**BHS Senior Named to Missouri Scholars 100**

Brentwood High School senior Abel Curdt has been named to the 2025 Missouri Scholars 100, a prestigious statewide program that honors Missouri’s top academic students. Organized by the Missouri Association of Secondary School Principals (MoASSP), the program recognizes 100 outstanding high school seniors for their academic excellence, leadership and commitment to learning.

Curdt, a dedicated student and active leader at Brentwood High School, is a member of the National Honor Society, Student Council and baseball team. He plans to study natural resources science and management at the University of Missouri-Columbia.

“Abel’s selection for the Missouri Scholars 100 is a remarkable achievement and a true reflection of his dedication, perseverance and academic excellence,” said Dr. Edward Johnson, Brentwood High School principal. “His passion for learning and leadership within our school community inspire those around him, and we can’t wait to see the great things he will accomplish in the future.”

This marks the third consecutive year that a Brentwood High School senior has been selected for the Missouri Scholars 100.

Each year, Missouri high schools are invited to nominate their top students based on a formula that considers grade-point average and ACT or SAT scores. To qualify, students must meet the following criteria:

- Maintain a minimum 3.75 GPA
- Score at least 29 on the ACT or 1,280 on the SAT
- Rank in the top 10% of their graduating class
- Complete advanced coursework in mathematics, science, English and a world language
- Demonstrate exemplary citizenship, attendance and extracurricular involvement

“The Missouri Scholars 100 Program is one of the premier academic recognition programs in the country,” said Clark Mershon, MoASSP executive director. “Students selected for this program have taken a rigorous course of study and maintained the highest academic standards. The Missouri Association of Secondary School Principals is proud to celebrate the achievements and success of these students and their schools.”

The 2025 Missouri Scholars 100 recipients will be recognized during an awards luncheon May 4 in Columbia, Missouri.

**Secondary Leadership Team  
Welcome New Administrators**

To strengthen leadership and better support students, staff

and families in grades 6-12, the Brentwood School District is restructuring its secondary administrative team. This new model creates two dedicated leadership positions—a 6-12 Assistant Principal and a 6-12 Athletics and Activities Director—ensuring a stronger focus on academics, student transitions, and extracurricular programming.

This change also introduces two dynamic leaders to the Brentwood community: Wendy Greenwood-Leveling, who will serve as the new 6-12 Assistant Principal, and Jamesia-Tomesa Tuiava, who will take on the role of 6-12 Athletics and Activities Director.

The restructuring aims to provide more targeted support for students throughout their middle and high school years. The assistant principal role will focus on academic success, behavioral support and curriculum alignment, while the athletics and activities director will enhance extracurricular programming, student engagement and community partnerships.

“This transition allows us to better serve our students by providing dedicated leadership in both academics and extracurricular activities,” said Dr. Amy Zielinski, superintendent of schools. “With Wendy’s passion for student success and Jamesia’s extensive experience in athletics and student engagement, we are confident this change will have a meaningful impact on our school community.”



Wendy Greenwood-Leveling brings over 14 years of experience in education, with a strong background in student success, educator development and school climate improvement. She has held multiple leadership roles, including administrative intern, interim assistant principal and department chair. She currently serves as an administrative intern at the Hancock Place School

District, focusing on school safety, discipline and professional development.

“I believe in fostering a school culture where every student feels seen, supported and empowered to succeed,” said Greenwood-Leveling. “I am eager to work alongside Brentwood’s dedicated educators to ensure that our students have the resources, relationships, and opportunities they need to thrive.”

As assistant principal, Greenwood-Leveling will oversee academic initiatives, student discipline using restorative practices, and curriculum support for elective courses across grades 6-12. She will also focus on student transitions, particularly the shift from middle school to high school.

Jamesia-Tomesa Tuiava brings a wealth of experience in educational leadership, athletics administration and student engagement. She has served as a principal, assistant principal and athletic director at Cristo Rey Kansas City High School, where she led strategic athletic programming, strengthened community partnerships and supported student development.



“My passion is creating opportunities that inspire students, build confidence and foster a sense of belonging through athletics and activities,” said Tuiava. “I look forward to working with Brentwood’s students, coaches, and families to enhance school spirit, expand programming, and ensure every student has a chance to connect through extracurricular involvement.”

In her new role, Tuiava will oversee the district’s athletics and activities programming, ensuring consistency and quality across middle and high school levels. She will also focus on expanding student participation, strengthening community engagement, and managing athletics and activities budgets.

