District Celebrates Grand Reopening of Mark Twain



More than 500 students, families, community members, elected officials, business partners and district leaders celebrated the grand reopening of the new and improved Mark

Twain Elementary School on Aug. 17 during a community open house event.

The event kicked off with an official ribbon-cutting ceremony, followed by self-guided tours of the renovated elementary school, which honors Mark Twain’s legacy while embracing modern educational innovations.

“Our district is committed to creating learning environments that not only meet the needs of our current students and families, but are also designed with the future in mind,”



said Dr. Amy Zielinski, superintendent of schools. “We are excited to welcome our community to the new and improved Mark Twain Elementary School.”

The original Mark Twain underwent extensive renovations during the 2023-24 school year, including a complete transformation of the existing structures and a new two-story addition.

Highlights of the new addition include a state-of-the-art library media center, which also serves as an ICC 500 storm shelter, and a secure main entrance that meets the highest school safety and security standards.

The addition seamlessly connects to the school’s existing footprint, creating 12 total classrooms and dedicated spaces for art, music, physical education, counseling, intervention and special education services. These flexible, collaborative learning spaces are designed to engage students and support innovative instruction. The revitalized campus also features an outdoor learning garden, a reconfigured playground and additional parking.

This transformation was made possible by the community’s support of Prop E, a \$29 million bond issue to enhance safety, accessibility and student learning at the district’s two elementary schools and early childhood center. The project was designed by HTK Architects, managed by Navigate Building Solutions and completed by ICS Construction.

STLCC Partnership Saves Students \$60,000 in College Tuition

Brentwood High School students saved more than \$60,000 in future college tuition costs during the 2023-24 school year as part of the St. Louis Community College Dual Credit program. This collaborative effort with STLCC provides students with a variety of opportunities to earn college credit, including:

- **Dual Credit:** Students earn college credit for classes taught by high school instructors
- **Dual Enrollment:** Students earn college credit for classes taught by STLCC instructors
- **Career and Industry Tracks:** Dual credit and dual enrollment pathways that enable students to earn a college credential and satisfy prerequisites for admission into selective career and academic programs

“Our partnership with STLCC allows students who are already engaged in challenging, college-level coursework to earn college credit and significantly reduce future tuition costs,” said Dr. Ronni Zagora, assistant superintendent of curriculum and instruction. “This program offers immense value to our students and families, and we are thrilled to see its continued growth at Brentwood High School.”

During the 2023-24 school year, 38 BHS students were enrolled in at least one dual credit or dual enrollment course, resulting in an estimated savings of \$60,363 in future college tuition costs - an increase of more than \$23,000 compared to the 2022-23 school year. These savings are calculated based on the average cost of the same credits at a four-year public university in Missouri.

Additionally, BHS expanded its dual credit course offerings



from 12 to 16 during the 2023-24 school year, generating a total of 157 college credit hours. Dual enrollment program participants also earned 13 college credit hours.

“This savings in college costs for students benefits our community and our economy,” said Ellen Wottrich, STLCC dual credit partnerships manager. “These opportunities also represent a life-changing impact for students. National research shows that students who earn college credit in high school are more likely to start and finish a college degree.”

STLCC is not the only option for Brentwood students to earn college credit in high school. BHS has similar partnerships with Lindenwood University and the University of Missouri-St. Louis, as well as opportunities to earn college credit through Advanced Placement courses.

Exceptional Math Growth at Brentwood Middle School

Brentwood Middle School experienced exceptional academic growth during the 2023-24 school year, thanks to the outstanding efforts of both students and staff.



Seventh graders made remarkable progress on their NWEA math assessments, with every student improving their scores from fall to spring. Notably, 13 students saw increases of 16 or more RIT points, underscoring their significant strides in math proficiency.

This impressive growth was not limited to seventh grade. Assessment data from sixth and eighth graders also reflected substantial advancements, with 98% of sixth graders improving their scores and 88% of eighth graders demonstrating growth.

“The academic growth our students achieved during the 2023-24 school year is nothing short of phenomenal,” said Dr. Doug Wehner, BMS principal. “It’s a testament to their hard work, the dedication of our teachers and the strength of our math program.”

