

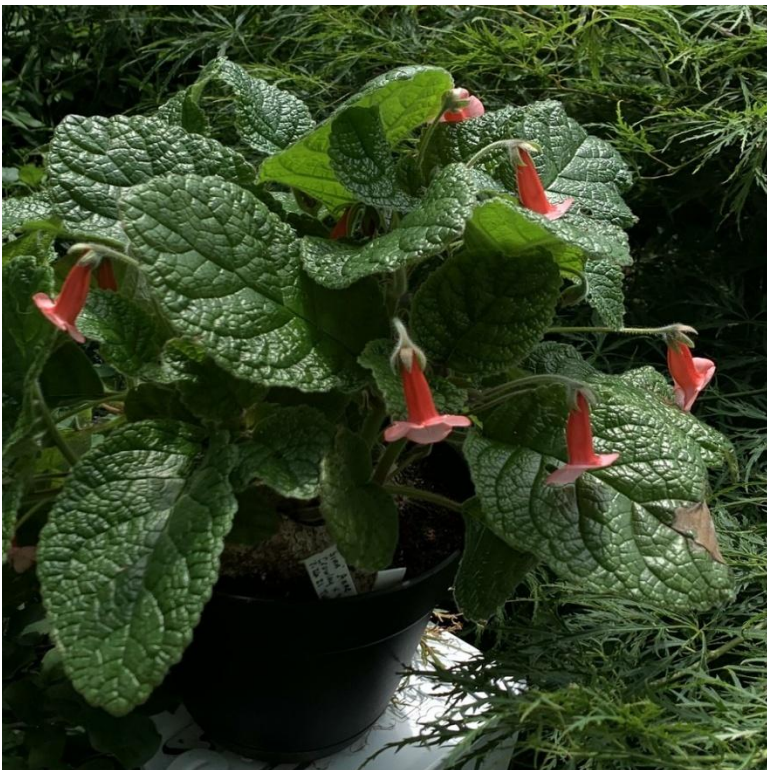

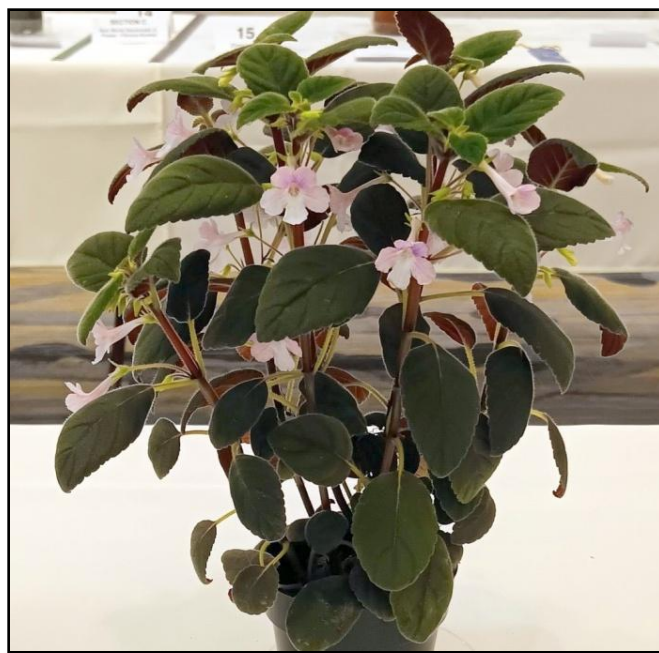

## *Nautilocalyx picturatus*

*Nautilocalyx picturatus* is a beautiful gesneriad from Peru. My plant has five-to-seven-inch long bullate leaves with short, soft, white hairs appearing to come from each bullae. Leaf color, to the eye, is dark green with chartreuse coloring along the veins. The camera picks up a brownish color under the dark green.

Blooms form intermittently and are pure white and fairly large. They only last a day or two. I have not noticed a fragrance from the blooms.

Its habitat is described as a wet tropical biome near the equator where is hot, humid, and rainy. Because of its need for high humidity, I grow it in a terrarium in two parts finely chopped long-fibered sphagnum moss mixed with one part perlite. I mix a small amount of azomite, if I have it, and a small amount of composted crustacean shells or worm castings in with the mix. The terrarium container is covered with plastic wrap and a large coffee filter and grows on a plant stand under LED lights.

