# **November General Meeting of the FBS**

Our meeting last month was very well attended and we continue to see a few more members every month. President David Soho reported that we have 31 paid members. He reminded us that this years due are payable. Bob Wright reported that our treasury is in good shape. Dave also reminded the membership that FBS logo hats, shirts, and pre-mixed bonsai soil are still available.

Dave discussed our participation in the Fresno Home & Garden show in March. The club will have a large bonsai display and an educational display as well as sales tables.

Linda Jacobsen invited the members to become docents in the Clark Bonsai Collection at Shinzen. She noted that a training class is provided for those new to bonsai and volunteering requires only 2-3 hours per month.

Dave reminded the members that the Annual Bonsai Yard Sale will replace our monthly meeting in December. He asked for volunteers to help with set up on Friday at 3:30 PM.

Following the business meeting, John Wright provided the attendees with a thoughtful and well organized presentation on the care and sharpening of bonsai tools. John's other hobby is wood carving and this has made him very knowledgeable in sharpening.

John pointed out that tools like concave cutters must be razor sharp to avoid crushing branches and encouraging prompt healing. He showed us how to simply hold these cutters up to the light to spot nicks in the edges and gaps in the closure. He also reminded us of the need to use alcohol wipes, cleaning pads, or other disinfectants to sterilize tools and prevent the spread to diseases between trees.

He noted that rust is very destructive to tools because it leaves permanent pitting in the blades. He advised saving old, previously rusting tools for root work only.

John noted that the typical bench grinder is both too coarse and rotates too fast for bonsai tools...they create heat from friction which will cause the steel to loose it's hardness.

He noted that one need not buy expensive diamond sharpening stone to produce the desired edge, but these are available at Harbor Freight if desired. Wet-or-dry sandpaper will work as well.

John also noted that we should never assume that new tools are either sharp nor straight. He noted that the ideal cutting edge is a "mirror".

He recommends obtaining a hard flat surface, such as a scrap piece of polished granite or glass plate. He suggests buying different grits of emery cloth and gluing each to a hard flat surface, then sharpening the edge of your tool with



slow, light pressure strokes while pulling the edge toward you. Take your time. He suggests gradually honing with a finer grit (start with #150 and proceed to #1000) before finishing with stropping compound on a leather surface glued to a paddle or granite. Remove any burs that form during honing or stropping. He advises going slowing and honing tools every week after use rather than once per season. Remove as little metal as possible. He noted that Flexcut Gold Sharpening Compound is a good product for stopping. Leather remnants can be obtained at Hobby Lobby.

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#### **November Bonsai Basics**

The November Bonsai Basic class appeared to be entirely too entertaining to be educational!

The class started with a continued demonstration of wiring technique.

After that, instructor David Soho introduced a new approach to learning bonsai styling; The First Annual Bonsai Basics Team Challenge! The class was divided into four teams of three students each. Each team was given a five gallon juniper (Procumbens nana) and advised to evaluate the tree and devise a bonsai from that material. The team will work on the tree over the next six months and the winning bonsai will be selected by an independent judge in May or June. Each team will have an instructor to assist them. Members will draw sketches of their design plans. Team members will take turns caring for the tree. The trees will be potted in February.