These achievements highlight the effectiveness of the school’s instructional staff, including teachers Jamie Harte, Mike Royal, Dr. Jerome Schmidt and Natalie Sellers. The 2023-24 school year also marked a new chapter for Marissa St. Clair, a longtime BMS math teacher who transitioned to a math interventionist role, now serving grades 6-12.

“Marissa’s expertise and support have been instrumental in helping our students achieve these outstanding results,” added Dr. Wehner.

Brentwood Board of Education Advisory Committees

The Brentwood School District believes strong community support is essential to maximize learning, growth and achievement for all students. To help guide our work, the Board of Education



has established four advisory committees designed to engage the community in our shared journey toward future success.

This fall, the board is implementing an application process for parents, caregivers, business professionals and community members to introduce new voices into each group. The four board advisory committees include:

- Community Engagement
- Finance and Operations
- Student Experience
- Teaching and Learning

Board advisory committees meet quarterly and provide regular updates at board meetings. Meetings are held in the Brentwood High School Lecture Hall (2221 High School Dr.) at 4 p.m. Committee members will serve two-year terms, with an anticipated start date of October 2024. Individuals who have previously served on a board advisory committee are encouraged to reapply and continue contributing their valuable insights.

Your credit score is used by lenders to determine whether to loan you money and at what rate. Basically, the better your score, the more you save. Well likewise, your credit report shows financial activity associated with your name. If you’re not checking them regularly, you won’t find out that someone has stolen your identity until it’s too late.

Taking the time to familiarize yourself with how credit scores are calculated is the first step in getting a strong score. The basic breakdown goes like this:

- **35% is based on payment history.** Making payments on time boosts your score.
- **30% is based on capacity.** This is one of the areas where the less you use of your total available credit, the better. If you get close to maxing out all your credit cards or lines of credit, it tanks your score, even if you’re making your payments on time.
- **15% is based on length of credit.** Good credit habits over a long period of time raise your score.
- **10% is based on new credit.** Opening new credit cards (this includes retail credit cards) has a short-term negative effect on your score, so don’t open a whole bunch at once!
- **10% is based on mix of credit.** Having a combination of different types of credit (like revolving credit and installment loans) boosts this part of your score. Credit cards are considered revolving credit, and things like car loans and mortgages are installment loans.

2024 HALL OF FAME HONOREES

The Brentwood Alumni Association proudly recognizes the Hall of Fame Class of 2024

IVORY CROCKETT '68
SAINT LOUIS, MO



Ivory was known as “the fastest man in the world” in 1974 after setting a world record of 9.0 seconds in the 100 yard dash. Since track records are now kept by meters, he still holds that record. Ivory attended Brentwood schools for many years, transferring to Webster Groves after his sophomore year at BHS. Though he didn’t graduate from Brentwood, he is remembered fondly by classmates and staff along with other members of the Brentwood community; Ivory has good memories of life in Brentwood. “We never had any racial issues of any kind at Brentwood. We were like a family.” That feeling extended to his community, the Evans Place neighborhood, which was located where the Promenade is now. Ivory attended the Evans and Howard Place reunion gathering in February of 2019 as part of the Brentwood Centennial celebration. His love for Brentwood was obvious from his remarks.

While at Brentwood High, Ivory was a member of the junior high (2023 translation: “middle school”) basketball team as a 7th and 8th grader. Since back in those days, freshmen couldn’t play on varsity teams, Ivory had to wait till his sophomore year to make an impact on Eagle teams...and that he did. He was part of the undefeated Little 9 Championship football team and also wrestled. That Spring, he was a key member of the Eagles State Championship Track Team and held the trophy, a young man who would soon be known around the nation and world for his track achievements.

After high school, Ivory attended Southern Illinois University at Carbondale (“a school big enough to do what I wanted to do”) and competed at top level meets, once defeating Olympian John Carlos in the National AAU Championships. He was twice the USA champion in the 100-yard sprints. The city of Webster Groves recognized his achievements by naming a park in his honor, Ivory Crockett Park, at Bell and Thornton Avenues. Ivory has given back to the Webster community with his annual RUN4Webster, held this year in October.

Though a Webster graduate, Ivory still recognizes the positive impact on his life by the Brentwood schools and individuals. Ivory has always given BHS football Coach **John Titus** credit for helping him through a rough time in his life when his parents split up. “Coach had continued to be in touch with me and we stayed close ever since. I owe my life to him. He and **Coach Burgoyne** and wrestling **Coach Long** meant a lot to me, too. And my English teacher, **Mrs. Calderwood**, worked so hard to help me read and write better.”