The coffee filter decreases the amount of light reaching the plant. Temperatures in the basement vary from the mid-to-high 60s in the winter to the high 70s in the summer. It grows quite slowly; I think that I started with a small plant about two years ago. Several sources describe it growing to a height of eight inches. Mine is about six and one-half inches tall. I have had a few blooms in the past, but this time I had nine open blooms at one time and multiple buds.

Note on sin. PF Indigo: PF Indigo has some red in the throat which this seedling lacks. While this is a pretty flower, it is not the same because it is crossed with some unnamed hybrid."

## *Chrysothemis friedrichsthaliana*: Andy Meier

*Chrysothemis friedrichsthaliana* is similar to the more commonly seen *C. pulchella*. A principle difference is the calyx color, green in *C. friedrichsthaliana* and orange in *C. pulchella*.

This is one of those Gesneriads I picked up from the raffle table, not knowing what it was. It grew last year, but never flowered. (That I noticed). It went dormant and started growing again this past spring. It's a charming plant with small flowers that aren't particularly flashy. The clumped green foliage is quite attractive. It has been growing on my East-facing porch all spring and summer. I keep it watered in moist, but not wet, soil. It is native to Costa Rica.





# Bloomin' Now



David Turley: "My "deck" *Kohleria tubiflora* has gotten quite large. It's a large plant under lights, but left to grow in a 12" pot it's robust. The largest leaf blades are 7", with a 2" petiole. Looking at the plant, I can imagine a roadside in Central America glowing with the plants!

Early this spring, I put some pots that were too large for the light stands into 12" pots on the deck just to see how they did. These plants get several hours of direct sun each afternoon, and the leaves and stems will droop a bit, but perk back up later in the day. The plant I'm growing as *Pearcea* sp. "Carol Ann" \* is one of my favorite gesneriads. It does well under lights and will bloom when small. On the deck it has flourished. The leaves glisten in the sun and the hummingbirds visit frequently.

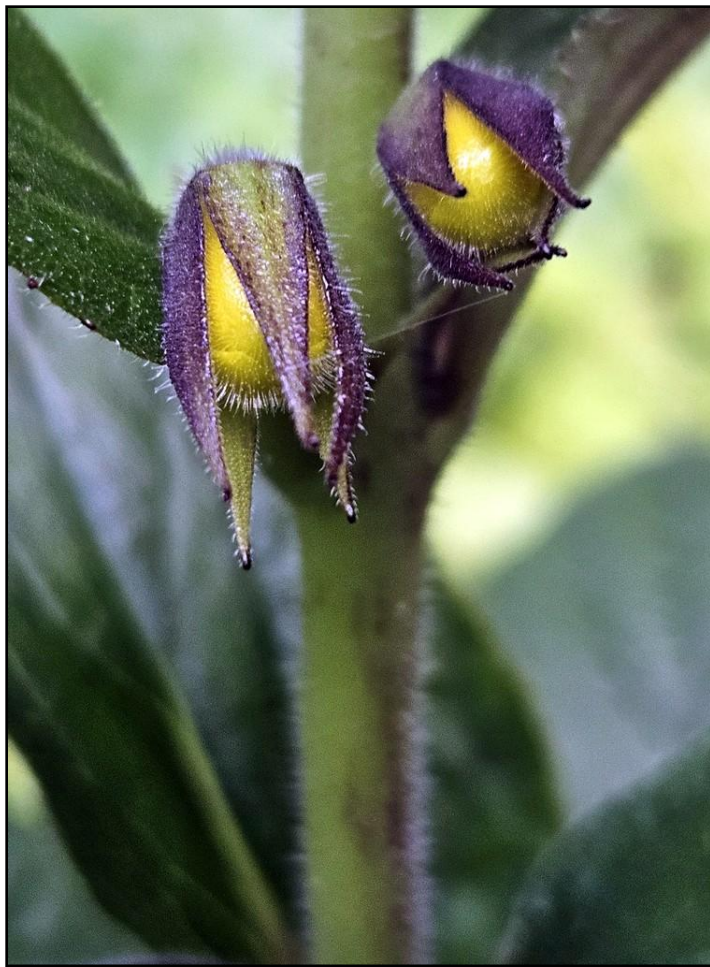
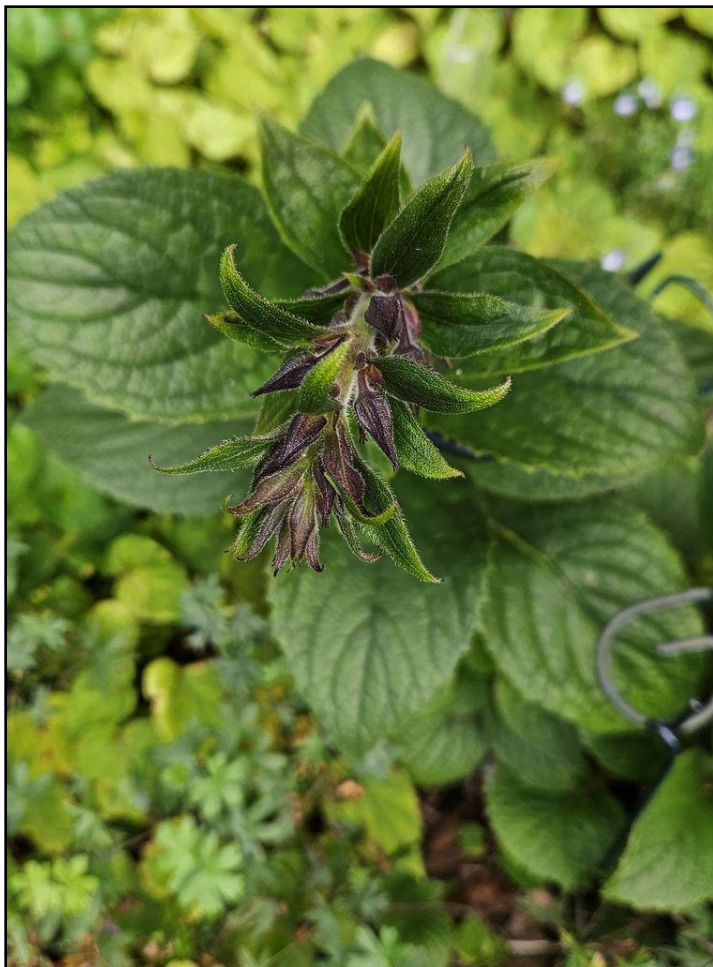

