Recap FBS May 8th meeting at Tice Park


It was another great Spring day for the FBS gathering at Tice Park in Fresno. Mike Saul announced the results of the election of officers for the coming year the vote by members approved the following:



Steve DaSilva's Presentation on Pines

Health of Tree

Needles should be sharp and sturdy, dark green and cool to the touch.

The more spring and summer growth the better for health.

New bud should be white and pointed.

Stressed trees will produce lots of cones and pollen.

Red, cork bark, and white pine tend to be weaker.

Growth Habit

Top dominate.

Multi-headed will shade out lower limbs.

Tip and sun side are the stronger areas.

Rotate your trees to help balance growth.

**Winter--February to early March, make large cuts at this time before the new candles start to move.

**Spring--decandling May - July (some thinning and cut back).

Coast--May 15 to June

Inland--June 15

Valley--June 15 to July 4

Shorter growing season, decandling early.

**Bottom--middle--top 7-10 days apart giving bottom head start.

**Take out all weak candles

7-10 days later med ones come out

7-10 days later take out strong candles

**Bark--starts to form in 15 years in black pines

30 years out on branches.

**Fall --Thin-cut back, thin needles, clean-up, take out knobs. Thin to 3-4 buds on bottom branches, two buds on top branches.

**White Pine--Cut needles, don't pull them.

Cut candles taller, leave stubs on 1/3 of candles.

In Fall take off larger candles as they grow.

- **Mugo Pines--Do cut back on strong branches, open up. Don't bother taking off candles.
- **Soil mix for pines--red lava, sand, shale, perlite, some fir bark, or pumice and akadama.
- **Fertilize--In spring when candles start to grow. Fertilize regularly until decandling starts. Stop in summer. Start again when summer growth has stopped. November to March don't fertilize. July to August don't fertilize.

In Spring use high nitrogen fertilizer. In fall use low nitrogen fertilizer.

Weak trees and young stock you can fertilize all the way through the year.

Use high nitrogen fertilizer spring and summer. Feed with Miracle Grow, use Super-Thrive.














Request for Volunteers
