Introduction

As we continue through the time after Epiphany, stories of the call to discipleship show us the implications of our baptismal calling to show Christ to the world. Jesus begins proclaiming the good news and calling people to repentance right after John the Baptist is arrested for preaching in a similar way. Knowing that John was later executed, we see at the very outset the cost of discipleship. Still, the two sets of brothers leave everything they have known and worked for all their lives to follow Jesus and fish for people.







¹⁰When God saw what they did, how they turned from their evil ways, God changed his mind about the calamity that he had said he would bring upon them; and he did not do it.




COMMUNION

NOTES ON TODAY'S MUSIC

Richard DeLong (1963-2020) was an American singer, conductor, and expert in contemporary Sacred Harp singing. Sacred Harp is a tradition of sacred choral music that originated in New England before being carried and perpetuated in the American South. This tradition represents one of hte oldest branches of traditional American music that developed between 1770-1820. The name was derived from *The Sacred Harp*, a landmark tunebook published in 1844 with the characteristic shape notes. Richard DeLong was born in Atlanta, Georgia, and raised in the Sacred Harp tradition. In interviews, he often described being taken to his first singing by his grandmother when he was only six months old. Over the course of his career, DeLong taught and hosted workshops at more than 60 music schools across the US, and he was invited to teach Sacred Harp singing in England. DeLong would also serve as the Executive Secretary of the Sacred Harp Publishing Company alongside his own teaching and composition work. Finally, over his life, he put together a collection of over 1500 hours of recordings dated between 1929 and 2011 of Sacred Harp singings.

Johann Sebastian Bach (1685-1750) was a major composer of the end of the Baroque era, and today he is among the most celebrated composers of all time. J.S. Bach came from a large family of North German musicians, and in his day, he was primarily known as a virtuosic organist, harpsichordist, and organ builder. One of the principal features of J.S. Bach's music is synthesis - bringing together many styles, forms, and national traditions developed earlier in the Baroque period - as well as his mastery of both counterpoint and harmony, the horizontal and vertical in music. J.S. Bach has contributed major works to almost every genre of both instrumental and vocal music, but he is best known for his organ music and sacred compositions.
