A New Local Service to Assist with Downsizing While Reducing Environmental Impacts

There is a new service business in St. Louis: Dynamic Duo Downsizing and Estate Services, started by Kathy LeDuc and Laura Neuman-Howe. These sisters will help people manage their belongings – whether the individual is downsizing, "right sizing" or moving into assisted living. They also help families who are clearing out a home after someone has passed away.

The process of reducing one's belongings or emptying out a home can be time consuming and exhausting -- emotionally and physically. The Duo's goal is to simplify things for the person who is moving and help with family communications, all while reducing the environmental impact of the process. The pair is somewhat different from other organizers or packers. They listen closely to their clients, and thin the belongings as directed. They also offer a range of tools to help family members share information and decide who is to get what. On-line photos and meetings can help the family can save time and money, while gaining peace of mind.

The Dynamic Duo has this philosophy: approach each job with ESP, meaning that their services are: Ecofriendly, Supportive & Practical.

Depending on the needs of their clients, they can put photos on a private webpage where family members can view, comment on, "tell a story" about items, or even "vote" or "bid" on who gets what. We can conduct an on-line conference to work through things. If family dynamics require them, there are several more options. The Duo can set up to help the family, or the executor, inventory and negotiate distribution of items on a more emotionally neutral platform. After approval from the estate's executor, the Duo can then make the necessary arrangements to ship the items to the recipients.

Last year the pandemic stopped the Mosaics Fine Art Festival from happening. This year the 26th annual outdoor event is set, taking place along several blocks of North Main St. in Historic St. Charles, Mo.

The Mosaics Fine Art Festival is a nonprofit organization that showcases local and regional artists while educating the community's children and adults in how art can enhance their lives. The festival features a wide array of artwork produced by a mix of emerging, mid-career and established artists in all media.

Here are the details:

- The family-friendly event which is free and open to the public will be held Fri., Sept. 17 from 4 to 9 p.m., Sat., Sept. 18 from 11 a.m. to 9 p.m., and Sun., Sept. 19 from 11 a.m. to 5 p.m.
- · 82 juried artists from more than 15 states will exhibit artwork available for purchase. Media categories include clay, drawing, glass, leather, metal, pastel, oil/acrylic, photography, printmaking, sculpture, watercolor, and wood. A total of \$5,000 will be awarded to the top 10 artists.
- The festival includes Art Shop for Kids, a kids-only gallery where children ages 14 and younger can buy professional artwork. Designed to foster art appreciation at a young age, all pieces are donated by participating festival artists and can be purchased for a nominal fee.
- The H. Robert Pank Memorial Entertainment Pavilion will showcase a variety of performing artists throughout the weekend including Buckhannon Brothers, Catfish Willie, 4th Street Band, Jerry & Cherry, Lamar Pilsing Standard Time, Second Gear Band, and St. Charles Big Band.

JFS St. Louis Receives \$25,000 from the Staenberg Family Foundation

Jewish Family Services (JFS) received a \$25,000 grant from the Staenberg Family Foundation. The funds will be used to support more than 150 Holocaust survivors and ensure they receive the assistance and support needed to stay healthy, safely age in place with dignity, and remain connected to their communities.

The Staenberg Family Foundation grant goes toward the partial funding of a new position. Case Manager Robyn Hutchins was hired to assist the St. Louis area's Holocaust survivors with applications for Claims Conference and The Blue Card survivor benefits. Founded in 2005, the Staenberg Family Foundation seeks to ensure that the Jewish community, as well as the greater St. Louis region, thrives and flourishes.

JFS focuses on supporting seniors in the Jewish community through a wide range of programs and services, including helping Holocaust survivors access benefits. The Claims Conference, which has provided care for Holocaust victims since 1951, supplies funds for in-home support services. The Blue Card offers direct financial assistance and support to Holocaust survivors with "hardship funds" that pay for minor medical services such as hearing aids and dental work.