With these new roles in place, Brentwood is poised to provide a more structured and supportive experience for students in grades 6-12. The district remains committed to fostering academic excellence, student engagement, and a strong school community.

“We are excited to welcome Wendy and Jamesia to the Brentwood family,” added Dr. Zielinski. “Their leadership, expertise, and passion will create new opportunities for our students and strengthen our school community.”

## STLCC-Florissant Valley Opens New Advanced Manufacturing Center

St. Louis Community College celebrated the opening of a new Advanced Manufacturing Center on its Florissant Valley campus on Tuesday, April 1.

It marks the second of six new buildings the College will open this year as part of its STLCC Transformed initiative, a commitment to modernize its four main campuses and programming throughout the district.

“The Advanced Manufacturing Center offers a synergy among nearly 20 programs and our faculty, staff, instructors and students, creating opportunities for collaboration that didn’t previously exist on this campus,” said Jeff L. Pittman, PhD, STLCC chancellor. “In fact, students have already started using the center, attending classes in robotics, computer information technology, business, accounting, geospatial technology and engineering technology.”

The 96,000-square-foot Advanced Manufacturing Center at STLCC-Florissant Valley will combine short-term career training, degree and certificate programs in STEM and advanced manufacturing. The center will house the College’s business and accounting programs, as well as STLCC’s new remote aircraft pilot certificate program. The campus includes an outdoor classroom with a large, netted enclosure for safe drone piloting practice. Another interesting feature of the new building is a suite for early college students.

“Through our dual enrollment and early college partnerships with area high schools, students can earn college credit or their associate degree at STLCC at the same time as their high school diploma,” said Elizabeth Gassel Perkins, EdD, campus president and chief academic officer at STLCC-Florissant Valley. “Now our early college students have a modern, dedicated space to study, receive support, and connect with their peers that was specifically designed for their needs.”

The Advanced Manufacturing Center will strengthen industry partnerships and align programming with workforce demands.

“The Advanced Manufacturing Center is designed for maximum hands-on training in many manufacturing and engineering technology fields. We are excited to add drones, GIS, surveying, and other programs,” said Tom McGovern, STLCC dean of industrial occupations, business and culinary. “Visitors to the building can look directly into typical work environments and see the activities that students are engaged in.”

In addition to the Advanced Manufacturing Center and the new Nursing and Health Sciences Center that opened to students on the Florissant Valley campus in February, STLCC will open four more new buildings and complete major renovations to existing spaces throughout the district. The new buildings include a Health Sciences and Technology Center on the Wildwood campus, a Financial Services Education Center and an Emerging Technology Center at Meramec, and a Transportation Education Center on the Forest Park campus.

These new construction projects are covered by funds from Proposition R.

## Exciting News from Opera Theatre

Opera Theatre is excited to announce that we are under contract for the purchase of a 6.67-acre parcel of land upon which we plan to build a new, state-of-the-art performing arts center. We have begun an intensive due diligence process for the site, which is located at 8300 Maryland Avenue and currently owned by Caleres. Initial planning and fundraising are underway, as Opera Theatre evaluates the feasibility of a capital project; a final sale will be subject to the findings of that due diligence process and OTSL has the ability to withdraw from the contract if the findings of that process are not satisfactory.

“As we celebrate our 50th anniversary this year, we are excited by an unprecedented opportunity to build a new home,” said General Director Andrew Jorgensen. “We are still early in this process, but we look forward to being in dialogue with our Opera Theatre community, Clayton residents and businesses, and other stakeholders as we pursue necessary redevelopment steps over the next several months.

“Opera Theatre is only able to contemplate this opportunity because of the extraordinary generosity and encouragement of our supporters. I want to also thank and acknowledge Webster University, which has graciously provided Opera Theatre a home since 1976. We would not be the company we are today without their support, and we are grateful to continue to partner with the university even as we plan for OTSL’s future.”

Per the terms of the contract between Opera Theatre and Caleres, a number of steps remain before OTSL will be able to confirm and close a transaction on the Caleres site. Opera Theatre is currently in the early stages of a complex, multi-month due diligence process to assess the feasibility of the project that will include but is not limited to site studies, design work, cost estimates, and early fundraising.

Even as Opera Theatre advances the early steps of site studies and design work, we are also planning to seek input from our audiences, Clayton residents, and members of the community. In the coming weeks, we will share further plans to solicit input and address questions from those constituents.

