SAINT LOUIS ZOO BEGINS VACCINATING ITS AT-RISK ANIMALS AGAINST COVID-19

Safety and well-being of the animals is paramount

The Saint Louis Zoo has vaccinated its first animal against COVID-19, a move to protect the health and well-being of its most at-risk animals from the deadly virus. Male chimpanzee "Jimiyu" (pronounced Jimmy-you) received his first dose of Zoetis' (pronounced zoe-EYE-tess) COVID-19 vaccine, which has been authorized for use on animals on a case-by-case, experimental basis.

On Wednesday morning, Sept. 29, the 29-year-old chimpanzee received the COVID-19 vaccine and other vaccines during a regularly scheduled veterinary exam that included cardiac and dental checkups under anesthesia at the Endangered Species Research and Veterinary Hospital at the Zoo. Jimiyu is recovering well in a private area at the Jungle of the Apes habitat. No adverse side effects are expected, according to Zoo veterinarians. As with all veterinary procedures and vaccinations, the chimpanzee will be monitored by the experienced animal care teams.

Over the next few months, the Zoo plans to administer the two-dose COVID-19 vaccine in a staged roll-out to almost 100 primates, big cats, river otters, painted dogs and bat-eared foxes, all of which carry a potential risk of being infected by SARS-CoV-2, the virus that causes COVID-19 disease. Doses are given three weeks apart and full vaccination is reached two weeks after the second dose.

"Preventive health is most of what we do here," said Sathya Chinnadurai (pronounced SAHTH-ya chin-ah-DURE-ay), DVM, Director of Animal Health, Saint Louis Zoo. "We really believe in keeping our animals healthy, not just treating them when they are sick. Vaccines are nothing new for us. As with every vaccine we administer, we first determine risk of exposure, risk of illness from the disease and potential vaccine side-effects. With cases of coronavirus infection coming up in zoos around the country, we are lucky to be able to give this vaccine to our at-risk patients."

"We are very fortunate to partner with Zoetis and have access to this vaccine as an added layer of protection to keep our animals healthy," said Luis Padilla (pronounced Loo-EECE Paa-DEE-yaa), DVM, Vice President of Animal Collections, Saint Louis Zoo. "Throughout the pandemic, no animal has tested positive for COVID-19 at the Saint Louis Zoo. We have relied on biosecurity and PPE best practices for animal safety, and as we welcome this animal vaccine, we will continue to emphasize that prioritizing the health of our staff remains the best tool to keep our animals healthy.

"Many of the recently recognized emerging diseases share a connection between humans and animals. Now more than ever, it is important that we recognize that the health of humans, animals and the environment are interconnected and dependent on each other," said Padilla.

Administering Vaccine

Animals at the Saint Louis Zoo receive daily, year-round care from teams of professional animal care experts, including keepers, nutritionists, veterinarians, behavioral researchers and others. Preventive medical care, such as vaccination against disease, blood tests, radiographs, nail trims, dental cleaning and more, are essential to ensure the best quality of life for the animals.

Many animals voluntarily participate in their own healthcare through extensive, positive reinforcement training by keepers. Some animals are trained to accept vaccines by hand-injection in the comfort and safety of their own habitat. Training typically starts with a placebo when the animal is younger and becomes part of their routine care. When they are old enough, the placebo is replaced with the vaccine. This training allows the Zoo to have a very comprehensive immunization program with voluntary participation of the animals.

Other animals may receive necessary vaccines during wellness exams under anesthesia at the Zoo Veterinary Hospital.

"We are in regular communication with zoo veterinarians around the country to share information about vaccine administration, side effects and positive cases," said Chinnadurai. "Disease transmission from humans to animals and from animals to humans is common and not new. Vaccination and PPE, like masking, is important to limit the spread of many diseases. We have always practiced routine PPE usage with primates and other species."

