

READING Exodus 16:2-4, 9-16

A reading from Exodus.

²The whole congregation of the Israelites complained against Moses and Aaron in the wilderness. ³The Israelites said to them, "If only we had died by the hand of the Lord in the land of Egypt, when we sat by the fleshpots and ate our fill of bread; for you have brought us out into this wilderness to kill this whole assembly with hunger."

⁴Then the Lord said to Moses, "I am going to rain bread from heaven for you, and each day the people shall go out and gather enough for that day. In that way I will test them, whether they will follow my instruction or not."

⁹Then Moses said to Aaron, "Say to the whole congregation of the Israelites, 'Draw near to the Lord, for he has heard your complaining.' "¹⁰And as Aaron spoke to the whole congregation of the Israelites, they looked toward the wilderness, and the glory of the Lord appeared in the cloud. ¹¹The Lord spoke to Moses and said, ¹²"I have heard the complaining of the Israelites; say to them, 'At twilight you shall eat meat, and in the morning you shall have your fill of bread; then you shall know that I am the Lord your God.'"

¹³In the evening quails came up and covered the camp; and in the morning there was a layer of dew around the camp. ¹⁴When the layer of dew lifted, there on the surface of the wilderness was a fine flaky substance, as fine as frost on the ground. ¹⁵When the Israelites saw it, they said to one another, "What is it?" For they did not know what it was. Moses said to them, "It is the bread that the Lord has given you to eat."

PSALM Psalm 78:23-29

Read responsively, the congregation reads the verses in bold.

²³So God commanded the clouds above and opened the doors of heaven,

²⁴raining down manna upon them to eat and giving them grain from heaven.

²⁵So mortals ate the bread of angels; God provided for them food enough.

²⁶The LORD caused the east wind to blow in the heavens and powerfully led out the south wind,

²⁷raining down flesh upon them like dust and flying birds like the sand of the seas,

²⁸letting them fall in the midst of the camp and round about the dwellings.

²⁹So the people ate and were well filled, for God gave them what they craved.



GOSPEL John 6:24-35

The gospel according to John.

Glory to you, O Lord.

²⁴When the crowd saw that neither Jesus nor his disciples were [beside the sea,] they themselves got into the boats and went to Capernaum looking for Jesus.

²⁵When they found him on the other side of the sea, they said to him, "Rabbi, when did you come here?" ²⁶Jesus answered them, "Very truly, I tell you, you are looking for me, not because you saw signs, but because you ate your fill of the loaves. ²⁷Do not work for the food that perishes, but for the food that endures for eternal life, which the Son of Man will give you. For it is on him that God the Father has set his seal." ²⁸Then they said to him, "What must we do to perform the works of God?" ²⁹Jesus answered them, "This is the work of God, that you believe in him whom he has sent." ³⁰So they said to him, "What sign are you going to give us then, so that we may see it and believe you? What work are you performing? ³¹Our ancestors ate the manna in the wilderness; as it is written, 'He gave them bread from heaven to eat.'" ³²Then Jesus said to them, "Very truly, I tell you, it was not Moses who gave you the bread from heaven, but it is my Father who gives you the true bread from heaven. ³³For the bread of God is that which comes down from heaven and gives life to the world." ³⁴They said to him, "Sir, give us this bread always."

NOTES ON TODAY'S MUSIC

Hedwige Chrétien (1859-1944) was a French composer and music teacher. She was born in Compiègne, but little else is known of her early life until she enrolled in the Paris Conservatoire. She studied organ with César Franck alongside composition and music theory. She won several prizes beginning in 1875, and she wrote often for brass and wind instruments. She married a fellow student, the Flautist Paolo Gennaro, in 1887, and in 1889 she joined the staff at the Conservetoire to teach music theory. She would later resign her teaching position in order to focus on composition, and she went on to compose over 250 works including many chamber pieces, orchestral works, two comic operas, over 70 mélodies, and a ballet. Later in her life, she returned to the organ with renewed interest and wrote extensively for the instrument until her death.

Cuthbert Harris (1870-1932) was an English organist and composer. Born in London, he studied at the London Organ school and went on to become a Fellow at the Royal College of Organists. He played for most of his career at St. Andrew's and St. Leonard's parishes in Stratham, London. In his day, he was most well known as a teacher of music theory, and he often taught his courses by correspondence. He went on to publish several method books on music theory, piano, and organ. As a composer, he wrote predominantly sacred works for choir or for organ solo - though he did write a small collection of secular songs.