"The Staenberg Family Foundation's support enables JFS to build relationships with more than 150 survivors in their ongoing quest to access designated funds and services," said JFS Chief Executive Officer Miriam Seidenfeld. "This very generous grant ensures that Holocaust survivors will receive the benefits they need and deserve to improve their quality of life, and we are truly grateful to the Foundation for its ongoing aid."

Founded in 1871, JFS is a multiservice nonprofit that supports families and seniors, alleviates hunger, and improves mental health for all St. Louisans. The organization serves individuals and families in crisis, as well as helps seniors remain independent and connected to the community. JFS – which supports the emotional and physical well-being of more than 50,000 area children, families, and seniors annually – provides hunger relief through its Harvey Kornblum Jewish Food Pantry (HKJFP). WGU Missouri Launches Scholarship for Adults Going Back to School This Fall

St. Louis Area Diaper Bank Partners with Rung for Women

The St. Louis Area Diaper Bank and its St. Louis Alliance for Period Supplies program recently partnered with Rung for Women to provide period supplies to its 100 members and the St. Louis community.

The St. Louis Alliance for Period Supplies (STL APS) ensures access to menstrual hygiene products, which allows full participation in daily life with dignity. To date more than 450,000 period supplies have been distributed in St. Louis, with 10,800 period supplies allocated each week. Last year two-thirds of low-income women in St. Louis could not afford menstrual hygiene products, with 46% of low-income women having to choose between food and period products.

Founded in 2019, STL APS is a Diaper Bank program that distributes period supplies through community partners, as well as advocates for the elimination of "period poverty". Established in 2018, Rung empowers women to achieve economic success, holistic well-being, and a joyful life. The nonprofit offers the space and resources required to create change in both women's careers and lives.



A Note from Major Hawkins Bureau of Community Policing Commander, Brentwood Police

As summer winds down, it's time to consider how we will adjust as a community to our normal...ish routines. Kids in school, headed to the office every day, etc. There are some very basic safety items that we can keep in mind as we go forward into a new school year.

We are blessed to have a close-knit community wherein our schools are in our neighborhoods. This means kids walk and ride their bikes to school and will be on the roads at times you may not be used to them. Keep an eye out, keep the phones down, and go slow! We are taking speed enforcement very seriously in our neighborhoods to best protect our citizens.



As we enter into fall, hopefully sooner than later, also keep in mind the basic recommendations from your local police department. Lock your car doors, lock your homes, keep valuables out of sight, and call 911 when you see suspicious activity - no matter the time of day! We are a 24/7 service ©

In the last month, your Brentwood Officers have identified three vehicles with suspects committing vehicle crimes and were able to

interrupt further criminal activity. We stand a better chance of locating more of these individuals when our community helps and calls on people or vehicles that are prowling the streets.

As I mentioned, our officers have ramped up their traffic enforcement efforts this calendar year and I'm pleased to say that trend In addition to increased enforcement, the Brentwood Police Department will be designating an officer as our Community Response Officer in mid-late November, 2021. This CRO will navigate traffic enforcement issues, liaise with local retail and commercial businesses, and be plugged into the fight against workplace violence.

In case any of you saw our officers out and about on August 31, you may have seen us handing out free beverage and you-pick-two coupons from St. Louis Bread Co. We were also passing out literature from Shayley's Angels, a non-profit aimed to increase mental health awareness and suicide prevention. Check out their website at shayleysangels.org.



For Cardinals' top prospect Nolan Gorman, it's been a season of adjustments, transitions

It was Cardinals pitching coach Mike Maddux who coined the phrase "elite adjusters" when he was discussing the way major-league players needed to overcome challenges if they wanted to find success on the field.

Maddux would be proud of the way that Nolan Gorman, the top prospect in the Cardinals' organization, has done exactly that this season.

If there is one word that sums up Gorman's year, it would be "adjusting."

