INTRODUCTION

This week, the center of the church's year, is one of striking contrasts: Jesus rides into Jerusalem surrounded by shouts of glory, only to be left alone to die on the cross, abandoned by even his closest friends. Mark's gospel presents Jesus in his complete human vulnerability: agitated, grieved, scared, forsaken. Though we lament Christ's suffering and all human suffering, we also expect God's salvation: in the wine and bread, Jesus promises that his death will mark a new covenant with all people. We enter this holy week thirsty for the completion of God's astonishing work.

PROCESSIONAL GOSPEL

The congregation gathers in the Fellowship Hall with palms and processional streamers, sitting or standing as each is comfortable. Those who prefer not to participate in the palm procession are invited to join us in Fellowship Hall and then return to the sanctuary through the side door by the organ while the rest of the congregation processes outdoors.

A reading from the Gospel of Mark.

¹When they were approaching Jerusalem, at Bethpage and Bethany, near the Mount of Olives, [Jesus] sent two of his disciples ²and said to them, "Go into the village ahead of you, and immediately as you enter it, you will find tied there a colt that has never been ridden; untie it and bring it. ³If anyone says to you, 'Why are you doing this?' just say this, 'The Lord needs it and will send it back here immediately.' "⁴They went away and found a colt tied near a door, outside in the street. As they were untying it, ⁵some of the bystanders said to them, "What are you doing, untying the colt?" ⁶They told them what Jesus had said; and they allowed them to take it. ⁷Then they brought the colt to Jesus and threw their cloaks on it; and he sat on it. ⁸Many people spread their cloaks on the road, and others spread leafy branches that they had cut in the fields. ⁹Then those who went ahead and those who followed were shouting,

"Hosanna!

Blessed is the one who comes in the name of the Lord!

¹⁰Blessed is the coming kingdom of our ancestor David!

Hosanna in the highest heaven!"

¹¹Then he entered Jerusalem and went into the temple; and when he had looked around at everything, as it was already late, he went out to Bethany with the twelve.

PROCESSIONAL HYMN

The congregation joins in the procession. The marching order is as follows: Cross, assembly members who wish to join, assistant minister, preaching minister, and presiding minister. The route flows from the Fellowship Hall and out to the front of church, then turns toward sanctuary doors for final procession into the nave.







And being found in human form, ⁸he humbled himself and became obedient to the point of deatheven death on a cross. ⁹Therefore God also highly exalted him and gave him the name that is above every name, ¹⁰so that at the name of Jesus every knee should bend, in heaven and on earth and under the earth, ¹¹and every tongue should confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father.

GOSPEL

Mark 15:1-47 *The congregation may be seated.*

The gospel according to Mark. Glory to you, O Lord.

¹As soon as it was morning, the chief priests held a consultation with the elders and scribes and the whole council. They bound Jesus, led him away, and handed him over to Pilate. ²Pilate asked him, "Are you the King of the Jews?" He answered him, "You say so." ³Then the chief priests accused him of many things. ⁴Pilate asked him again, "Have you no answer? See how many charges they bring against you." ⁵But Jesus made no further reply, so that Pilate was amazed.

⁶Now at the festival he used to release a prisoner for them, anyone for whom they asked. ⁷Now a man called Barabbas was in prison with the rebels who had committed murder during the insurrection. ⁸So the crowd came and began to ask Pilate to do for them according to his custom. ⁹Then he answered them, "Do you want me to release for you the King of the Jews?" ¹⁰For he

realized that it was out of jealousy that the chief priests had handed him over. ¹¹But the chief priests stirred up the crowd to have him release Barabbas for them instead. ¹²Pilate spoke to them again, "Then what do you wish me to do with the man you call the King of the Jews?" ¹³They shouted back, "Crucify him!" ¹⁴Pilate asked them, "Why, what evil has he done?" But they shouted all the more, "Crucify him!" ¹⁵So Pilate, wishing to satisfy the crowd, released Barabbas for them; and after flogging Jesus, he handed him over to be crucified.

¹⁶Then the soldiers led him into the courtyard of the palace (that is, the governor's headquarters); and they called together the whole cohort. ¹⁷And they clothed him in a purple cloak; and after twisting some thorns into a crown, they put it on him. ¹⁸And they began saluting him, "Hail, King of the Jews!" ¹⁹They struck his head with a reed, spat upon him, and knelt down in homage to him. ²⁰After mocking him, they stripped him of the purple cloak and put his own clothes on him. Then they led him out to crucify him.