Cardinal Ritter Senior Services Announces Memory Care Facility Expansion

One of St. Louis' largest senior living communities to build \$6.9 million dementia care neighborhoods

Cardinal Ritter Senior Services – South County's largest independent and assisted living nonprofit community – recently announced it will break ground this December on a new Mother of Perpetual Help (MOPH) memory care community expansion with a completion date set for December 2022. The \$6.9 million, 17,886-square-foot development will have two



separated homelike neighborhoods of 13 residents each for a total of 26 residents. A total of 21 additional staff members will be hired to serve the community.

Both residential-style neighborhoods, which will be attached to the existing MOPH community, will have their own front door to reduce foot traffic and aid in infection control procedures, such as virus transmission to its residents. Each neighborhood will have elements of a real home that include central living space consisting of an open kitchen, family dining area, and a recreational room for activities. A spacious lounge, complete with a double-sided fireplace and large screen television, will be used for resident socializing and family visits.

Cardinal Ritter Senior Services (CRSS) currently has three memory care communities – Grace, Hope, and Faith – that serve 66 senior adults. Located within the assisted living and skilled nursing communities, CRSS provides specialized care for seniors living with memory loss caused by Alzheimer's disease or other forms of dementia.

The expansion project differs from more medically intense dementia care programs. The safe and secure care community will offer expert 24/7 care in a homelike setting. Features include a natural environment with cutting-edge technology to help mitigate the effects of "sundowning," a state of increased confusion and restlessness for those with dementia which begins or worsens as daylight starts to fade.

Residents will have a 336-square-foot private room complete with their own locked memory box to display meaningful keepsakes. The boxes will be located at their door off the community's hallway to assist with wayfinding back to their own room. The neighborhood setting includes mass and religious services, engaging activities for individual and group life, professional therapy services, and a salon.

"There are currently five million people living with age-related dementia in the US, so it is absolutely critical that we recognize these trends on a local level," said Cardinal Ritter Senior Services' CEO Chris Baechle. "Each and every senior adult deserves quality, personalized care. Our innovative expansion will cater to our community's growing need by providing specialized programs that exclusively serve senior adults with memory loss."

Founded in 1961, Cardinal Ritter Senior Services (CRSS) creates communities that promote the dignity of human life and reflect the spirit of Jesus Christ. The community's nearly 7,000 seniors – with 72% of the 2,500 directly served lacking adequate resources – benefit from housing options including independent or assisted living, memory care, affordable apartments, and skilled nursing communities. In addition to its main Shrewsbury campus located at 7601 Watson Rd., the nonprofit has 10 affordable HUD total apartment communities throughout the St. Louis Metropolitan area and a robust social services department. 





Seeking Architectural Review Board Candidates

The City of Brentwood is seeking new members to serve on the Architectural Review Board.

The Architectural Review Board (ARB) ensures residential construction and renovation activities are of high quality design and materials and in general conformity with the style and design of surrounding

structures. The ARB conducts design and material reviews of additions, alterations, and improvements to existing residential structures, and will also review the design, material, and compatibility of new residential construction. Decks, fences, window replacements and roofing shingle replacements for all existing homes are currently exempt from review by the Architectural Review Board.

The ARB includes three regular members who must be Brentwood residents and licensed architects. The members are appointed for two-year terms by the Mayor with approval of the Board of Aldermen. The ARB meets at 7 pm on the third Thursday of the month.

Brentwood residents interested in serving on the Architectural Review Board may apply using the Volunteer Interest Form on the City of Brentwood website, www.brentwoodmo.org.

Responsible Recycling: Stick with the Six

Know what to put in the recycling bin and what to leave out of the recycling bin.

DO Add to the Recycling Bin: Paper Flattened Cardboard Plastic Bottles and Containers Glass Bottles and Jars Metal Food and Beverage Cans

Food and Beverage Cartons

Keep these items loose (not bagged), clean and dry. Place these in your recycling container; do NOT place recyclable items in a trash bag or plastic bag.

RECYCLING TIPS

Labels may remain on cans and bottles.