Gorman's year began in early February with the news that the position he thought he would be playing in the major leagues for the Cardinals in the future, third base, the place where he had played for as long as he could remember, suddenly was occupied in St. Louis by Nolan Arenado, a perennial All-Star and Gold Glove winner.

So Gorman adjusted. Almost overnight, he started learning how to play second base. Seven months later, the reviews have been positive.

Of all of the opinions about how his season has gone defensively, Gorman's own view is perhaps the most relevant as he has come to enjoy the position.

"It's kind of just become normal for me," Gorman said. "The best thing I did was go down to spring training early with (Jose) Oquendo and learn as much as I could before any games started happening. He got me pretty comfortable with it right away. It's been good.

"I think the biggest difference is that at second you are in every play. At third base you've got a couple situations where you are in the play but at second you are in every play. You've got to stay ready the whole game and know where to be on cut plays, relays, bunts, different stuff like that, so I think that was the biggest adjustment, knowing where to be on every play.

"If there is a play I am confused about I will come in and talk with the coaches about it or guys who have played there for a longer time."

Defensive statistics, especially at the minor league level, don't always serve as an accurate measure of performance but in Gorman's case, they do reflect the progress that he has made at his new position.

In 16 games at second base in Double A Springfield, where Gorman began the season, he made four errors. In 38 games after his promotion to Triple A Memphis on June 28, Gorman committed only one error at his new position in 164 total chances. He has played only nine games at third in Triple A, illustrating the organization's commitment to him playing second base.

Gorman also has been able to learn about the defensive shifts which the Redbirds use on a routine basis, also getting him ready for how all of those plays work when he moves up to the major leagues.

"It's something we've done for a while now, it's just part of the game," said Gorman, who has shifted from third base into more of a normal second base position in the past. "Most guys are athletic enough to be able to make adjustments like that."

Gorman's defensive education will continue after the end of the regular season, when Gorman, 21, will be one of the players the Cardinals will be sending to the Arizona Fall League, the first time he will be able to play as a professional in front of his family and friends in the Phoenix area, where he grew up.

Playing in the Fall League also will allow Gorman to continue his offensive development, where he also had to make adjustments this season.

First, he had to adjust to hitting Double A pitching for the first time, after missing out on playing games in 2020 because of the canceled minor-league season. Then he had to learn how to handle the difference in pitching he was seeing at the Triple A level, making those adjustments as the same time he was concentrating on learning his new defensive position – while also being one of the youngest players at each level.

"The pitching is better at every level you go to," said Gorman. "There's a lot of adjusting that needs to happen. You've got to be able to learn how to do it quickly and be as consistent as possible from level to level.

"The first or second week of the season Tyger Pederson, who is the hitting coach at Springfield and who was my hitting coach at Palm Beach in 2019, told me that the 'biggest thing for you this year is going to be your mental game and staying strong.' That conversation got me into a good place of staying level-headed and being able to stay consistent as much as my game will let me."

Gary LaRocque, the Cardinals' director of player development, has a goal for every player in the organization – he wants them to get to the level of whatever league they are in, then surpass that level at some point during the season.

A look at Gorman's offensive success shows he has done exactly that this year.

In May, Gorman hit .274 with three home runs at Springfield, then in June, posted a .301 average with eight homers.

In July, his first month at Triple A, Gorman hit just .245. In August Gorman hit .316. He hit 11 homers at Springfield in 43 games and 10 in 52 games at Memphis.

"You are going to struggle sometimes but as long as you are mentally strong enough to go out every day and trust what you have and know your ability, you're in a good spot," Gorman said. "You have to go into every day with confidence."

What Gorman says has helped him mentally this year is being able to reach out to veterans on the Cardinals when he has questions. Players such as Paul Goldschmidt and Paul DeJong have become valuable resources for Gorman.

"They've been great," Gorman said. "They have been willing to talk to me about whatever questions I have. I've been fortunate to talk to them quite a bit."

