
RINGING OF THE BELL

A reading from Isaiah.


²The people who walked in darkness

¹⁴"Glory to God in the highest heaven, and on earth peace among those whom he favors!"







NOTES ON TODAY'S MUSIC

Romualds Jermaks (b. 1931) is a Latvian composer, teacher, and organist. Born in Latgale (eastern region of Latvia) before the Soviet occupation, Romualds learned the organ from his father. He went on to attend the Latvian State Conservatory for composition, and he worked as a music teacher and sound engineer following graduation. He helped compile a record of the Historical Organs of Latvia along with assisting, maintain and repair organs throughout Latvia. He began holding in 1983 a private yearly festival for organ music in his home on a self-built organ. Following the reestablishment of Latvia's independence, Romualds helped newly revived church congregations fill the need for educated organists. He has composed over 900 works, and in 2001, he received the Republic of Latvia's Culture Ministry Award of Gratitude for his lifetime achievements in Latvian music.

Tomás Luis de Victoria (c. 1548-1611) was a Spanish composer who ranks alongside Palestrina and Orlando di Lasso as one of the greatest composers of the 16th century. Little is known of his early life, but in 1565, he was sent by King Philip II of Spain to study in Rome. He studied with and succeeded Palestrina as the Director of Music at the Roman Seminary, and he also assisted Phillipo Neri at San Giolamo della Carità. He returned to Spain where he would service the dowager empress, Maria, and he became the priest and organist for the convent of Descalzas Reales in Madrid. Victoria's works include 21 masses, 44 motets, two passions, a Requiem mass, and many other hymns, psalms and other liturgical works. His style is marked by both elegant usage of Palestrina's contrapuntal technique with a passionate mysticism and deep emotionality.

Louis-Claude Daquin (1694-1772) was a French keyboardist and composer. Born the godson of noted composer, Élisabeth Jacquet de La Guerre, Daquin was a young prodigy who played before Louis XIV at age 6. By 12, Daquin was appointed the organist at the Sainte-Chapelle in Paris. He would hold a variety of positions - even beating out other famous musicians including Jean-Phillipe Rameau - and in 1739 he was made organist to King Louis XV at the Chapelle Royale. In 1755, he would also be made the titular organist at Notre-Dame. His earliest work is a choral piece, *Beatus Vir*, which he composed and conducted at age 8. He is most famous today for his four harpsichord suites as well as his book of Noëls, settings of various Christmas carols popular in his day.