Glass is usually broken during collection or transit, so the lids may be on or off the bottles.

Metal lids may remain with metal cans or be separated, since magnets collect the steel products.

Recycling centers prefer that you leave the plastic cap on a plastic bottle so that the caps do not fall out of the conveyor system.

To activate the Weather Warning Alert options, you'll need to register for CodeRED again.

To activate these severe weather warnings, please visit Brentwood's CodeRED enrollment page by

clicking on the "Brentwood CodeRED" icon on the home

page of www.brentwoodmo.org. You also can text WARNME to 99411 from your mobile phone.

Enter a cell phone number, landline number and/or email address and select the types of weather warnings you wish to receive. There is no charge to residents or businesses for this service.

If you have not previously signed up for CodeRED notifications, you may do so at any time by clicking on the "Brentwood CodeRED" icon on the home page of www. brentwoodmo.org.

We'll continue to send other public safety notifications, such as road closures or specific emergency situations, through the CodeRED system.

The City of Brentwood CodeRED Assistance Line is 314.963.6710. Please leave your name and phone number, and a staff member will return your call as soon as possible.

Report a Concern

The Saint Louis Zoo has named Dwight Scott its next Dana Brown President & CEO, succeeding Jeffrey P. Bonner, Ph.D., who will retire from that position at the end of the year after leading the organization for nearly two decades.

Scott will assume the position on January 3, 2022. Dr. Bonner will continue to serve in an advisory role for the Zoo.

"We conducted an extremely thorough international search to find the next great leader for the Saint Louis Zoo," said Cynthia J. Brinkley, Chair, St. Louis Zoological Park Subdistrict Commission.

In fall 2020, a search committee comprised of St. Louis Zoological Park Subdistrict Commissioners, members of the Saint Louis Zoo Association Board of Directors, and St. Louis community leaders was formed to select the next Dana Brown President & CEO. Winthrop B. Reed, III, Immediate Past Chair, St. Louis Zoological Park Subdistrict Commission, led the search committee. The committee engaged Shelli Herman & Associates, Inc. as the lead executive search firm to help guide the committee through the process and the international search. The search committee also was supported by a committee of former Saint Louis Zoo Association Presidents and St. Louis Zoological Park Subdistrict Commission Chairpersons.

Together, the search firm and the committee received and reviewed applications over the spring and conducted preliminary interviews during the summer months. The search committee narrowed the list of candidates down to a tremendous group of finalists and the search committee, former Saint Louis Zoo Association Presidents, former St. Louis Zoological Park Subdistrict Commission Chairpersons, and the Zoo's Strategic Operations Team met with the finalists in September.

"Dwight Scott rose to the very top of our list," said Brinkley. "Not only does he bring nearly 30 years of zoo experience to his new role, but he also brings his determined and contagious passion for wildlife conservation and believes that diversity, equity, accessibility and inclusion programs are critical to organizational and community development."

Since December 2013, Scott has been the Executive Director of San Diego Zoo. In that role, he has been responsible for all aspects of operating the San Diego Zoo. He has overseen the daily operations of all departments related to the 100-acre facility, including admissions, transportation, education, food service, retail, facilities, wildlife care, horticulture, and special events.

Scott brings diverse experience with accredited zoos to his position. He started his zoo career in 1994 as an Animal Keeper at Kansas City Zoological Gardens. He then became part of the animal management team that helped build and create Disney's Animal Kingdom. After his time at Disney, Dwight went to Oklahoma City Zoological Park and Botanical Garden, where he went from Assistant Curator of Mammals to Curator of Mammals to Director of Animal Management. Dwight then went to Tulsa Zoo & Living Museum where he was Assistant Director. He then went back to Oklahoma to become their Executive Director & CEO. After Oklahoma, Dwight went to San Diego Zoo to become their Executive Director.

Scott was born and raised in Chillicothe, Missouri, which is approximately 230 miles northwest of St. Louis and 90 miles northeast of Kansas City.