“The Board of Directors of Opera Theatre is unequivocally inspired by this vision for a new performing arts venue,” said Board Chair Kim Eberlein. “We see this opportunity not just as an inspiring new chapter in Opera Theatre’s renowned history, but also as the promise of a new, interdisciplinary arts and cultural hub for St. Louis. We look forward to sharing more updates with our community as we are able.”



## 3 Questions to Ask when Determining How Much House You Can Afford

Getting a mortgage to purchase a home can be a wise financial decision since you’re building equity and getting nice tax deductions. But buying a home that’s too expensive can leave you strapped and unable to prepare for other financial goals, like saving for retirement, kids’ college educations, or vacations.

Determining how much you can afford is the first step to responsible home buying. Consider these three questions to help you arrive at your magic number.

### How much have you saved for a down payment?

Most mortgage lenders require you to pay a percentage of the purchase price as a down payment. That percentage can range from 3 to 20 percent. In many cases, if you put down less than 20 percent, you’ll likely be required to pay for private mortgage insurance, which can cost .15 to .25 percent of the loan amount.

If you plan to sell one home and buy another, you may be able to apply any equity in your current home toward a down payment on the new home. If you’re a first-time homebuyer, taking time to aggressively save a down payment will pay off — a larger down payment will let you buy more house or make smaller monthly payments.

### What monthly payment can you afford?

Most lenders recommend that borrowers spend no more than 28 percent of their monthly income on a mortgage payment. Keep in mind that just because a lender is willing to loan you a certain amount doesn’t mean that you should borrow to the limit. Write out a budget and keep in mind that you’ll need funds for home repairs, maintenance, and updates, as well as whatever else you want to spend your money on — vacations, savings, gifts, food, gas, etc. For help determining the right number for you, use an online mortgage affordability calculator (located on our website).

### What is your credit history?

Your credit score will determine whether you qualify for a mortgage and what terms you’ll get if you do. Different lenders have different credit score requirements. For instance, FHA requires applicants to have a credit score of 580 or better to obtain maximum financing on typical new-home purchases, and offers some products with lesser financing for those with credit scores between 500 and 579.

If your credit score is too low to qualify for the mortgage rates you want, be patient. Consistently working to improve your score by checking for and resolving errors and methodically paying off debt can improve your score over time.

Once you’ve determined how much you can spend on a new home while still meeting other financial goals and obligations and avoiding the stress of excessive debt, you’re ready to start shopping. Just remember to stay within your budget.

