



READING I

Deuteronomy 26:1-11

¹ "When you have come into the land that the LORD your God is giving you as an inheritance to possess and you possess it and settle in it, ² you shall take some of the first of all the fruit of the ground, which you harvest from the land that the LORD your God is giving you, and you shall put it in a basket and go to the place that the LORD your God will choose as a dwelling for his name. ³ You shall go to the priest who is in office at that time and say to him, 'Today I declare to the LORD your God that I have come into the land that the LORD swore to our ancestors to give us.' ⁴ When the priest takes the basket from your hand and sets it down before the altar of the LORD your God, ⁵ you shall make this response before the LORD your God: 'A wandering Aramean was my ancestor; he went down into Egypt and lived there as an alien, few in number, and there he became a great nation, mighty and populous. ⁶ When the Egyptians treated us harshly and afflicted us, by imposing hard labor on us, ⁷ we cried to the LORD, the God of our ancestors; the LORD heard our voice and saw our affliction, our toil, and our oppression. ⁸ The LORD brought us out of Egypt with a mighty hand and an outstretched arm, with a terrifying display of power,

and with signs and wonders; ⁹ and he brought us into this place and gave us this land, a land flowing with milk and honey. ¹⁰ So now I bring the first of the fruit of the ground that you, O LORD, have given me.' You shall set it down before the LORD your God and bow down before the LORD your God. ¹¹ Then you, together with the Levites and the aliens who reside among you, shall celebrate with all the bounty that the LORD your God has given to you and to your house."







COMMUNION


The congregation may be seated.





Financial Update

Only one month into 2025 and we are off to a good start. We have revenues from all sources at \$24,850 vs. budgeted at \$23,063. Total expenses year to date are \$22,852 vs. budgeted of \$24,498. The surplus at the end of January was \$1,999.

Call Committee Update

We now have a slate of candidates to review and interview in the coming weeks. It may take several months to complete the interview process. After we interview the candidates will either have found a new pastor, or we will begin the process again with a new slate of candidates. The Synod has told us to take our time and prayerfully consider what is right for St. John's. As we move through the process, we will provide the congregation with regular updates; however, we will not be able to share details on the individual candidates or our specific impressions. Love Your Neighbor

St. John's, in partnership with six other local Wilmette congregations, is selling yard signs as a fundraiser for the Wilmette Food Pantry. The message is intentional, "Love Your Neighbor as Yourself," from a pretty familiar piece of scripture (Luke 10:25-37). These signs were the brain-child of your local Wilmette ecumenical clergy group and grew as a response to the tumultuous election year we had in our country. "People have gotten mean," was the response from village workers at city hall when one congregation asked how their faith community can better support the larger village of Wilmette. St. John's has a limited number of signs for sale at \$20.00 each and you can pay First Presbyterian Church of Wilmette directly

on their website through their giving link in the top right hand corner. \$6.00 pays for the cost of the sign, and the rest goes to the Wilmette Food Pantry at Trinity UMC.