Gorman also has sought out major-league players on opposing teams who have found themselves back in Triple A, either on rehab assignments or because of struggles at the higher level. Two of those recent conversations have been with Daniel Vogelbach and David Dahl.

"It's kind of cool to be able to talk to those guys," Gorman said. "I like to pick the brains of other people."

The player that Gorman probably confides in the most is his childhood friend, Matthew Liberatore. When they were growing up, they dreamed of the day they would be playing pro baseball as professionals, perhaps on the same team.

Those dreams came true this season, and the two have been rooming together in a rented house in Memphis.

"I will cook, he cleans sometimes," Gorman said. "It's kind of a mutual thing. I think our house is pretty clean for two guys. We've done a pretty good job. It's a nice house, we don't want to keep it dirty.

"We're pretty similar. We will go home and pick each other's brains about the game. We talked about doing that for a long time. It's been a good time."

Having the stability of being with someone he has known almost all his life has helped make all of Gorman's adjustments easier.

What's the next adjustment he needs to make?

"I think it's just consistency and being able to go out and repeat everything every day," Gorman said. "As far as hitting goes, it's having an approach and plan every day and sticking to that and not trying to make little adjustments all the time if one thing goes wrong during the game – being able to trust what I have and go in with a simple approach every day and not make the game harder than it already is."

There was a time, not that long ago, when Gorman struggled to do that.

"In 2019 I remember late in the season in the Florida State League I was kind of scrambling a little bit," Gorman said. "I was looking up different big leaguers to try to emulate their swing or their stance or something.

"Now it's just 'my swing', and I know what I want to do. It's just a matter of trusting in what I have."

Gorman's year began in early February with the news that the position he thought he would be playing in the major leagues for the Cardinals in the future, third base, the place where he had played for as long as he could remember, suddenly was occupied in St. Louis by Nolan Arenado, a perennial All-Star and Gold Glove winner.

"My family cares a lot about living sustainably, but it wasn't until our good friends got solar panels through Grow Solar that we actually seriously looked into solar power ourselves," said Lacy Cagle of St. Louis. "It was something we always thought would be out of our reach financially, but we also knew how impactful it could be."

The solar group-buy and education program launched with below market rate pricing. By reaching this third benchmark, participants receive a 1.5% rebate off their final price. Additional cost savings are in store if the group-buy collectively reaches 500 kW, 750 kW, 1,000 kW, and 1,250 kW benchmarks, potentially bringing the average cost down by 3.5%. Any savings thresholds reached after property owners sign on for solar are retroactively rebated to those owners. All of this is in addition to federal incentives that can cover 26% of the cost of going solar.

The first 25 people to refer to someone who signs a contract will receive \$500.

Through a competitive selection process, an advisory committee chose St. Louis-based StraightUp Solar as the program's solar installer. They offer high quality solar installations, certifications for solar work, and emphasize education and customer service. StraightUp Solar also has an excellent history in working in solar group buy programs, is familiar with the region, and was awarded a Top Workplaces 2021 honor by the St. Louis Post-Dispatch.



Tax Rate Hearing

Each September, Boards of Education throughout Missouri are required to set their district tax rate for the coming year. Superintendents work with the State Auditor and County Assessor to get the information they need to set the new tax rate. In compliance with Section 67.110 RSMo., a hearing will be held at 7:00 PM on September 21, 2021 at Brentwood Administration Center, 1201 Hanley Industrial Blvd., in the conference center, Brentwood, Missouri, at which time citizens may be heard on the property tax rates proposed to be set by the Brentwood School District.

The tax rates are set to produce the revenues which the budget for the fiscal year beginning July 1,2020, shows to be required from the property tax. Each tax rate is determined by dividing the amount of revenue permitted by the current assessed valuation by property classification. The result is multiplied by 100 so the tax rate will be expressed in cents per \$100 valuation.

