



WORKSHOP WITH JULIAN TSAI

BRANCH PRUNING & SELECTION
JANUARY 13, 2024








OPEN WORKSHOP AT JAY'S

BLACK PINE REPOTTING | FEBRUARY 24, 2024



The open bonsai workshop at Jay's place was a successful and enriching experience for "new "and "old" participants alike.

The highlight of the open workshop was the repotting of a majestic large Japanese black pine bonsai tree.

The photo on the left shows Seng posing next to the black pine before it was root pruned and repotted with new soil. Seng's innovative idea of using a hydraulic floor crane to lift the substantial tree added an element of excitement and efficiency to the process.

In addition to the main event, members had the opportunity to work on their own bonsai trees under the guidance of experienced members. This hands-on aspect allowed participants to learn and refine their bonsai techniques while fostering a sense of community and camaraderie among members.

Overall, the workshop was a resounding success, combining practical skill-building with teamwork and creativity in the art of bonsai cultivation.







KUSAMONO BY LUCY JUDD

FEBRUARY 10TH, 2024

Kusamono, also widely known as companion plants, are elements of bonsai displays that enhance visual presentation and storytelling aspect of the overall composition. Kusamono originated from Japan; its literal meaning is small- potted plants. They are often placed next to bonsai trees to complement and accentuate the beauty of the primary subject: the bonsai tree.

Some of the companion plants can be made out of various materials such as: grasses, ferns, mosses, flowers, and herbs.
They are carefully selected and planted to achieve a harmonious presentation with the bonsai tree's color, texture, and seasonal interest.
Kusamono plants add depth and contrast to the principal subject, thus creating a sense of balance and natural harmony.

Kusamono are typically displayed in shallow containers called "suiban" or "yakimono," which are chosen to match the style and aesthetic of the bonsai pot. They are meticulously groomed and arranged to create visually appealing compositions that evoke scenes from nature, such as woodland floors or meadows.



Presenter Lucy Judd was a teacher in her former profession. She used to teach high school students and was also a track & field coach. Today, she continues to have students; however, Lucy shares her knowledge of bonsai and kusamono with pupils of all ages. She is often demonstrating and teaching during conventions and workshops alike. Most notably, Lucy provided kusamono workshops at the 2023 Shohin Seminar. She has guided countless bonsai and plant enthusiasts in creating their first kusamono plants.



KUSAMONO WORKSHOP

In the above photo, after a power point presentation of the history of Kusamono, instructor Lucy demostrated the careful removal and transfer of a nursery plant into a new pot.

First, she carefully selects a pot for the plant, followed by placing a screen mesh in the pot to keep soil from draining out.

Second, she places a layer of soil in the pot. Next, she carefully arranges the plant with trimmed roots into the pot. The roots are arraged in a radial order. Any long roots are pruned in the beginning. Additional soil is added until the pot is filled.

For all her companion plants, Lucy recommends adding a pinch of "fish meal" to the soil surface to provide nutrients for the tiny plant. Finally, moss is added to the base of the plant to help with water retention.





The pictures above show members of the FBS working on their kusamono during the workshop. Each member had the opportunity to create two small plants that were provided by instructor Lucy from her own garden. Moreover, Lucy makes her own kusamono pots which were available for sale during that day.


Green color on branches sprout

The maple tree below is a miniature version of an adult tree (genus Acer). This tree has been carefully cultivated using bonsai techniques. It has been styled into bonsai due to its graceful foliage, vibrant colors, and distinctive branching patterns. The maple came from the Clark Bonsai Collection.



When a maple is cared for properly, it can display stunning autumn colors. During fall and winter, its intricate silhouette branch structures can be appreciated. Overall maples portray natural beauty in any style and form, making them prized additions to any bonsai collection or garden display.

DAVID NGUY STYLING

MARCH 23, 2024







The Fresno Bonsai Society sponsored David Nguy for a special master demonstration for the club members. Master David is well known in the bonsai world as an expert when it comes to working on California Junipers and black pines.

David and his apprentice Ryan worked on a California Juniper provided by the FBS club which was later raffled away when the styling was completed. The first photo on the top left shows David and Ryan posing behind the final styling of the California juniper. In the left photo, you can see the modification of a branch into what's referred to as Jin, deadwood technique. Master David states that a bonsai artist must keep in mind that the jin is not the center of attention. This can be achieved by making it smaller and less visible compared to the main trunkline. Initially, the tree started with long branches that had no direction or design. Additionally, the trunk could not be appreciated.

The FBS thanks David's frequent presence as an instructor for new and experienced bonsai artists in the Central Valley.