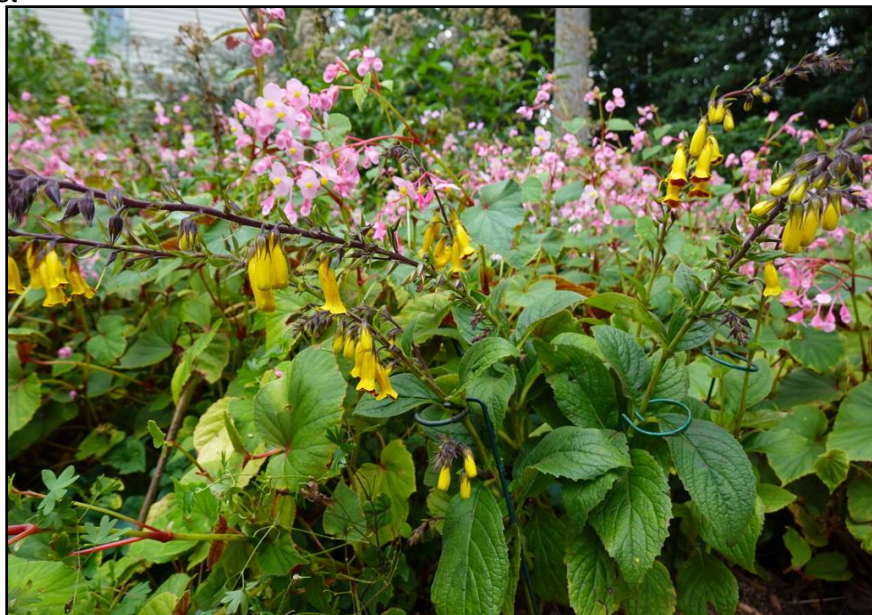




## ***Titanotrichum oldhamii***      Johanna Zinn

This year has been a strange weather year...at least in our backyard. We had a great deal of rain, and the perennials are a foot or two taller and fuller. Perhaps it is the weather that has caused one of my *Titanotrichum oldhamii* plants to start blooming early. Usually this plant blooms in late August and early September. Another plant in much more shade has not shown any signs of blooming. Last year it bloomed around the time of the Begonia Show in late August.

Update—The other plant in deeper shade now has very small fuzzy brown areas of bloom showing. This is good news. The propagules which form sometime after the plant has bloomed will have time to mature before the first frost