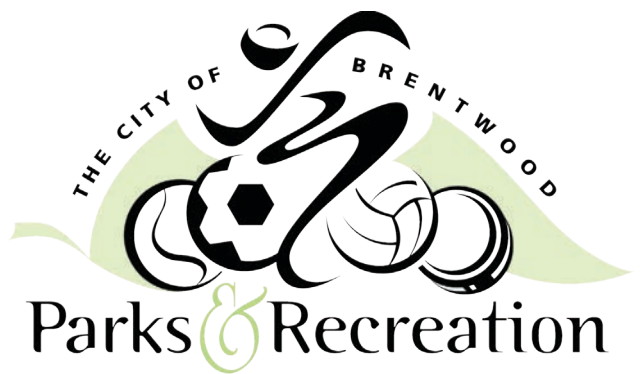

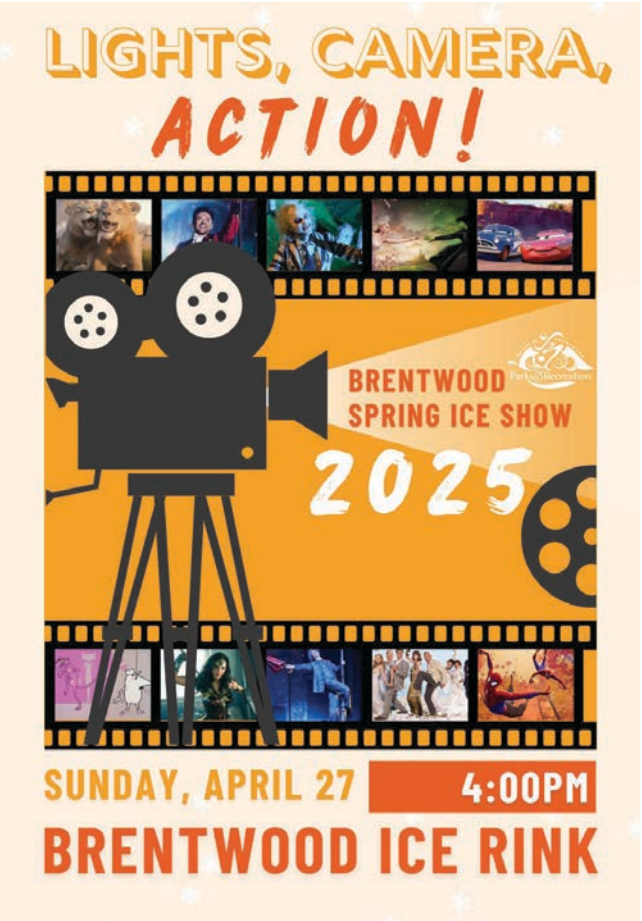

Two-year-old twins, Kallu (Kah-LOO) and Kallik (Kah-LEEK), will now have regular access to the Zoo’s 40,000-sq-ft polar bear habitat, McDonnell Polar Bear Point. Guests can stop by for a chance to see the playful duo during regular Zoo hours from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. daily this spring.

The twins were born at Toledo Zoo & Aquarium in November 2022 and arrived at the Saint Louis Zoo earlier this month. The Zoo’s previous resident polar bear, Kali, moved simultaneously to Toledo Zoo where he will be paired with a female based on a breeding recommendation.

The twin brothers are known for their close bond. They love to play and spar together during the day and often sleep side-by-side at night. In Toledo, the twins enjoyed diving into their habitat pool, training with special treats like canned tuna and seaweed and playing with their pool toys.

Kallik is the smaller of the two males at 620 lbs. He is the bolder brother, and very curious –often the first to investigate new enrichment and spaces.

Kallu weighs about 740 lbs. and is very food-motivated during training. He is more cautious and tends to let his brother lead when exploring new things.



Their new home, Polar Bear Point, opened at the Saint Louis Zoo in 2015 and includes two temperature-controlled pools, an upper viewing deck and an arctic cave room that offers up-close, underwater views.

Polar Bear Point also includes a Care Center that is not viewable by the public. This space offers animals privacy and includes four bedroom spaces, a denning area and an outdoor off-exhibit habitat.

Polar bears (*Ursus maritimus*) are listed as threatened under the Endangered Species Act. The species faces a significant risk of population decline caused by loss of sea ice from climate change.

The Saint Louis Zoo is committed to safeguarding this species through collaborative breeding programs, research, public education and conservation initiatives in the Arctic.

In 2024, the Zoo launched the Saint Louis Zoo WildCare Institute Center for Polar Bear Conservation, a dynamic conservation program focused on protecting the species, funding research and collaborating with Arctic communities.

Sachs Butterfly House in Chesterfield was granted accreditation by AZA’s independent Accreditation Commission. Of the 32 applications for accreditation reviewed by the Commission during AZA’s Mid-Year Meeting held in Palm Springs, Calif., 30 were granted accreditation.

“Congratulations to the leadership and staff at the Sophia M. Sachs Butterfly House for attaining the global ‘gold standard’ in zoological and aquarium accreditation,” said Dan Ashe, president, and CEO of the Association of Zoos and Aquariums. “AZA’s standards continuously evolve to reflect best practices in the zoo and aquarium profession, with a strong emphasis on animal care and wellbeing at their core. 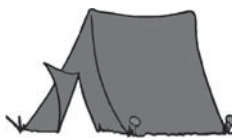

### Ingredients

- 1 cup chocolate chips
- 2/3 cup Reese’s peanut butter cups

Use a spoon to drop the mixture onto the sheet pan to form cookies. Use the spoon to press down to form a nest shape. Press 2 to 3 candy eggs into each nest. Let stand until firm or refrigerate for about 10 minutes. Store in a tightly covered container.

## The Original Llywelyn’s Pub: A Central West End Tale

It all started in 1975, at 4747 McPherson Avenue in St. Louis’s Central West End. Llywelyn’s wasn’t flashy or overly ambitious; it was just a small, welcoming pub with a Welsh heart. Back then, the neighborhood was a bit rough around the edges, far from the vibrant district it is today. But Llywelyn’s helped breathe life into the area, becoming a cornerstone of what would eventually become one of St. Louis’s most iconic neighborhoods.

### The Beginnings

Jack Brangle and Jon Dressel, two locals with a passion for good food and even better conversation, opened Llywelyn’s with a simple vision: create a place where people could gather, share a meal, and connect. The pub was small and intimate, with just enough room for a handful of tables and a snug bar. The cooks’ line was right next to the bar, so you could see your food being made while chatting with the bartender. It wasn’t polished, but it was real—and people loved it.

