NOTES ON TODAY'S MUSIC

Brenda Portman (b. 1980) is an American organist and composer. Born in Grafton, Wisconsin, she began studying the organ in high school before eventually getting a Bachelors then a Masters in Organ and Church Music. Afterwards, she participated in a variety of national organ competitions, and in 2014 she was the only female American organist to compete in the prestigious Canadian International Organ Competition in Montréal. She earned a doctorate in 2016 from the University of Cincinnatti's College-Conservatory of Music, and she currently serves as the resident organist at Hyde Park Community United Methodist Church in Cincinnatti. Increasingly in recent years, she has also been commissioned by the American Guild of Organists and individual musicians, and she has written predominantly for solo organ, organ-plus-instrument, and choral works.

John Bennett (1735-1784) was an English composer and organist. Little is known of the details of John Bennetts life beyond the fact that he had served as the organist for thirty years at St. Dionis Backchuruch in London, which has since been demolished. Charles Burney, an English musicologist, later wrote that Bennett was a very diversely talented musician who performed professionally as an organist, violist, a singer, and a dancer. He was also well-regarded enough to attract Handel to his performances. While he likely composed many works, the only remaining works are three hymn tunes and his *Ten Voluntaries for Organ*.