²¹They compelled a passer-by, who was coming in from the country, to carry his cross; it was Simon of Cyrene, the father of Alexander and Rufus. ²²Then they brought Jesus to the place called Golgotha (which means the place of a skull). ²³And they offered him wine mixed with myrrh; but he did not take it. ²⁴And they crucified him, and divided his clothes among them, casting lots to decide what each should take.

²⁵It was nine o'clock in the morning when they crucified him. ²⁶The inscription of the charge against him read, "The King of the Jews." ²⁷And with him they crucified two bandits, one on his right and one on his left. ²⁹Those who passed by derided him, shaking their heads and saying, "Aha! You who would destroy the temple and build it in three days, ³⁰save yourself, and come down from the cross!" ³¹In the same way the chief priests, along with the scribes, were also mocking him among themselves and saying, "He saved others; he cannot save himself. ³²Let the Messiah, the King of Israel, come down from the cross now, so that we may see and believe." Those who were crucified with him also taunted him.

³³When it was noon, darkness came over the whole land until three in the afternoon. ³⁴At three o'clock Jesus cried out with a loud voice, "Eloi, Eloi, lema sabachthani?" which means, "My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?" ³⁵When some of the bystanders heard it, they said, "Listen, he is calling for Elijah." ³⁶And someone ran, filled a sponge with sour wine, put it on a stick, and gave it to him to drink, saying, "Wait, let us see whether Elijah will come to take him down." ³⁷Then Jesus gave a loud cry and breathed his last. ³⁸And the curtain of the temple was torn in two, from top to bottom. ³⁹Now when the centurion, who stood facing him, saw that in this way he breathed his last, he said, "Truly this man was God's Son!"


⁴⁰There were also women looking on from a distance; among them were Mary Magdalene, and Mary the mother of James the younger and of Joses, and Salome. ⁴¹These used to follow him and provided for him when he was in Galilee; and there were many other women who had come up with him to Jerusalem.

⁴²When evening had come, and since it was the day of Preparation, that is, the day before the sabbath, ⁴³Joseph of Arimathea, a respected member of the council, who was also himself waiting expectantly for the kingdom of God, went boldly to Pilate and asked for the body of Jesus. ⁴⁴Then Pilate wondered if he were already dead; and summoning the centurion, he asked him whether he had been dead for some time. ⁴⁵When he learned from the centurion that he was dead, he granted the body to Joseph. ⁴⁶Then Joseph bought a linen cloth, and taking down the body, wrapped it in the linen cloth, and laid it in a tomb that had been hewn out of the rock. He then rolled a stone against the door of the tomb. ⁴⁷Mary Magdalene and Mary the mother of Joses saw where the body was laid.

Blessed One, our times are in your hand. Sustain us in discipleship throughout our lives and receive us into everlasting life.





For as often as we eat of this bread and drink from this cup, we proclaim the Lord's death until he comes.




Remembering, therefore, his salutary command,



NOTES ON TODAY'S MUSIC

Amy Beach (1867-1944) was an American composer and pianist. Born in Henniker, New Hampshire Amy Beach showed musical talent from an early age; as a child, she began memorizing songs by one and improvising counter-melodies to well-known tunes by two. Initially taught by her mother, she began taking formal piano lessons at age 6, and it was discovered that she had both perfect-pitch as well as synesthesia, the experience of hearing musical sounds and also instantly seeing particular colors or shapes. She would go on to study harmony, counterpoint, and fugue after the family moved to a suburb of Boston, but even at this stage she was predominantly self-taught - including personally translating Gevaert's and Berlioz's French treatises on orchestration. She played her first recital at 16, but devoted herself more to composition after she married in 1885. Her first major piece was her Mass in E-flat major, and her "Gaelic" Symphony was the first symphony composed and published by an American woman. After her husband's death in 1910, she began performing more widely as well as spending several years at a time working and performing in Europe.

Jeanne Demessiuex (1921-1968) was a widely acclaimed French organist, composer, and teacher. Born in Montpellier, she first studied with her older sister before attending the local conservatory at age 7. She went on to move to Paris in order to study with Marcel Dupré, and she served for 19 years at Saint-Esprit in Paris as well as La Madeleine from 1962 until her death. She performed internationally as a concert organist, and she always performed from memory. She had an active repertoire of over 2,500 compositions memorized including the complete works of J.S. Bach and César Franck as well as the major works of Franz Lizst and Felix Mendelssohn. Jeanne Demessieux was also the first female organist to sign a record contract, and she was awarded several awards for her recordings. Her teacher, Marcel Dupré, said in 1944 that "Jeanne Demessiuex is the greatest organist of all generations." Along with her concert touring, church duties, and teaching at the Conservatoire Royal in Liège, Demessiuex also composed more than 30 original works including organ works, chamber and choral music, and an oratorio, *Le Chanson de Roland*.
