November Meeting All Bonsai Basics

Unfortunately, the field trip to a bonsai nursery on November 10 had to be postponed. The day was not a total loss because we had a big group of enthusiastic Bonsai Basics students and gratifying number of senior members to conduct a class. The topic was Pruning and Pinching for foliage management. Following a discussion, the students went to work on their own trees and some club specimens, with guidance when they asked for it.

One group focused on a beautiful, bushy Procumbin Juniper, donated to the class by Gene Nelson. The team discussed selecting the best front, selecting a style, branch selection, and preservation and distribution of foliage.

Intermediate Bonsai Study Group

in November

The Intermediate Study Group focused on pruning to improve foliage distribution this month. Bob Hilvers started the discussion with an old Pomegranate which need pruning to reduce coarse branching and wiring to distribute foliage more uniformly. That was followed by a discussion of juniper foliage management. Finally, Bob demonstrating cutting back Trident Maple foliage to improve ramification while preserving foliage for branch girth development in the lower portions of the tree. Again, the goal being to gradually improve both structure and refinement in an established bonsai. (There is more than 100 years of bonsai experience in these students who are listening intently!) \rightarrow

Bonsai Almanac for December

We can work on almost all bonsai species this time of year, with some provisos.

Deciduous trees have almost shed all their leaves. If half the leaves on a tree have turned brown, you may strip the all branches clean or clip the petioles carefully to remove all the leaves. Removing all the leaves provides a chance to study the structure carefully and make decisions about pruning and wiring. It is important to clean all the old leaves and debris off the soil and bench to avoid insects.

It is important to note that during a two week period immediately following leaf drop is a desirable time to prune deciduous species. The trees are still able to heal small cuts during this



period. Maples are less inclined to "bleed" during this window.

This is also an ideal time to remove old needles from Black pines and pluck needles to balance strength in this species. This is an appropriate month to work on conifers in general, including wiring. Large chops, however will be slow to heal. During December, we frequently get rain. In addition, deciduous species are no longer transpiring water. Bonsai generally require watering no more than every 3-4 days. If soil becomes constantly soaked, place a stone under one end of the pot to encourage drainage and allow one end have more air.

It is desirable to scrape the old fertilizer and weeds from the surface of the soil and replace the top 1/2 inch with fresh bonsai soil each winter. Moss should be removed from the surface and preserved on a moist board or tile.

Conifers generally continue to grow slowly in our mild winter climate. Fertilizer may be applied in one half the usual quantity in the corners of the pot for conifers and broadleaf evergreens. Microbial activity is much reduced in the cooler temperatures, however.

Dormant spray (as Neem oil) may be sprayed on conifers (and elms for scale insects) this time of year. Junipers, Cedars and Spruce are more sensitive to oil and it may discolor the foliage. It is recommended that these species be sprayed with 60% of the recommended concentration of the oil. The oil should be rinsed off with water after two hours and the process repeated in two weeks. This is not necessary for elms.

Winter is the season to contemplate and plan. Study your trees. Make decisions about design, potting angles, or the pot style. Will you need to repot? Do you have the appropriate supplies and soil components? Do you need a new pot?


Silly question. You always need a new pot...
