This year our picnic was really fun and very well attended (about 40 members and families) at the Clovis Botanical Garden, thanks to Dave and Carolyn Soho.


Dave arranged for our own BBQ chef and the entrees. He and Carolyn arranged for tableware and drinks. He also obtained a huge number of raffle items.

Learning By Doing

The volunteers who care for the Clark Bonsai Collection at Shinzen Garden are called the *Curatorial Team.* They are us. That is, will few exceptions, the Curatorial Team is made up entirely of volunteers from the Fresno Bonsai Society.

They prune, wire, repot, water and perform a multitude of tasks to keep the bonsai healthy and beautiful, all under the supervision of the curator, Bob Hilvers. They learn both the design and horticultural skills needed to develop fine bonsai.

They have access to the masters who guide the bonsai, like Ryan Neal and David Nguy.

Thus, the curatorial volunteers who work 1-2 mornings per week in the garden are rewarded with "hands –on" instruction that is "in the moment" each season. This is hard to get training.

The Big Fresno Fair and Bonsai

The Fresno Fair is an opportunity for the FBS to display our bonsai and to demonstrate a higher level of art to the public. The judged competition (although not always expert) permits us to show the benefits of belonging to the FBS to a broad audience. We have also provided demonstrations some evenings. One of our missions is to introduce the art form to our community.

Unfortunately the deadline for entering one or more bonsai is very near the date of our first meeting in September. The cost of entry is \$1 per tree.

The bonsai are displayed in the Floriculture Exhibit. This is a secure area and the bonsai are observed by a staff member during open hours.

There is an issue with watering and sun light however. In order to insure the health of our trees, we must arrange a schedule of volunteers to go to the fairgrounds every day and water each of the trees. The fair staff was conscientious but not trained to water previously. We had one tree lost and some stands damaged last year. We must do this ourselves. We will discuss this at the September meeting.

If, at any time, a bonsai appears unhealthy or stressed, it may be removed from the fair. Bonsai displayed in the fair will be without direct sunlight for 13 days.

The Fair runs from October 5-15 this year. The deadline for mailed entries is September 9th but electronic deadline is September 11th.

If enough members are interested in displaying trees in the fair, we will try to establish a volunteer list to water daily. The SHOHIN STUDY GROUP will meet Wednesday, September 20th, at Steve DaSilva's home, at 5 PM. The address is 6470 East Manning Avenue in Fowler. This will be a potluck dinner. Everyone is welcome.



BULLSEYE BONSAT



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This general seasonal advice for bonsai care was paraphrased from a piece written by Chris Ross for Golden Statements:

In Fall, take all remaining fruit from fruiting/ flowering trees, and feed lightly to encourage good fat buds for next Spring. Some growers feed lightly all year in the Mediterranean-type climates (like Fresno). Because of the consistency, they are able to control and anticipate the growth better than with some other feeding methods. October and November are pretty good times to do some heavier pruning, some creative wiring, and repotting for these trees, as well as the Beeches and evergreen oaks. Heavy pruning and wiring is good for the olives in Autumn as well.

While all that is happening, it's time to remove wire from maples and elms, and do some light pruning to retain the shape of the trees going into dormancy.

Black pines that were decandled in June need to be down to two buds per decandling site heading into Winter. This is a general rule, just like the general rule that azaleas need to be cut to two stems per division site. There are always exceptions, and if you don't know what those are, take your tree to a club meeting and get some advice from someone who has good healthy trees of that type. Nothing can substitute for good advice from someone who knows.

By the time the leaves of deciduous trees lose their green color, they can be defoliated and sent to bed for a good sleep, because no more food is being made there, and because you've been pushing them and they need the rest. No point in wiring a tree that's not going to be growing. But the trees do fatten up a bit and the wire could end up scarring the bark.

The flush of warm weather in Fall common to Mediterranean climates is a rallying call to picnic for every bug, worm, fungus and ant on God's green earth, so be vigilant. There are numerous products both natural and chemical that will do a good job of protection and elimination, but obey the rules: Never when the day's sun is already getting too warm. Never when it's going to rain. A dormant spray now and in early spring to kill eggs and hibernating insects is advisable.

Autumn can be treacherous for watering bonsai. If the days are hot transpiration slows down, and on cooler nights there's very little evaporation. You can end up with a soggy pot, especially those that have grown a lot and are now draining poorly. Poke eight or ten holes through the soil deeply to conduct water through and oxygen into the soil. If fertilizer and akadama have broken down, such that the surface soil is compacted and not draining, scratch off the top inch with a chop stick and replace it with fresh bonsai soil. When deciding on when to water, scratch the soil with a chopstick to make each tree prove it needs water. Breezy afternoons or evenings can dry the trees out quickly. Most authors advise against watering foliage because it encourages fungus, particularly with warm nights.

Clean up all the detritus, clean off the benches and stands, close up all the soils and containers, get ready for the pleasures of dormancy.

In our Mediterranean climate, evergreen species, both conifers and broadleaf, will continue to grow slowly. Most authors recommend continued light fertilizer for this trees through the winter. Deciduous trees are dormant and do not benefit from fertilization after leaf drop.
