



SERMON

¹ Beware of practicing your piety before others in order to be seen by them; for then you have no reward from your God in heaven.

²'So whenever you give alms, do not sound a trumpet before you, as the hypocrites do in the synagogues and in the streets, so that they may be praised by others. Truly I tell you, they have received their reward. ³But when you give alms, do not let your left hand know what your right hand is doing, ⁴so that your alms may be done in secret; and your God who sees in secret will reward you.

⁵ And whenever you pray, do not be like the hypocrites; for they love to stand and pray in the synagogues and at the street corners, so that they may be seen by others. Truly I tell you, they have received their reward. ⁶But whenever you pray, go into your room and shut the door and pray to your God who is in secret; and your God who sees in secret will reward you.

⁷ When you are praying, do not heap up empty phrases as the Gentiles do; for they think that they will be heard because of their many words. ⁸Do not be like them, for your God knows what you need before you ask.

⁹ Pray then in this way:

¹⁰Your kingdom come. Your will be done, on earth as it is in heaven.

¹¹Give us this day our daily bread.

¹²And forgive us our debts, as we also have forgiven our debtors.

¹³And do not bring us to the time of trial, but rescue us from the evil one.

¹⁴For if you forgive others their trespasses, God will also forgive you;

¹⁵but if you do not forgive others,

neither will God forgive your trespasses.

¹⁶ And whenever you fast, do not look dismal, like the hypocrites, for they disfigure their faces so as to show others that they are fasting. Truly I tell you, they have received their reward. ¹⁷But when you fast, put oil on your head and wash your face, ¹⁸so that your fasting may be seen not by others but by God who is in secret; and God who sees in secret will reward you.

¹⁹ Do not store up for yourselves treasures on earth, where moth and rust consume and where thieves break in and steal; ²⁰but store up for yourselves treasures in heaven, where neither moth nor rust consumes and where thieves do not break in and steal. ²¹For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also.

PRAYERS OF THE PEOPLE

I invite you to assume a posture of prayer. You may sit, stand, or kneel; fold your hands or turn your hands toward the sky; close your eyes or lift your eyes to the altar.

Inspiring, creating, loving God, listen to us awhile as we speak from the heart the words we would like you to hear this day.

So often today we live as independent people, rarely participating together in communal activities. We communicate through technology, not speaking directly to people in the way we once did. We sometimes eat on our own, even although with a little bit of planning and commitment the family meal could still be a feature within our homes. We exist at times locked in to our own world, as bedroom doors are closed and computers are powered up, as handsets are picked up as soon as they make a noise, or vibrate, and our eyes become glued to the screen and our fingers tap away as we send a message— all the while not noticing the people in the room with us, or beside us as we walk.

Lord, help us see the benefits of time spent with others and encourage us to communicate and share experiences as we chat and do things together.

We remember people today who do not know how to pray and those who do not want to pray. As those who take prayer for granted, recognizing that prayer is the chance to talk to you, we recognize that for some others they have no external focus to talk to— either to whom to express their thoughts

or convey their feelings. Surely this can be hard, leaving the risk of a person bottling up their feelings, internalizing their frustrations. We are glad that you invite us to share honestly and openly how we feel—even if there is anger or disillusionment present. We pray that your Spirit will awaken in people the understanding that you are a God who is ready to hear the prayers of all your people.

Lord, sometimes words are not needed. Sometimes a minister, pastor, priest or worship leader is not required to say out loud the words for us. So help us today in a period of silence to speak directly to you, as we each take the opportunity to tell you what concerns us, in our personal lives and in the world.

Pause for silent prayers.

Lord, thank you for listening today and for being available to us every day. In Jesus' name we pray. **Amen.**

NOTES ON TODAY'S COMPOSERS

Marques L.A. Garrett (b. 1984) was born in Hampton, Virginia, and currently serves as an Assistant Professor of Music in Choral Activities at the University of Nebraska–Lincoln. He conducted the Chamber Singers and University Chorale as well as teaching graduate choral literature before earning his PhD in Music Education at Florida State University. An active conductor, Dr. Garrett is the artistic director of the Omaha Symphonic Chorus and founding conductor of the Nebraska Festival Singers. As a vocalist, he performs as both a baritone and countertenor. His premiere as a countertenor in Dan Forrest's *Jubilate Deo* served as the work's European premiere in Limerick, Ireland. As a composer, Dr. Garrett works predominantly with choral and solo-vocal music, and he has been commissioned by organizations such as Harvard University and Westminster Choir College. Among his latest commissions is his largest work to date, *Dreamland: Tulsa 1921*. This collaborative work with librettist Sandra Seaton for tenor-bass chorus, soloists, and chamber orchestra was commissioned by the Turtle Creek Chorale to tell the story of the Greenwood district of Tulsa, Oklahoma.

Henry ("Harry") Thacker Burleigh (1866-1949) was an American composer, arranger, and singer, and he was instrumental in developing characteristically American music. Burleigh helped to make African-American music more widely availed by arranging spirituals into a more classical form. Born in Pennsylvania, H.T. Burleigh learned to sing from a young age, and he served several local churches as well as a synagogue during his high school years along with appearing as a soloist in community and civic events. He attended the National Conservatory of Music at age 26 where he met Antonín Dvořák, the director of the conservatory. Burleigh was responsible for introducing Dvořák to African-American music, which influenced Dvořák's works composed in the US and led him to say that Black music would be the basis of American classical music. Burleigh would serve as the soloist for St. Gregory's Episcopal Church in New York for 52 years, performed for King Edward VII in London in 1908, and sang at the

Temple Emanu-el in New for 25 years. Along with his many arrangements, he composed between 200-300 original songs, and he was a founding member of ASCAP (American Society of Composers, Authors, and Publishers)

Dr. Carl W. Haywood (b. 1949) was born in Portsmouth, Virginia, and holds advanced degrees in organ, composition, and choral conducting from Southern Methodist University and the University of Southern California. Dr. Haywood has since had a long tenure at Norfolk State university where he serves as the Director of Choral Activities. He also serves as the National Conductor for the 105 Voices of History. He has also served as the organist and choir director at Grace Episcopal Church in Norfolk and served on the Liturgical Commission for the Diocese of Southern Virginia, the Standing Commission on Liturgy and Music for the Episcopal Church of America and as the Director of Music for the Union of Black Episcopalians.
