
PSALM


²² Peter took him aside and began to rebuke him. "Never, Rabbi!" he said. "This will never happen to you!" ²³ Jesus turned to Peter and said, "Get yourself behind me, you Satan! You are trying to make me stumble and fall. You're setting your mind not on the things of God, but of mortals." ²⁴ Then Jesus said to the disciples, "If you wish to come after me, you must deny your very selves, take up the instrument of your own death and begin to follow in my footsteps. ²⁵ "If you would save your life, you will lose it; but if you would lose your life for my sake, you will find it. ²⁶ What profit would you show if you gained the whole world but lost yourself? What can you offer in exchange for your very self? ²⁷ "The Promised One will come in the glory of God accompanied by the angels, and will repay all according to their conduct. ²⁸ The truth is, some of you standing here will not taste death before you see the coming of the Promised One's reign."

^{17:1} Six days later, Jesus took Peter, James and John up on a high mountain to be alone with them. ² And before their eyes, Jesus was transfigured—his face becoming as dazzling as the sun and his clothes as radiant as light. ³ Suddenly Moses and Elijah appeared to them, conversing with Jesus. ⁴ Then Peter said, "Rabbi, how good that we are here! With your permission I will erect three shelters here—one for you, one for Moses and one for Elijah!" ⁵ Peter was still speaking when suddenly a bright cloud overshadowed them. Out of the cloud came a voice which said, "This is my Own, my Beloved, on whom my favor rests. Listen to him!" ⁶ When they heard this, the disciples fell forward on the ground, overcome with fear. ⁷ Jesus came toward them and touched them, saying, "Get up! Don't be afraid." ⁸ When they looked up, they did not see anyone but Jesus.





LORD'S PRAYER



NOTES ON TODAY'S COMPOSERS

Florence B. Price (1887-1953) was an American composer, pianist, organist, and music teacher. Born in Little Rock, Arkansas, she attended the New England Conservatory of Music before moving to Chicago where she became the first African-American woman to have a composition played by a major orchestra. Florence Price's compositional output includes four symphonies, four concertos, a wide range of other orchestral works, chamber music, a choral cantata and other choral works, many vocal works and spiritual arrangements, and wide variety of solo keyboard music.

Victor C. Johnson (b. 1978) is a prolific arranger and composer with over 350 varied works in print. A graduate of the University of Texas at Arlington, he is also the Choral Editor for Sing!, the education publishing division of the Choristers Guild, and he has served since 2007 as the Minister of Worship and Arts at Shiloh Baptist Church in Plano, Texas.

Eurydice V. Osterman (b. 1950) is a Fulbright scholar, author, and composer. She attended Andrews University in Berrien Springs, Michigan (B.M., M.M.) and then the University of Alabama in Tuscaloosa (DMA in Composition) as the first woman and first African American to graduate with this degree. Dr. Osterman was active as an organist as well as a professor of music theory and composition at Oakwood University before moving to Northern Caribbean University in Jamaica.