### The Character

Walking into Llywelyn’s back then was like stepping into another world. The walls were adorned with a mix of Welsh memorabilia and oddities collected by Jack and Jon—things like vintage Welsh beer advertisements, old maps, and even a portrait of Prince Llywelyn, the last free prince of Wales, after whom the pub was named. The space smelled of rich, hearty fare: beer batter frying, lamb roasting, and bread baking.

The lighting was dim, the atmosphere warm, and the noise level a steady hum of conversation and laughter. It felt like everyone there knew each other, and if they didn’t when they arrived, they certainly did by the time they left.

### The Food and Drink

The menu was unapologetically Welsh, featuring dishes that were hard to find anywhere else in St. Louis. Welsh rarebit, with its sharp cheddar cheese sauce served over thick bread, was a standout. The lamb sausage, made in-house, was a revelation for anyone who tried it. And then there was the leek and potato soup—simple but comforting, the kind of dish that made you feel at home, even if you weren’t Welsh.

The drinks were just as much a draw. They stocked Welsh and English ales, as well as a few local favorites, creating a beer list that was ahead of its time. It wasn’t just about the drinks themselves but the way they were served—with care, precision, and a smile.

### The People

But the real magic of Llywelyn’s wasn’t in its food or decor—it was in its people. The pub attracted an eclectic crowd: writers, artists, academics, and locals who just wanted a good pint and a welcoming place to spend their evening.

Jon Dressel, one of the co-owners, was a poet, and his artistic circle often found its way to the pub. On any given night, you could overhear discussions about literature, art, and politics mingling with the more down-to-earth banter of locals catching up after work. The contrast was part of Llywelyn’s charm. Everyone was welcome, and everyone had a place.

Regulars became fixtures of the place. There was the older gentleman who always sat at the bar, reading a novel between sips of ale. The group of young professionals who gathered every Friday, laughing loudly and clinking glasses. The local musician who played a quiet tune in the corner, adding to the pub’s cozy atmosphere without ever overpowering it.

### The Legacy

By the late 1980s, Llywelyn’s was thriving. They acquired the adjacent property, expanded the kitchen, and added a dining room to accommodate the growing crowd. But even as it grew, it kept its original character. The staff knew your name, your drink order, and probably a bit about your life.

The original Llywelyn’s stayed open for over 40 years, helping to shape the Central West End into the vibrant, artistic neighborhood it is today. When it closed in 2018, it left behind a legacy not just of good food and drink, but of community. For those who were lucky enough to experience it, the original Llywelyn’s wasn’t just a pub—it was a home away from home, a place where memories were made and stories shared.

Today, Llywelyn’s lives on in its other locations, but there will always be something special about that little pub on McPherson, where it all began.

Pictorial St. Louis A Topographical Survey Drawn in Perspective A.D. 1875

This is a reprint of the 1971 version of the original book. The book was painstakingly scanned from the original in my collection. Each page is reproduced in high resolution and coil bound so the pages lay flat while viewing. Printed on 12" x 18" high quality acid free paper. A nice edition to your historical book collection. Perfect coffee table book as people are attracted by the cover art.

PICTORIAL ST. LOUIS: The Great Metropolis of the Mississippi Valley A Topographical Survey, Drawn From Perspective 1875. Illustrations by Camille N. Dry and designed & edited by Rich. J. Compton.

Over 220 pages of illustrations and descriptions of life in St. Louis in the late 1800's. The preliminary drawings for this work were made early in the spring of 1874. After a careful consideration of the subject, it was determined to locate the point of view so that the city would be seen from the southeast, believing that to be the most advantageous in all respects. Accordingly, the point of site was established on the Illinois side of the river, looking to the northwest, and at sufficient altitude to overlook the roofs of ordinary houses into the streets.

A careful perspective, which required a surface of three hundred square feet, was then erected from a correct survey of the city, extending northward from Arsenal Island to the Water Works, a distance of about ten miles, on the river front; and from the Insane Asylum on the southwest to the Cemeteries on the northwest.

Every foot of the vast territory within these limits has been carefully examined and topographically drawn in perspective, by Mr. C. N. Dry and his assistants, and the faithfulness and accuracy with which this work has been done an examination of the pages will attest. Absolute truth and accuracy in the representation of the territory has been the standard and in no cases have additions or alterations been made unless the same were actually in course of construction. In a few cases, important public and private edifices that are not yet finished are shown completed, and as they will appear when done.

