This plant was grown from seed. It originally had another set of leaves, twice as big as the ones it has now. However, this plant does not tolerate too much drying out. At the time, it was under potted, although on a wicking container, and basically it collapsed when it dried out. The big lower leaves had to be removed. The other leaves sustained some damage, but recovered, and the plant has since been potted up. This is a fast growing plant and eager to bloom. Barbara

"Several people have asked what the forming propagules on *Titanotrichum oldhamii* look like.

The propagules may grow like the above photo. When mature, the propagules dry and turn brown. It might take until the end of October or early November for them to dry on the flower stalk.

The bundles of propagules can be removed and dried before separating them. Many growers have found that the viability of the propagules is fairly short.

I have kept them in the refrigerator and had good germination after 6 months."

David Turley: My *Corytoplectus cutucuensis* is striking with dark green, silver-veined foliage and bright orange calyxes and corolla tubes. I haven't quite got the culture down for this one. The leaves turned to mush in the terrarium, but are getting crisp edges in the open. I recently have moved all my gesneriads to over gravel beds for better humidity and individual watering, so we'll see if the *Corytoplectus* improve. (I've fully abandoned wick watering.)

This mini-show was sanctioned by the The Gesneriad Society. The theme of the show was "Gesneriads of a Feather". The show was held in the fellowship hall of the Emmanuel United Methodist Church. It was not open for public viewing.

Jill Fischer was the show chairman. Judges were Jill Fischer, Barbara Stewart, Bill Schmidt, and Maria Waleuff. The schedule was prepared by Jill Fischer, Barbara Stewart, and Bill Schmidt. Bill Schmidt was in charge of staging, awards, and entries. Kitty Hedgepeth did classification and inspection.

The show had 38 exhibits with 28 in horticulture, 6 in artistic, 3 in photography, and 1 in education with 9 members exhibiting.

Jill Fischer won Best-in-Show with her *Aeschynanthus humilis* as well as a \$10 award for Best-in-Section D (Old World Gesneriads in Flower).

Jill also won this award for Section B (New World Gesneriads in Flower—Rhizomatous) with *Achimenes* 'Sauline' Jill also won Section L (Container Gardens) with her Terrarium; and Section N for her photo of *Sinningia leucotricha*.

Barbara Stewart won the award for Section A (New World Gesneriads in Flower-Tuberous) with *Sinningia* 'Spanish Skirts' and Section O (Educational) with her educational display on mealy bugs.


Dena Horton won the award for Section E (Gesneriads Grown for Ornamental Qualities other then Flowers) with Sinningia leucotricha.