"Growing up in Missouri, I was inspired by visits to the Saint Louis Zoo," said Scott. "I look forward to taking the Saint Louis Zoo to new heights just as Dr. Bonner, Charlie Hoessle, Marlin Perkins, George Vierheller and all the past leaders of this world-class organization have done over the years. The Saint Louis Zoo has and always will lead the way in conserving animals and their habitats through animal management, research, recreation and educational programs. I can't wait to get started."

Scott recognizes the important role that urban zoos play in ensuring that wildlife and nature are accessible to all children. At San Diego Zoo, he led the effort to improve and expand animal habitats with an eye toward building an appreciation for wildlife in all guests while also addressing the needs of Species Survival Plan® programs managed by the Association of Zoos and Aquariums (AZA). Scott also has taken a leadership role in the fight against wildlife trafficking, working with the Wildlife Trafficking Alliance on behalf of San Diego Zoo Wildlife Alliance.

Scott and his wife, Kathy, a native of St. Louis, have two daughters.

The expertise in the industry is not required there. Concerns from some Aldermen are that this expertise is valuable and that we will have to be cognizant of who is selected to serve on this Board.

It was asked if ARB was aware and/or open to the suggested change. Bola said she did not know if they were aware of the suggestion to reconstitute but are aware of the difficulty to get a quorum, and that it had been discussed at one time when previous Planning Director was here.

It was asked if there was a sense of urgency for this. Bola responded that the sense of urgency to amend the ordinance was because of a recent ARB meeting, the group was unable to meet quorum. The request has also been made to seek new members and only one has applied, who is not yet a resident – so it may be difficult to find people to serve.

Alderman Wegge suggested we hold on 2nd Reading for more outreach to be done on membership requirements and input from ARB Board. Alderwoman O'Neill agrees.

RESTAURANT REVIEWS

The "ONE" Steakhouse

While visiting Las Vegas for an international travel conference, we had the opportunity to visit the ONE Steakhouse in the new Virgin Hotel. While this is a relatively new restaurant, it comes with a pedigree that spans three generations.

Morton Steakhouses have been well known for years. Brothers David and Michael Morton have spent their lives in, and around, their father, Arnie Morton's restaurants. They have combined their experiences and talents to open the One steakhouse.

You enter the One Steakhouse through a bar lounge that opens onto the casino floor. From there you go into the dining room built for gorgeous and memorable dinners. The upper level offers a social setting to mingle and take in sporting events on an LED video wall with the same service and flavors.

The dining room is finished in dark wood paneled walls, and ceiling, I was expecting white linen service, but the dark wood tables, a nod to the old supper clubs was fine. Unfortunately there was no relish tray. But I am sure if I asked for one it would have magically appeared.

We were served by Marty, a very knowledgeable gentleman that perfectly represented the service one would expect from a restaurant of this caliber. He was attentive but not overbearing and when asked a question, his advice was spot-on.

We were joined by another couple that attended the convention and we looked forward to an evening of great food and conversation. More on that later.

Our meal began with homemade bread rolls with a crispy cheese base. A Caeser salad and a house salad with grilled shrimp hit their marks.

One appetizer that is rarely seen on menus anymore is Steak Tartare. I had to try it. This was not the usual raw ground beef. This was filet mi-



gnon cut into tiny cubes served with crispy capers, grilled sourdough, Pommery mustard vinaigrette and a quail egg. It was absolute perfection!

Sue had fried calamari, again delicious. Our guests had a shrimp cocktail and maple glazed bacon. The shrimp were large and the bacon was thick and tasty.

Our friends, and Sue, had small fillets that were prepared as ordered. I went for the domestic Snake River wagyu beef strip steak. Side dishes included potato gnocchi, maitake mushrooms with warm goat cheese, and creamed corn with king crab a roasted poblano peppers. The mushrooms and creamed corn were absolutely phenominal. Don't miss out on these. All the side dishes were very large portions and well worth the price. Two people could easily have

shared any of them.