All the buildings within the limits of the survey in July, 1875, are shown; and a very large number of those executed or commenced since that date have been also introduced, the pages having been constantly corrected up to the last possible moment before publication.

Prep Time: 13 minutes  
Servings: 1

Ingredients

- 2 slices multigrain bread
- 2 ounces Brie cheese, thinly sliced
- 1/2 cup baby spinach leaves, stems removed
- 3 strawberries, stems removed and thinly sliced
- 1 tablespoon basil pesto, divided
- 1 tablespoon butter, softened

Instructions

Heat a nonstick or cast-iron pan over medium heat.  
Spread pesto evenly on each slice of bread, then top with Brie cheese slices, strawberry slices and spinach leaves.  
Place the remaining slice of bread on top and firmly press down to condense layers.  
Spread the top piece of bread with softened butter and place buttered side down in heated pan.  
Cook approximately 3-4 minutes or until lightly browned. If necessary, turn heat down so the bread doesn’t burn. While the sandwich is cooking, spread the remaining softened butter on top of bread. Flip the sandwich over and cook another 3-4 minutes or until lightly browned.

Rock Hill Police Department recognizes April as Autism Awareness Month, attached is the Autism Awareness badge the Officers will be wearing for the month.  
Autism, or autism spectrum disorder (ASD), refers to a broad range of conditions characterized by challenges with social skills, repetitive behaviors, speech and nonverbal communication. According to the Centers for Disease Control, autism affects an estimated 1 in 36 children and 1 in 45 adults in the United States today.  
On average, autism is diagnosed around age 5 in the U.S., with signs appearing by age 2 or 3.  
We know that there is not one type of autism, but many.  
Autism looks different for everyone, and each person with autism has a distinct set of strengths and challenges. Some autistic people can speak, while others are nonverbal or minimally verbal and communicate in other ways. Some have intellectual disabilities, while some do not. Some require significant support in their daily lives, while others need less support and, in some cases, live entirely independently.

Child Care Aware of Missouri  
Awarded Saint Louis Mental  
Health Board Contract

Participating educators and their family members will receive unlimited access to telehealth services, 10 mental health visits, and access to Show Me Child Care Resources. All services are provided with no copay. CCAMO holds the exclusive statewide license for Show Me Child Care Resources, a web-based portal offering over 2,000 resources for child care educators and business owners, as well as access to telehealth services for mental health support and overall well-being. Founded in 1994, Saint Louis Mental Health Board (MHB) is an independent taxing authority that administers public funds for behavioral health and children’s services. The nonprofit’s mission is to improve the quality of life for city residents by investing and participating in a coordinated system of social, behavioral, and physical health services aligned with community properties. “This inaugural contract with the Saint Louis Mental Health Board represents a significant step forward in supporting the mental health and well-being of our city’s child care educators,” said CCAMO CEO Robin Phillips. “By providing access to vital telehealth and mental health services, we’re not only investing in the educators themselves but also in the quality of care they provide to our community’s children.” Founded in 1999, CCAMO is a statewide nonprofit that focuses on a comprehensive early childhood education experience through impactful programs and partnerships. The organization’s services include workforce development, child care business supports, advocacy and policy work, and its new Child Care Keeps Missouri Working, a regional campaign offering concierge solutions to businesses undergoing employee recruitment and retention challenges due to the overwhelming shortage of quality child care options. The Focal Point is completely run by a staff of 30+ passionate volunteers of all ages from across the St. Louis region who share a common dedication toward preserving traditional, folk and roots music in our community. From our front-of-house staff to concert programmers and the marketing team, no one on staff has ever earned a paycheck. All profits directly support the working local and touring artists who grace our stage, as well as our continuous efforts to host an array of enriching programs for diverse audiences.

The Focal Point began in 1975 as a coffeehouse in the Old Orchard area of Webster Groves in the southwestern part of St. Louis County. At the time, founders Bill and Janet Boyer, who both had roots in the traditional American folk music scene, owned the regionally-renowned music shop Music Folk on Lockwood. Focal Point concerts were originally presented at various locations around Webster Groves and the St. Louis area until January 2000, when we found a permanent home in the heart of historic downtown Maplewood.

Throughout the past 50 years, we’ve increased our series to roughly 100 concerts per year, archiving most of them in our expansive YouTube library.
