

THE NICENE CREED





In this meal is the light for all life, Come, for Christ first welcomed us.


COMMUNION

NOTES ON TODAY'S MUSIC

Stuart Ross Carlson (b. 1996) is an American violinist, violist, arranger, and composer. Stuart holds degrees in violin, viola, and composition from the University of Michigan, and he won the VSA International Young Soloists Competition in 2016. He currently plays with the Ann Arbor Symphony Orchestra along with being the featured soloist for the Michigan Philharmonic in 2020. As a composer and arranger, Stuart has made many arrangements for violin as well as string ensembles, and his recent album "Portrait of a Landscape: Seasons" fuses Bluegrass and Classical styles.

George Friedrich Handel (1685-1759) is one of the most well-known composers of the Baroque along with J.S. Bach. Originally from Halle in Saxony, Handel studied as a young boy the organ under Friedrich Wilhelm Zachow, and he later learned the violin, harpsichord, and oboe. He would go on to study in Italy where he wrote his first oratorios before settling in London to write Italian style opera. As Italian opera began to fall in popularity in London, Handel switched to composing oratorio in English - most famously including the Messiah in 1743. The Pastoral Symphony (or "Pifa") comes at the midpoint of Part 1, and it leads into the annunciation to the shepherds.

Lee Dengler (b. 1949) and Susan Naus Dengler (b. 1949) are both American composers and church musicians. Lee holds BA and Masters degrees in composition and Susan holds BA and Masters degrees in music performance. Together, they lead the music and arts ministry at College Mennonite Church in Goshen, Indiana. In tonight's anthem, Susan wrote the lyrics fusing the nativity story with the traditional Sanctus text, and the music was written by Lee Dengler.

Philip LeBas (b. 1958) is an English teacher, bassonist, conductor, and arranger. Born in Cambridge, UK, Philip holds degrees in Natural Sciences, Nuclear Physics, and Theology/Philosophy. He plays the piano, bassoon, and flute, and currently holds the principal bassoonist position with the Maidstone Symphony Orchestra and the Royal Tunbridge Wells Symphony Orchestra. He also serves as the choir director for the Church of Sts Peter and Paul, Seal, near Sevenoaks. He also formerly taught at Walthamstow Hall, an independent girls secondary school in Sevenoaks, as the head of the physics department.

Louis Vierne (1870-1937) was a French organist and Composer who served as the organist of Notre-Dame de Paris from 1900 until his death. Vierne was born almost completely blind, but at age 2 the young Louis was able to pick out the notes of a Schubert Lullaby on the piano after hearing it once. Once his family moved to Paris, Vierne began studying the piano and organ at the National Institute for the Young Blind, and he impressed César Franck with his playing at just 11. Vierne would go on to become a celebrated organist and teacher at the Paris Conservatoire, and would compose extensively for the organ.