Ivory, Coach, and fellow BHS athlete **Russ Lake '67** smiled and laughed as they shared football and track stories. Ivory’s older brother, **Curtis '66**, was also quite an athlete and runner. Ivory swears that the only time Curtis beat him was because “Curtis jumped the gun! I was yelling at him all the way down the track but **Coach Sadler** let him get away with it.” He still laughs about it (sorta). Ivory is still close to his brother and “loves how bright my grandchildren are.” One of his highlights in high school, Ivory says, was at the top of a cheerleader pyramid in front of the whole school.

Ivory’s life path has taken him to 50 states and numerous countries. He went from college to careers at IBM, Anheuser-Busch and Coors (in marketing) and in recent years, he has been a leader in the healthcare industry, supporting independent wellness centers, Forest Park, and St. Alexius hospital in the St. Louis area. As in his athletic endeavors, Ivory has always seemed to be several steps ahead of people in his professional pursuits. When asked what advice he’d give to current BHS students, Ivory said that BHS “was the foundation for my life. When I started at Brentwood, I wasn’t well-liked, but I kept at it and by the time I left, they were my family. Stick with it. Work hard. That whole school, from teachers to the cafeteria workers, did not give up on me and I’ve had a good life because of it.” Brentwood is proud to claim Ivory Crockett as one of its own and proud of where the race in life has taken him over the years.

TIM DEIMEKE '82
SAINT LOUIS, MO

Tim is a proud second generation BHS graduate and has lived in the Brentwood/Webster area since graduation. He and his wife, Debbie, have four children, four grandchildren and one great grand-



child. Ice Hockey has been a favorite pastime with Tim, who started playing with his two older brothers and neighborhood friends at a young age. Brentwood High School had a Hockey Club team with a small, but mighty roster. After his BHS graduation, he continued with the BHS Club team as their Coach. This was just the beginning of his life-long coaching career. Next up was the Webster Wings during the 1984/85 season. He shares that as much as he loved the game, he really enjoyed helping the young players develop their love for the game as well. His involvement with youth hockey was also where he met his wife, Debbie. Deimeke noted he coached various youth hockey teams with the Webster youth program for 12 years through 1996.

His passion and talent as a coach was noted by the Webster Groves High School hockey program leaders. He was recruited to be an assistant coach for the Webster Groves High School hockey team. His next role in 1998/99 was the head coach for their Junior Varsity team as well as the assistant coach for their Varsity team. In 2017, he took over as head varsity coach and served in that role until 2020. Parallel to the Webster coaching positions, sometime in the early 2000’s, Tim could be found on the ice helping the Gateway Locomotive Special Needs Hockey program, where their youngest daughter, Jessica, played. In 2017 the St Louis Blues adopted the program, and the Locomotives were renamed and is now known as Blues Special Hockey. Tim and Debbie took over coaching and managing the program in 2018. He, Debbie, and Jessica can all be found most Sundays from October through April on the ice at Centene. Under Tim’s leadership, the Blues Special Hockey program has grown from 25 to 60 athletes, both male and female ranging from 7 to 50 years of age. With his life-long love for the game, both he and his wife have many hockey contacts in the St. Louis community. Their dedication to helping others is infectious and their teams can often be seen on the ice competing against some of the high school and youth programs. The program hosts an annual fundraiser for the organization. Funds raised are used to support the team’s travel to other cities in the US to play in an all-weekend tournament against other Special Needs teams. This trip is a highlight of the year for many of the athletes and their families!

The St. Louis Blues organization has been a supporter of the team and Tim’s efforts to provide each team member with a rewarding experience on and off the ice. Specifically, new game jerseys and sticks the Blues have given to the team are quite helpful. Throughout the Blues season, they often host Tim and many team members as their guests at a Blues game at the Enterprise Center!

