

GOSPEL Mark 5:21-43

The gospel according to Mark.

Glory to you, O Lord.

²¹When Jesus had crossed again in the boat to the other side, a great crowd gathered around him; and he was by the sea. ²²Then one of the leaders of the synagogue named Jairus came and, when he saw him, fell at his feet ²³and begged him repeatedly, "My little daughter is at the point of death. Come and lay your hands on her, so that she may be made well, and live." ²⁴So he went with him.

And a large crowd followed him and pressed in on him. ²⁵Now there was a woman who had been suffering from hemorrhages for twelve years. ²⁶She had endured much under many physicians, and had spent all that she had; and she was no better, but rather grew worse. ²⁷She had heard about Jesus, and came up behind him in the crowd and touched his cloak, ²⁸for she said, "If I but touch his clothes, I will be made well." ²⁹Immediately her hemorrhage stopped; and she felt in her body that she was healed of her disease. ³⁰Immediately aware that power had gone forth from him, Jesus turned about in the crowd and said, "Who touched my clothes?" ³¹And his disciples said to him, "You see the crowd pressing in on you; how can you say, 'Who touched me?'" ³²He looked all around to see who had done it. ³³But the woman, knowing what had happened to her, came in fear and trembling, fell down before him, and told him the whole truth. ³⁴He said to her, "Daughter, your faith has made you well; go in peace, and be healed of your disease."

³⁵While he was still speaking, some people came from the leader's house to say, "Your daughter is dead. Why trouble the teacher any further?" ³⁶But overhearing what they said, Jesus said to the leader of the synagogue, "Do not fear, only believe." ³⁷He allowed no one to follow him except Peter, James, and John, the brother of James. ³⁸When they came to the house of the leader of the synagogue, he saw a commotion, people weeping and wailing loudly. ³⁹When he had entered, he said to them, "Why do you make a commotion and weep? The child is not dead but sleeping." ⁴⁰And they laughed at him. Then he put them all outside, and took the child's father and mother and those who were with him, and went in where the child was. ⁴¹He took her by the hand and said to her, "Talitha cum," which means, "Little girl, get up!" ⁴²And immediately the girl got up and began to walk about (she was twelve years of age). At this they were overcome with amazement. ⁴³He strictly ordered them that no one should know this, and told them to give her something to eat.





NOTES ON TODAY'S MUSIC

Felix Mendelssohn (1809-1847) was a German composer, pianist, and conductor regarded as one of the most celebrated figures of the early Romantic period. Raised in Berlin, Felix was given a comprehensive education that included several languages, landscape painting, literature, and history alongside his musical education. Both Felix and his sister, Fanny, were extremely precocious. Felix wrote during his childhood 5 operas, 11 symphonies for string orchestra, and several concerti, sonatas, and fugues. These were, once preserved in the Prussian State Library, were lost or destroyed in World War 2. Mendelssohn would have a wide-ranging career as both an early conductor and composer that led him all over Europe, and he remained very close with Fanny who was his closest friend and musical advisor. Fanny died in May of 1847, and Felix died shortly thereafter.

Jacques Boyvin (c.1649-1706) was a French organist and composer. Little is known about his early life except that he was born and studied in Paris. He enters the historical record during his tenure as organist at the Hôpital des Quize-Vingts from 1663-1674. From there, he was appointed to the position of titular organist at the Rouen Cathedral where he served until his death. All his remaining organ works exist in two published collections: the first from 1689-1690 and the second from 1700. Each book is formed of eight suites organized respectively around each of the traditional eight Gregorian modes. All the pieces are liturgical in nature and exhibit a brilliant synthesis of the prevailing forms and styles of the French Baroque organ composition.