The filet steaks were so tender you literally could cut them with a fork.

The wagyu strip











steak was another story. It was serve medium rare, as ordered. Per their advertising, their steaks are grilled at 1200 degrees. Unfortunately, the crust on the outside of my steak made it difficult to cut, even with a steak knife and the flavor was lacking.. At the price of \$69 for a 6oz steak, I was not impressed.

Once again, in the interest of culinary journalism, we ordered desserts. The size, and quality, quickly redeemed the evening. Sue had the vanilla creme broulee with seasonal berries, and lemon Madeleines. I have never tasted better.

Our dining companions split a raspberry lemon baked Alaska made with raspberry sorbet, lemon ice cream, almond sponge, berry sauce, fresh raspberries, and lemon meringue. Once again, superb and



more than enough to two. After reading online revues, I went for the carrot cake. It was a mile-high layered cake with cream cheese icing throughout, and on top, with roasted pineapple crowning it all.

All-in-all it was a good meal. My main complaint was the noise level. I think part of the problem is the hardwood walls along with no acoustic treatment on the ceiling leading to a lot of reflected sounds in the room. There were six young men on the other side of the dining room that spent the entire evening yelling at each other. It was impossible to carry on a conversation at our table. They, and we, were the only people in the dining room and I was surprised that management didn't ask them to tone it down.

The wine menu is excellent. Wine by the glass averages \$13 to \$16 per glass, after all, it is Las Vegas. Bottled wines average \$50 to \$60, up to \$1800 per bottle.

If you and your friends are ready for a feast you might try the Tomahawk Feast. This is a dry-aged 16-lb prime tomahawk steak, carved table side and six sides. This requires a 72 hour advance reservation and serves ten to twelve people. \$1200 and it's yours. But for \$100per person it really isn't that bad a deal.

Total cost \$506.00 for four persons. All-in-all it was a good meal, the service was above average and the atmosphere left a lot to be desired.



CELESTYAL CRUISES-IDYLLIC AEGEAN ANCIENT GREECE

Due to the Covid-19 Virus there wasn't a lot of traveling going on for the last year. Once travel started opening up we couldn't wait to go to Greece. We had all our necessary Covid-19 innoculations. Precautions were taken with proper handwashing, wearing face masks and proper distance between other people.

Onboard our temperatures were taken daily.

We flew AA out of Chicago O'Hare Airport and met up with our group in Athens.

Seating on the flights were kept at the specified "safe" distance. We stayed at the Grand Hyatt in Athens and met up with the rest of our group to be taken to our ship.

Our first stop was the island of Patmos. This was the home to the Grotto of the Apocalypse. I remember in school studying about Rhodes. The Colossus of Rhodes is one of the Seven Wonders of the ancient world. The island was also framed in antiquity as a cultural center. In Greek mythology the name of the island is derived from the nymph Rhodos who bore seven sons to the sun god Helios, the patron of the island. The island came under Persian rule in 490BCE. The next foreign power to take over was Alexander the Great. The statue stood at the harbor entrance, but was toppled in 226 or 228BCE by an earthquake.

The most important archaeological site on the island is at Lindus. There are remains of temples, city walls, a stadium and harbor constructions. The white cube-shaped houses with flat roofs, a splash of color with magenta flowers trailing the doorways. The narrow alleys have pebble-stones dotting the landscape.

Rhodes has been called an island of contrasts, a crossroad of people and civilizations. It is thought to be one of the islands important sites and has been proclaimed a UNESCO world heritage site. There are medieval castles, statues, ancient walls, houses in folk architecture, Ottoman minarets, architecture styles dating from Byzantinne to modern. There are Orthodox churches and Gothic belfries.

The 226BC earthquake knocked Colossus to his knees. The Rhodians fearing a curse didn't set him back up, so he remained a big pile. 900 camels were needed to transport all the pieces.




