When Deimeke is not on the ice, his career path started at Ranken Technical College, where he earned his certificate in collision repair. This was his steppingstone to his membership in the District 9 Machinist Lodge 777. He worked in collision repair for a few years before a move to working for auto dealerships; at, both McMahon Ford and Dave Sinclair Lincoln, he served as a service advisor, union shop steward, and service advisor manager. After 31 years of service, Tim took early retirement only to return to the City of Webster Groves. He worked part time for many years at the ice rink. When the position of Supervisor of the Recreation Complex Maintenance Division became available, he felt it was the perfect opportunity to be close to what he loves.

When not working or on the ice, camping trips to Florida and their second home in Mountain Home, AR, Tim spends countless hours on the lake with family and friends! He has strong roots in Brentwood and when interviewed, noted he is quite humbled and honored to be recognized by his high school peers. He looks back and has fond memories of his time at BHS and the friends that were made during that time of his life. Being a team member of that very small club hockey team at BHS was the beginning of his commitment to giving back to so many who still look to him as COACH!!

COLONEL MARK SCHULTE USMC '73
Pascagoula, MS



Mark entered the Marine Corps in February 1981 and attended Officer Candidate School and the Basic School. He received orders to Naval Air Station Pensacola and began flight school. After completing Aviation Indoctrination and primary flight school, he was transferred to Naval Air Station Meridian for Intermediate and Advance Jets, flying the T-2 and A-4 and carrier qualified landing on the USS Lexington. Upon receiving his Wings in September, 1983, he was given or-

ders to Marine Observation Squadron One at Marine Corps Air Station New River to fly the OV-10 Bronco.

In the next 10 years, Mark attended the Aviation Safety Officer Course at the Naval Post-Graduate School, the Amphibious Warfare School and the Weapons and Tactics School (the Marine Corps equivalent of Top Gun). He also went on numerous deployments in the desert Southwest, Okinawa, Korea and the Philippines. He flew in support of the Vice-President’s War on drugs flying out of South Florida, Key West and Puerto Rico.

In January, 1991, Schulte’s squadron deployed to Saudi Arabia in support of Desert Shield/Desert Storm. He flew 18 combat missions and 63.6 combat hours, for which he received the Air Medal. For a mission in which he directed the air battle against an Iraqi tank battalion and Marine forces, he was awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross with Combat “V” for valor. During the next 10 years, Mark was promoted to Major and Lieutenant Colonel in the Reserves. As a civilian, Mark was a consultant to some of the leaders in industry, Chevron USA, Frito-Lay, Applied Materials, and Lockheed-Martin. In January, 2003, Mark was recalled to active duty to support the rear-detachments of units being deployed to Operation Enduring Freedom/Iraqi Freedom.

In October, 2004, Mark was promoted to Colonel and assigned as the Director of Safety and Standardization to the 4th Marine Aircraft Wing and was given the task to improve the safety record of the Wing. Mark retired from active duty in March, 2010. He is currently an account manager for a small software firm. He is married to his wife, Debbie, for 46 years and has four children, Greg, Scott, Catherine, and John and nine grandchildren.

Build a Better Breakfast with Chocolate Milk

One of the most popular and nutritious breakfast items on the school menu is chocolate milk. Sharing evidence of the health benefits of flavored milk helps to clear up misconceptions about its place in school meals. “With 13 essential nutrients, flavored milk is a key player in school nutrition,” Cimarolli said. “Many people may not realize that chocolate and strawberry milk offer the same vitamins, minerals and protein as white milk.”

Offering flavored milk on school menus provides students with a regular source of food to meet three nutrients that are often lacking in their diets: calcium, vitamin D and potassium. These nutrients play a crucial role in healthy growth and development. Students whose nutritional needs are met perform better overall in school and receive higher grades.

Another myth surrounding flavored milk is that it is a major contributor of added sugar to students’ diets. However, the chocolate milk served in schools is specially formulated to contain less sugar. During the 2023-24 school year, chocolate milk contained 7.4 grams of added sugar, which is 50% less than what was served 18 years ago. Today’s school chocolate milk has just 27.7 more calories than white milk, while offering the same essential nutrients that are key to a healthy diet.

Flavored milk offers a tasty option to help students reach their daily nutrient requirements. So, get ready to let your kids sip, savor and shine by boosting their breakfast’s nutrition with chocolate milk!

