CALL TO CONFESSION

On a day like today we may want to skip the prayer of confession because today is a day for joy. Why should we pause to think and talk about the ways we as humans mess things up? I get that argument. However, I also believe that the joy of this day is even more joyful when we are honest about who we are. We humans tend to be messy, scattered, and full of doubt at times. Knowing that Jesus was born in a manger for us, and that Jesus loves and forgives us, is even better news. So let us confess together to God, knowing that the honest truth of our lives only makes this good news better.

PRAYER OF CONFESSION

Let us pray.

Holy God, too often we feel as if change is hopeless. The problems of this world feel too big, the path forward is unclear, and we are not confident that we can truly make a difference. We give up hope.

The candle of hope is snuffed out.

Together we pray: Forgive us for extinguishing hope.

Holy God, too often we believe that peace is a thing of fairy tales. Our spirits are anxious. Our bodies are weary. Our world is fractured. Instead of praying for peace—both in ourselves and in our society—we assume that peace is no longer on the table. We give it up.

The candle of peace is snuffed out.

Together we pray: Forgive us for extinguishing peace.

Holy God, too often we paint joy as naive—a luxury reserved for children and pets. We forget that you ate with friends, that you went to weddings, that you laughed and rested and hiked mountains. We forget that you knew joy, and that you want joy for us in this fractured world. Forgive us for turning away from your light.

The candle of joy is snuffed out.

Together we pray: Forgive us for extinguishing joy.

Holy God, too often we treat love like a vending machine. We put some coins in and assume that we'll get something back. However, in our wiser moments, we know that love is not meant for keeping score. Love is meant to overflow, to spill out to our neighbors, to transform our world. Forgive us for holding love so tightly.

The candle of love is snuffed out.

Together we pray: Forgive us for extinguishing love.


WORDS OF FORGIVENESS

CHILDREN'S MESSAGE

READING

Let us listen for God speaking to us through the ancient poetry of John, chapter 1, verses 1-5, with contemporary poetic additions by The Rev. Sarah Speed.

Voice A: In the beginning was the Word,

Voice B: way back, a long, long time ago, before the stars, before the day, before the rivers were carved out of clay.

Voice A: In the beginning,

Voice B: way back in that beginning,

Voice A: was the Word. And the Word was with God, And the Word was God. He, Jesus, was in the beginning with God.

Voice B: In other words, we cannot say that love was born in a stable that day, for love was born when the horizon was drawn. It was born in the dark, long before dawn. Love was born with the very first sea and when God breathed life into you and me. Long before Magi or shepherds or dreams, long before sheep or angels that sing, love was here building a way, then and now, and on Christmas day.

Voice A: For all things came into being through him, and without him, not one thing came into being. And what has come into being in him was life, and the life was the light of all people.

GOSPEL

John 1:6-18

The holy gospel according to John. Glory to you, O Lord.

⁶ Then came one named John, sent as an envoy from God, ⁷ who came as a witness to testify about the Light, so that through his testimony everyone might believe.⁸ He himself wasn't the Light; he only came to testify about the Light—the true Light that illumines all humankind. ⁹ The Word was coming into the world—¹⁰ was in the world—and though the world was made through the Word, the world didn't recognize it.

¹¹ Though the Word came to its own realm, the Word's own people didn't accept it. ¹² Yet any who did accept the Word, who believed in that Name, were empowered to become children of God—¹³ children born not of natural descent, nor urge of flesh nor human will—but born of God.

¹⁴ And the Word became flesh and stayed for a little while among us;

we saw the Word's glory—the favor and position a parent gives an only child—filled with grace, filled with truth. ¹⁵ John testified by proclaiming, "This is the one I was talking about when I said, 'The one who comes after me ranks ahead of me, for this One existed before I did.' "¹⁶ Of this One's fullness we've all had a share—gift on top of gift. ¹⁷ For while the Law was given through Moses, the Gift—and the Truth—came through Jesus Christ. ¹⁸ No one has ever seen God; it is the Only Begotten, ever at Abba's side,

who has revealed God to us.

SERMON

OPEN SPACE

During this time of quiet reflection, you are invited to move about the space. There are five stations for you to explore at your own pace:

Prayer & Candle Lighting Station (chancel, baptismal font side)

Pray silently, light candles, or contribute prayers to be read during the Prayers of the People. You may kneel, sit, or stand.

Poetry & Journaling Station (chancel, Advent wreath side)

Read poetry, respond to a journaling prompt, or compose your own poem. You may sit, kneel, or stand.

Drawing & Coloring Station (back of sanctuary, pray-ground area)

Create art in response to a drawing prompt, color a coloring sheet, or sketch/doodle whatever you would like. You may sit around the table.

Visio Divina Station (back wall, across from the pray-ground area)

Take in scripture-inspired artwork, practice Visio Divina (a guided meditation on art), reflect on what you see. You may sit or stand.

Centering Prayer Station (at your seat)

Rest in God's presence using the method of Centering Prayer, which is drawn from the ancient practices of the Christian contemplative heritage. It involves four simple steps:

- 1. Choose a sacred word to serve as your point of focus for the prayer. This word represents your intention to consent to God's presence and action within you. Choose a word in prayer by the guidance of the Spirit. A word of one or two syllables is best, such as God, Jesus, love, peace, mercy, etc.
- 2. Sit comfortably with your eyes closed. Take the time to settle yourself. Silently, inwardly, introduce the sacred word.
- 3. Continue to sit quietly, resting in God's presence. When you notice other thoughts, sensations, or sounds around you, gently return your attention to the sacred word.
- 4. Conclude the time of prayer by slowly opening your eyes and gradually returning your attention to the space.




OFFERTORY PRAYER

LORD'S PRAYER


