FBS Meeting in May

The general meeting of the FBS was held at the Reserve Area of the Clark Bonsai Collection and was presided over by Dave Soho. He reviewed the three major events that we had participated in this Spring, including the Fresno Home & Garden Show, the Shinzen Garden Blossom Festival and the Koen-Nai No Bonsai fundraiser for the Clark Collection. Bob Wright reported the revenues from each event and noted that our club finances are well in the black currently.

Bob Hilvers noted that the Koen-Nai earned well more than expected at near \$9000. Bob noted that the Clark Collection Committee will have to decided what activities will be most productive with our resources for next year. He made a point that the collection will have to engage the eight other bonsai clubs in Area C of the GSBF, if they are to grow that event and the collection.

Another major question, which was not settled at this meeting, was how many and which activities the FBS will participate in next Spring. The Home & Garden exhibit was deemed very successful and the organizers would like us to return. The consensus of the FBS at this meeting was that the club should only do two of the three events. (Perhaps as a result of too many shows, It was noted that the bonsai from FBS in the Blossom Festival were poorly displayed and prepared. It was proposed that there be a small committee to select and arrange trees for future shows. And that more continuous effort be made at teaching bonsai display.)

Following this discussion, there was a presentation on basic bonsai information for docents and a walking tour of the current exhibit.

Bonsai Basics in June

The final meeting of this year for the Bonsai Basics Study Group will be June 9 am at 1416 Roberts Avenue in Clovis Ca.

(Participants: don't forget to park on Sunnyside, not in front of homes on Roberts, please.) The class will be focused on decandling and pine management. Those members who participated in the pine workshop at Ed Clark's Round Valley Nursery should bring those pine so we can discuss your plans. Please don't candle prune prior to the class. Mitch wants to see the pines from the first workshop also. He has black pines for those who don't have any pines.



April Bonsai Basics

Bonsai Basics in April saw enthusiastic 15 students including 3 new folks. The class focused on leaf pruning and air layering. It was very well received. Harold Mitchell noted that last years students brought all the supplies needed to do their own air layers. They explained what they were going to do and how to new members. The Bonsai Basics class is achieving Harold's goal of developing both practioners of bonsai and teachers. He notes that teaching is the best way to learn. The Bonsai Basics Study Group has virtually tripled in size in the past year and added many new active members to the Fresno Bonsai Society.

Volunteers Needed to Docent at the Clark Bonsai Collection at Shinzen

Many members of the FBS have volunteered as docents and frequently attended in the bonsai exhibit. As the vacation season starts, more volunteers are need to help. The bonsai exhibit cannot be open to the public without a docent present to both answer questions and supervise.

The bonsai exhibit has established a new policy because of the intense summer heat. The exhibit area will be closed if the forcast temperature is 100F or higher. In June, for example, the bonsai will be closed on Fridays and open only from 10AM until 2PM on Saturday and Sunday. This will avoid the hottest part of the day in the late afternoon.

This does not require a sophisticated knowledge of bonsai and a class is available for training.


The Kinoshita Family and David Nguy Make Outstanding Donations to the Clark Bonsai Collection at Shinzen

Bonsai Almanac for June

By now all healthy bonsai should be in full foliage and new growth hardened off.

We are entering the hot season. Remember to rotate your bonsai in relationship to the sun so that growth is balanced throughout the summer. We will get little rain. John Naka recommended soaking the foliage, soil, ground and even overhead shade to increase the local humidity. If the soil is draining well, you cannot "over-water".

June is the correct month to defoliate. The purpose of defoliation is to reduce leaf size, slow growth (to reduce internode length) and allows light into interior branches. Defoliation makes wiring easier. (Defoliating does NOT produce back budding. Some species, such as hornbeams, Japanese maples, and beeches do not tolerate defoliation as well.)

Cutting or pruning can be done now, both to maintain shape and encourage back budding in some species. This is an awkward time to wire new growth if the foliage is soft and green.

Some species, such as Trident maples may still be thread grafted this time of year if the green shoots are partially defoliated for use as the graft.

Rapid growing species should be fertilized now and Marty Mann says that foliar feeding with Miracle Grow is "excellent"

Insecticide spraying should begin now to prevent scale and spider mite damage. This should be continued every 2 weeks during the cool morning hours only, throughout the summer.

Atsuko Kinoshita made another significant donation to the Collection: a concrete bonsai pot made in one of the Japanese Internment camps during WWII. This is a very special historical and cultural artifact for which the Clark Bonsai Collection is honored to be the conservator.

The FBS Plans to Make a Showing at the 2016 Big Fresno Fair

The Big Fresno Fair is October 5-16 this year, but the deadline to sign up to enter is September 10th for paper entries and September 12 for online entries. The FBS has previously won many of the awards in the bonsai exhibition at this event. The grand prize has often gone to an FBS member for the last few years. Last year much of our membership was simply too occupied with the grand opening of the Clark Bonsai Collection at Shinzen to participate. Like the Home & Garden Show, this event provides exposure to bonsai to a large audience. This is part of our mission. This year, with strong support from Jennifer Waite and Dave Soho, we plan to have every member, from novice to senior, display a tree.



The venue is secure and the bonsai are watched carefully. They are beyond reach from the public. Consistent watering will be provided. We may provide some demos and signs to promote the club.

Bonsai are displayed without tables or accent plants.

Prizes are awarded for various sizes and styles of bonsai, including separate categories for first-time participants.

It costs only one dollar to enter each tree. There are small cash prizes in each category.

This is an excellent opportunity to practice bonsai display skills like pot preparation, pruning, and weeding.
