Andy Meier's New Gesneriads

"On a recent shopping trip to the local nursery, I picked up a few gesneriads. Among them:

Achimenes 'Petite Fadette'- a fire engine red double flower on a miniature plant, only 2-3 inches tall growing in a 2-inch pot.

An even smaller *Achimenes* 'Little Lulu', is maybe 1.5-inches tall with bright white flowers with a pink blush that gets more intense toward the outer edges of the petals. The center (or eye) of the flower has a nice contrasting egg-yolk yellow center. I'm hoping I can get rhizomes from these two plants, so I can make more to share. The nicest thing about them, is they don't take up much room. I also picked up a couple *Primulinas* in 2-inch pots.

I also mail-ordered a few plants and was able to get a blooming *Michaelmoelleria vietnamensis*. This is a fairly new genus that is related to *Primulina*. So far, there is only one species to the genus. There is very little (That I could find) in the literature on propagating it. It shipped with two flowers, but they quickly faded and dropped in my greenhouse environment. Once the



plant gets acclimated and better established, I'll try leaf propagation and self pollination to see if I can grow more. Donna shared that she has easily propagated her plant with a leaf cutting and considers it 'easy'! There are two new flowers emerging already with (What looks like) a pup at the base of the plant. The silver variegation or mottling on the leaves varies from leaf to leaf and plant to plant. Photos of more mature plants are fuller with darker green leaves and more prominent silver mottling. I'm really excited about this new gem in my collection. Literature mentions it is closely related to Primulinas."












Bill's Smithiantha zebrina





Smithiantha is a small genus in the family Gesneriaceae. Smithiantha zebrina is an ancestor of many, if not most, of the modern Smithiantha hybrids. It's plush red foliage has long been favored by growers, and the often-spectacular orange and yellow flowers provide a very nice contrast.

There are 7-9 species and a few natural hybrids have been recorded. In the last decade or so, a number of hybrids have been introduced and more are available each year. The whole genus is distributed in southern Mexico, mostly in the state of Oaxaca. Plants produce pubescent leaves that tend to be brittle. In the wild, plants probably follow the natural rain cycle typical of Mexico, with moist summer and dry winters. The underground storage organs are scaly rhizomes. In cultivation, plants behave differently depending on local climate. In places with hot summers, plants tend to grow in late summer and continue throughout winter through spring. Flowers may appear between late fall and spring. In places with mild temperatures year round, plants may behave more as if in habitat. In general, the genus does not require a lot of light. It is said that they need decent humidity and constantly moist but well-drained soils during the growing season to perform well. References: Pacific bulb society and Gesneriad Reference Web.

The plant is fully mature and grows in my cool sunroom. It is very tolerant of temperature extremes, doesn't need repotting often, and flowers reliably." (Editor's note: December 2023)







I just love the delicate color and it has really grown larger this year with multiple crowns! I grow it in a southern window with LED lights and keep it close to the lights as it grows.



Donna: "Sinningia carangolensis (orange) became very leggy this year. Grown under lights in a south window. The blooms are very beautiful. I already cut it back and am watching to see if it will grow back and be more compact closer to the lights. It has new tiny shoots on the tuber. It grows very fast once it sprouts!"