Skillet Chicken Tortellini Alfredo



Ingredients

- 1 1/2 cups heavy cream
- 4 tablespoons (1/2 stick) unsalted butter
- 2 pinches freshly grated nutmeg
- 1 1/2 cups grated Parmesan
- Kosher salt
- 18 ounces frozen cheese tortellini
- 2 boneless, skinless chicken breasts, cut into 1-inch pieces (about 1 1/4 pounds)
- 1/4 cup chopped fresh flat-leaf parsley

Directions

Preheat the oven to 425 degrees F.

Heat the heavy cream, butter, nutmeg, 1 cup of the Parmesan and 1 teaspoon salt in a large ovenproof skillet over medium-high heat, whisking occasionally, until the cheese and butter are melted, 3 to 4 minutes. Add the tortellini and simmer until cooked through, 4 to 5 minutes. Add the chicken and sprinkle with the remaining 1/2 cup Parmesan.

Bake until the chicken is just cooked through, the sauce has thickened and the top starts to turn golden brown, 10 to 12 minutes. Let stand for 10 minutes before serving. Sprinkle with the parsley.

Easy Roasted Pumpkin Seeds



You Will Need

- 1 1/2 cups pumpkin seeds
- 2 teaspoons fine sea salt, plus more for serving
- 2 teaspoons olive oil or melted coconut oil
- 2 teaspoons favorite spice blend such as pumpkin pie spice, curry powder, harissa or chili powder

Directions

Preheat the oven to 350°F (177°C). Line a baking sheet with parchment paper and set aside.

Fill a medium saucepan with 2 cups of water and season with 2 teaspoons of salt. Bring to a boil.

Meanwhile, scoop the seeds from your pumpkin. Add the pumpkin seeds to a bowl filled with cold water and swish them until they float and are mostly clean.

Add the cleaned seeds to the boiling salted water. Simmer for 5 minutes.

Drain and pull away any remaining pumpkin attached to the seeds.

Scatter the seeds onto clean dishcloths and pat them very dry.

Mound the dried seeds onto the prepared baking sheet. Add the oil and spices, then toss until well coated.

Spread the seeds into one layer. Bake, stirring the seeds at least once, until fragrant and golden around the edges, 10 to 25 minutes, depending on the size of the seeds.

International Rett Syndrome Foundation to Host 17th Annual St. Louis Strollathon

The International Rett Syndrome Foundation (IRSF) will host its 17th annual St. Louis Strollathon on Sat., Oct. 19 with registration starting at 1 p.m. and the walk beginning at 2 p.m. The one-mile family-friendly stroll, which will be held at the JCC St. Louis located at 2 Millstone Campus Dr., includes a visit from Fredbird, entertainment and food.

The St. Louis Strollathon has raised a total of more than \$900,000 since its first event in 2008. The Strollathon is the area’s major fundraising event and brings together families from across the Midwest affected by Rett syndrome. All proceeds will benefit the International Rett Syndrome Foundation.

Rett syndrome is a rare genetic neurological disorder that occurs almost exclusively in girls (one in 10,000 births), more rarely in boys, and leads to severe impairments. It is usually recognized in children between six to 18 months as they begin to miss developmental milestones or lose abilities they had gained, including their ability to speak, walk, eat, and even breathe. Rett particularly affects speech, purposeful hand use, and coordination, leaving individuals trapped in their own bodies, understanding more than they can communicate. There is currently no cure for Rett syndrome.

St. Louis is home to a specialty clinic – a collaboration between Washington University School of Medicine and St. Louis Children’s Hospital. The clinic has a team of specialists with substantial experience in the diagnostic evaluation and treatment of individuals with Rett syndrome.

Since 2004, these nationwide family-friendly strolls have raised more than \$17 million to advance IRSF’s mission to empower families and accelerate research toward a world without Rett Syndrome.

The International Rett Syndrome Foundation (IRSF) is the leading Rett syndrome research and advocacy organization. IRSF has invested over \$58 million in research leading to identifying Rett syndrome’s cause, demonstrating Rett syndrome is reversible in mice, and supporting the clinical trials that led to the first-ever FDA-approved treatment. Pictorial St. Louis A Topographical Survey Drawn in Perspective A.D. 1875

This is a reprint of the 1971 version of the original book. The book was painstakingly scanned from the original in my collection. PICTORIAL ST. LOUIS: The Great Metropolis of the Mississippi Valley A Topographical Survey, Drawn From Perspective 1875.

