# Pre-Reading Ideas (Story Prediction)

- Show the cover and ask students what they notice about the wolf –
- Discuss the meaning of "Not-So-Big-Bad"
- Have students predict how this story might be different
- Discuss traditional fairy tales and their elements
- Share experiences about making new friends

#### Vocabulary


- Construction-related terms
