Accent Plants for our Annual Bonsai Exhibit

Traditionally the Fresno Bonsai Society has always displayed our trees with a *companion plant*. Displaying each accent plant on a small mat or wood disc adds a degree of interest and polish to our exhibit. The *shitakusa* ("under grass") is not meant to be the dominant focus of your presentation. Rather it is a plant material to complete the exhibit of the main focus which is the bonsai. It should round out the exhibit to form a complete impression to make you imagine that it is Winter or Spring or that you are in the woods, or that the bonsai is high up in the mountains. A companion plant should:

- Be in proper proportion to the main focus (*e.g.*, bonsai, suiseki and or scroll)
- Not be more "showy" than the main focus
- Indicate the season of the year
- Indicate to some extent the type of location where the bonsai grows: i.e. in the woods can be indicated by ferns and mosses, deciduous trees more with grasses.

• Containers should be unobtrusive, dull in color and as flat as possible, to the extend the plant material will allow. The plants can also be taken out of the container and be displayed on a flat tray. The club is encouraging everyone to bring a companion plant appropriate for the tree they will display.



January Bonsai Basics—Mike Saul

The presentation started by observing that many new bonsai hobbyists apply wire to their newly purchased "pre-bonsai" without any instruction. While I still believe that wiring is an "intermediate" skill for bonsai, the number of poor wiring jobs I see on FaceBook has led me to try to help our new members.

The first point that I made was that wiring stresses the involved branches and should not be applied to weak or newly transplanted trees.

The second major point was that novice hobbyists should stick to aluminum wire, at least until they have mastered it, before attempting to use copper wire.

What followed was a discussion of the fundamentals of wire sizing, length, and application method. That discussion was far too detailed for this report. I will produce a handout for the bonsai basics students from the cryptic discussion notes that I sent them.

Following my discussion, each student was handed about thirty inches of size 2.5 aluminum wire. A branch from a sequoia in my back yard was clamped to their tabletop. An experienced member then supervised the students while they learned to apply the wire correctly.

We repeated the Ryan Neal mantra: "same angle, same distance, no gaps" all morning.

I acknowledge that wiring cannot be learned with a handout (or a video.) It is best taught by direct application of wire with a knowledgeable person standing by the student, shoulder to shoulder. Some believe that unwrapping wire from a master is also an effective teaching method. I pointed out that volunteering on the Curatorial Staff at the Clark Collect is an excellent way to acquire the many hours of practice need.

My thanks to Bob Wright, Tyler Thomas, and Shawn Miller for helping the students.
