Our Mission The purpose of the Fresno Bonsai Society is to expand the knowledge and skills of Bonsai within its members while offering opportunities for appreciation of this art form to the broader community. We do this through the inspiration of the beauty of the natural world and the rich cultural heritage of Bonsai.

The Summer heat and the drought of the past four years are back again, but be not afraid bonsai lovers, the season offers many promises. Not the least of which is the Annual FBS June Potluck and Saturday, June 13th in the Bonsai Reserve Area at Shinzen Garden. We will work on our own bonsai from 9AM until noon. Lunch will be at noon. Members should park in the service yard behind the Shinzen, as we did for the Spring Blossom Festival. Tables and chairs will be provided. The club will provide drinks, and pulled pork BBQ sandwiches. This is a fun event and an opportunity to meet families, to see the progress made on the Clark Bonsai Collection at Shinzen and enjoy the Shinzen Garden.


Art Zaragoza for Secretary

May Workshop with Ted Matson

Ted Matson provided another outstanding lesson in bonsai styling and horticulture at our May meeting. In the morning,, experienced members presented an assortment of trees from raw yamadori material to semi finished bonsai. Ted went from tree to tree, suggesting both fundamental care for each species as well as long term styling and development. The class was small, so members were treated to a lot of time and attention. In the afternoon Bonsai Basics members received guidance. During the business meeting, plans were confirmed for the June Potluck. The club also confirmed that the Annual Bonsai Yard Sale will be held at the home of Ray and Evelyn Thieme on Saturday, December 5th, 2015. There was a brief discussion of this years Bonsai Show and how it might be improved next year. It was noted that the club is in fine financial condition for the coming year, but our annual expenses average about \$1900 and our revenue from the Show had been only \$450. Ideas were offered were making some additional revenue at the Yard Sale and Home & Garden Show.

From Michael Hagedorn"s Blog: Probably the worst thing we might encounter when we have a hose in our hand is a tree that, when we think about it, has not dried out in three days of sunny summer weather. That ought to send off all kinds of alarm bells in your head. If none go off, install some.

"First of all, don't water the tree if you want it to live. Secondly, place it in semi-shade and mist it frequently. The roots are not working, they are not drawing up moisture. Usually what has happened is root rot: the small roots got crispy dry, then they got waterlogged, and now the soil is staying waterlogged and everything that was living is slowly decomposing. This is like a heart that just stopped pumping and the medics are scrambling for the jump-start. If those small rootlets don't start growing out again soon, the tree will die.

"Tip the pot up on a block to let the excess water run out the bottom of it. The pot must be kept a bit on the dry side, and water introduced by misting onto the leaves to get the tree going again.

"This is one of those cases where prevention is worth it's weight in platinum. Don't let your trees get COMPLETELY dry, and be ever alert to those that are not drying out as you would expect.

Ken To and His Other Bonsai Artistry

Ken To is a member of the Fresno Bonsai Society and an avid Shohin bonsai enthusiast. Ken displays his shohin in our annual show and at the Big Fresno Fair each year where he has won several prizes. He is an active member of the Shohin Study Group and his photos appear frequently on the FBS Facebook page. Most of us did not appreciate how remarkably famous Ken is around the country and even internationally for his other bonsai passion; wire sculptured bonsai art. Late last year Ken was commissioned by the former Weyerhaeuser Pacific Bonsai Collection to create a display of his wire sculptured bonsai as part of that famous exhibit. Ken produced 40 trees.
