

"StoryWalks encourage literacy as well as an appreciation for the outdoors and our great local parks," Rock Hill Public Library Executive Director Erin Phelps said.

Rock Hill Public Library first opened its doors on June 4, 1944. Housed in two second-floor rooms of the historic Fairfax House, the library finally moved into its current home at 9811 Manchester Road in July of 2012. Rock Hill Public Library celebrated 77 years of service to the community in 2021.



2 DAYS WITH LINCOLN



There is a lot to do in Springfield, IL. I chose just 2 days of Abraham Lincoln's life in the plains.

LINCOLN'S NEW SALEM was where he spent his young years from 1831 to 1837 and a log village recreation of twenty-three historically furnished buildings. The village consists of log cabin homes, a tavern, schoolhouse and church, wool carding mill, general store, saw-and gristmill on the Sangamon River.

Other buildings include Onstot Cooperage where barrels, buckets, butter churns and wash tubs. At night young Lincoln would study his law books by the fire inside. Lincoln didn't have a home of his own; instead he would do chores for others in exchange for lodging. Peter Lukens was a cobbler, making and repairing shoes; Clary's Grocery sold liquor and ran a ferry.

Dr. Regnier used his home as an office and later moved to Petersburg. Lincoln was appointed Postmaster in 1833. Samuel Hill built the carding mill in 1835, it was a three man and two oxen operation. The oxen stood on the inclined wheel under the rear of the mill. The process was used to straighten and untangle wool fibers. There was also a blacksmith shop and a hatter.

The village is open 9 - 5pm May through October. April through November, Tuesday through Sunday, 9:00 - 4pm. Except holidays. Donations are accepted.

The next step in Lincoln's life covered his political career and his moves to Kentucky and Springfield.
