The next meeting of the FBS will be Saturday, November 14th, at 9AM in the azumaya within the Shinzen Garden at Woodward Park. In the business meeting we will discuss the December 5th bonsai yard sale and the Christmas Party that same evening at Wassabi Off the Hook in Fig Garden Village. The upcoming bonsai dig near Prather will be discussed. Following the brief business meeting, we will retire to the reserve area in the bonsai garden to work on trees.

The 38th Annual Convention of the Golden State Bonsai Federation will be held October 29 through November 1st at the Riverside Convention Center in Riverside California. If you are new to bonsai or have never attended a GSBF convention, we urge you to consider devoting a day to this event, despite the distance. The convention will provide two spectacular bonsai exhibits, a suiseki exhibit, numerous demonstrations, and a huge vendor area where you will find a great selection of trees, pots, tools, books and supplies. It is worth the drive if you love bonsai.

October Meeting of FBS Revisited Several Issues

The FBS met at the azumaya within the Shinzen Gardens in October. President Peter Schaffert noted that there were no chairs and limited electricity. He suggested that we continue to consider other options for a meeting place. The previous meeting had been held in the reserve area at the bonsai garden but the road noise was intolerable.

After discussion, a motion was passed to expand our exhibit at the Home & Garden Show.

The FBS will continue to exhibit some bonsai at the Annual Blossom Festival.



Ted Matson Shohin Workshop at Round Valley Nursery

Ed and Linda Clark at Round Valley nursery will sponsor two half day shohin workshops with Ted Matson, again this year, on December 12, 2015. The nursery is in Lindsay. Participants may register for one or both workshops from 9AM till Noon or 1PM till 4PM.

Round Hill Nursery has Manawa Black pines and Itoigawa junipers, which have been grown and twisted specifically for shohin bonsai, at very reasonable prices. They also offer Kyshu shimpaku for shohin, and a large variety of maples and larger pre-bonsai trees.

Those who attended last year are encouraged to return with that tree. Pine prices range from \$30 to \$50 with some larger and more developed specimens in the \$110 to \$200 range.

The fee for each session is \$50 which includes lunch. Observer fee is \$5 and includes lunch.

In order to secure your place at the workshop, please send the \$50 fee (after you have made your reservation by phone or e-mail) to Linda Clark at the Round Valley Nursery address by November 20. They must have a minimum number of people.

If You Plan to Collect Yamadori

If you plan to participate in the dig this winter or to collect wild trees elsewhere, note that there is a brief discussion of how to do this in John Naka's book, Bonsai Techniques Volume 1, on page 198.

Hopefully, Dave Soho or other experienced collectors will be there to help.

Bonsai Tasks for November

We have had a warm Fall with a sprinkle of rain.

Continue to watch for cold winds and hot days.

If warm days occur, transfer deciduous trees to shady areas to minimize budding and new growth.

Water less this month, but trees should not be allowed to completely dry out, even in winter dormancy.

Remove dead leaves from deciduous trees and remove all fruit and seed pods.

Remove pine needles with burned tips and any long needles that are two years old.

Fertilizing may continue until December, for trees that are not dormant. Conifers do not go completely dormant, and some recommend continued light feeding during the winter, with potassium and phosphate primarily.

Deciduous trees, in particular, will be too brittle to wire this month, because of reduced sap flow. Avoid wiring.

Transplanting is not advisable in November. Repotting is safer just before the new buds begin to grow in spring. Repotting is traumatic and broken root hairs don't have the ability to repair themselves as they are not growing.

This is the month to study groves and multi-tree arrangements, because trunks stand out when not obscured by foliage. Repositioning individual trees should wait for spring repotting.

Apply lime sulfur to all dead wood . Wet the wood and apply full strength to the jins and shari.

Apply winter doses of systemic insecticides.

Remove moss from potted trees, as it may harbor insects or disease and holds excessive moisture.

This is the season to start evaluating your needs for soil and other supplies. Start screening and storing soil mixtures.

Finally, this is the season to enjoy the season...the gold of ginkgos and the reds and oranges of your maples.