Illustrations by Camille N. Dry and designed & edited by Rich. J. Compton.

Over 220 pages of illustrations and descriptions of life in St. Louis in the late 1800’s. The preliminary drawings for this work were made early in the spring of 1874. After a careful consideration of the subject, it was determined to locate the point of view so that the city would be seen from the southeast, believing that to be the most advantageous in all respects. Accordingly, the point of site was established on the Illinois side of the river, looking to the northwest, and at sufficient altitude to overlook the roofs of ordinary houses into the streets.

A careful perspective, which required a surface of three hundred square feet, was then erected from a correct survey of the city, extending northward from Arsenal Island to the Water Works, a distance of about ten miles, on the river front; and from the Insane Asylum on the southwest to the Cemeteries on the northwest.

Every foot of the vast territory within these limits has been carefully examined and topographically drawn in perspective, by Mr. C. N. Dry and his assistants, and the faithfulness and accuracy with which this work has been done an examination of the pages will attest. Absolute truth and accuracy in the representation of the territory has been the standard and in no cases have additions or alterations been made unless the same were actually in course of construction. In a few cases, important public and private edifices that are not yet finished are shown completed, and as they will appear when done.

All the buildings within the limits of the survey in July, 1875, are shown; and a very large number of those executed or commenced since that date have been also introduced, the pages having been constantly corrected up to the last possible moment before publication.

RESTAURANT REVIEWS

Close, But No Cigar

We started out to visit Nuvellas, a new restaurant on Main St. in St. Charles. Their online menu looked very interesting. We arrived for lunch only to find them closed for employee training. The manager let us look inside, and it looked very nice. He said please come back another day. I told him I needed to write a food article today, and he offered to have the Chef come out to see what they could do. I told him we didn't want any special favors, but I was impressed with his offer. We will definitely go back

We went next door to Quintessential Dining and Nightlife, an establishment we tried to dine at last year. At the time, they were rather crowded, but after sitting there for more than thirty minutes without an acknowledgment of our presence, nor any form of service, we walked out.

In all fairness, we decided to give them another try. We were their only customers at their 11am opening and had our choice of tables.

Their menu has a number of items unique to their restaurant. Including Breaded Wings; the sauce is in the breading. Two jumbo lump Crab Cakes with Chipotle Aioli. Served with Tomato Ginger Chutney sounded like a good appetizer. Their original house items are designated with a "Q" on the menu.

I decided to have the Chicken Picata, a pan seared chicken breast, with wild mushrooms and a white wine lemon caper sauce over angel hair pasta.

Sue ordered the wedge salad, A wedge of iceberg lettuce covered with blue cheese dressing, cherry tomatoes, chunks of bacon, blue cheese crumbles and a balsamic reduction.

Our server apologized for the fact that they did not have any iceberg lettuce because their food supplier had not arrive yet on Monday morning. He offered to have it prepared with romaine lettuce, which happens to be Sue's favorite. It was delicious.




My chicken picata gave me mixed emotions. It was a large, well cooked chicken breast, but the sauce was a bit disappointing. It had way too much lemon juice and not much, if any white wine. I've sucked a fresh lemon that was not as tart. I love capers, and there were a lot of capers in the sauce. I would have preferred a better balance of mushrooms to capers. The mushrooms were simply white button mushrooms, not "wild" mushrooms. The sauce was very thin. I would have preferred thicker sauce that would have adhered to the pasta.

I was not totally disappointed with this dish, but it just didn't meet my expectations, especially when I found a one inch glob of pasta stuck together, and under cooked, in the bottom of the bowl. Really, what does it take to stir the pasta while it is cooking!



Sue's chocolate, chocolate cake was perfect! It was a dense, three layer, flavorful cake served with vanilla ice cream. The cake is baked by a local bakery, and we will be visiting them in the future to satisfy our sweet tooth.

My overall impression of Quintessential Dining and Nightlife is that they need to decide if they are a restaurant with entertainment, or a nightclub that serves food.

I must also note that our server was not wearing a facial mask. He did stand 6ft or more from our table, and when I asked if the employees were instructed to wear a mask, he said no, it made it too difficult to converse with patrons. If that is indeed policy, I think it shows a total disrespect for the health of their customers and staff. I can not recommend Quintessential Dining and Nightlife at this time.