Facilities Updates

If you missed our Community Update on Phase I & II facilities projects on August 31st, you can still view the event on our YouTube channel at bit.ly/bsdyoutube. In addition to updates about the McGrath and BECC project, the video provides a tour of the updated Middle and High School.

This summer, crews have been hard at work preparing the McGrath site for the new McGrath/BECC building. While it may not have looked very exciting so far, things are about to get a lot more interesting!

From the outside, you've mostly seen what just looks like dirt being moved around. But if you take a closer look, you'll see a lot of things happening underground.

About 1800 linear feet of pipes were installed. This new drainage system will allow the McGrath campus to hold a great deal of stormwater and runoff before slowly releasing the water into the MSD system. This will help prevent water runoff from causing any strain on the community and will help the entire neighborhood in the event of heavy rains!

With this preliminary work done, you can expect to see more progress – with signs of a building starting to come out of the ground – in the coming weeks and months. So far, construction teams have kept on schedule for this build and we are so excited to see more progress soon!

RESTAURANT REVIEWS

St. Louis's International Foosball Stadium, AKA The Schlafly Tap Room

I first met Tom Schlafly in 1991 while doing a report for Voice Of America Radio. Tom had just opened the Tap Room as one of the areas first brew pubs. He referred to it as "the world's smallest brewery in the shadow of the world's largest brewery" Tom was pushing the boundaries of entrepreneurship as he poked the giant bear of Anheuser-Busch.

What is the St. Louis International Foosball Stadium you ask. While researching his new project, Tom, with his background as a lawyer, found a possible conflict to his project. He found a city regulation that dated back to the era of "Blue Laws" in St. Louis. It seems that only sports stadiums were allowed to sell beer on Sunday, A-B apparently had good lobbyists. To avoid a problem, Tom installed a number of foosball tables on the 2nd floor of the Tap room and called it The St. louis International Foosball Stadium. Where there is a will, there is a way, potential problem solved.

Thirty years later, with soon to be four locations, Schlafly beers are available in 15 States. Schlafly beers have become a Midwest favorite. Along with great beer, they are known for great Pub Grub and food festivals. I have never had a bad meal at any of their locations.

I think of pub grub as the original comfort food. Plentiful servings of reasonably priced, hot, stick-to-your-bones items served with a cold brew of your choice in a comfortable, pleasant atmosphere. Schlafly's Tap Room hits all the marks.

I met four of my KMOX/KHTR friends for lunch at the Tap room and we were not disappointed. Our lunch items included beer cheese soup, french onion soup, A house salad with spring mix, bleu cheese, dried cranberries, sunflower seeds, and a house vinaigrette, a shaved prime rib sandwich with caramelized onions, horseradish cream, roasted garlic, and white cheddar, on a hoagie, and a pork tenderloin sandwich with red kraut. Everything was perfect as was thew service from our waiter.

No one had enough room to enjoy a dessert such as a Sticky Toffee Pudding; a date sponge cake, toffee caramel sauce, and house made whipped cream, or the Apple Pie Bread Pudding with a streusel crumb topping, caramel sauce, and vanilla ice cream.

Sue and I will be going back to the Tap room to try more items from their extensive menu. I want to try a salute to our neighbors of the Great White North, a Canadian favorite, Poutine, Tap Room Fries, grain mustard gravy, and cheese curds. Think of it a a "slinger" wann-be.

Two entrees that are on my list are their Sausages & Kraut a Hefeweizen brat, Chicago Polish and apple sausage, with German potato salad, caraway and beer mustard, and a Jagerschnitzel, a crisp pork loin cutlet, rich mushroom-bacon sauce, and mashed potatoes.

The dining options at the Tap Room are too many to list in this article, but suffice it to say, there is something for everyone including vegetarian items, Indian curries and good old burgers and fries. BTW, Tap Room Fries are in a class of their own! There are also some great recipes on their website, www.schlafly.com.

They also serve beer, lots of beers of all types, and seasonal favorites as well. 


