GREETINGS,

Within all of our hearts is a longing for something more. We intuitively know that we were created for more than we experience in life. Even the most heart-felt, joyous, fulfilling, and memorable moments fade from before us and we are left with longing. I believe that this longing is God-given. It creates within us a desire for deeper connection to God and to life within the Kingdom He has prepared for us.

As we take in the sights and sounds of the world around us, we are aware that there has to be something better... something more... something different. Our original design was for a life of righteousness, peace, and joy, not the corruption, injustice, strife, polarization, sorrow, and despair that prevails around us. We know intuitively that the way things are, the way people exist, the way things run, and the way justice is parceled out is well short of the way things should be. Lions and lambs together, nothing to threaten our young ones, spears turned into pruning hooks, prevailing peace, life without tears, mourning and sorrow, life in the fullness of God’s presence and love amid people of every tribe and nation, and rulers all pledging allegiance to the Lamb that was slain all speak to a radically different way of life. The very thought of these realities of the New Kingdom should create a deep sense of yearning in us.

We need to understand that we are right now citizens of this Kingdom and aliens and strangers in this world. The good news is that as strangers, we are not tied to the things we see around us forever. Even now we can by faith fix our gaze upon this New Kingdom. We are not captive to what we observe around us. As the great black preacher, E.V. Hill has preached regarding the horrible reality of the death of Jesus to his followers, “It is Friday but Sunday is coming.” The crucifixion was horrible but it was not the end of the story; resurrection was.

The call to Advent is upon us. Never in my life have I anticipated a church liturgical season more than the season right in front of us.

SESSION NOTES

Since the last Session meeting in August, there has been a Called Congregational Meeting to make changes to the By-Laws and a Called Session meeting. The congregation approved changing the quorum for Congregational meetings from twenty-five members to ten members and changing the make-up of the Nominating Committee from four to three (one elder and two active members). The Called Session meeting reviewed COVID protocols for church services and approved the purchase of a new laptop computer for the Pastor.

The regular Session meeting was Monday, October 18 via Zoom. The dates for Communion in 2022 were approved. Lynn Yarnell reported on the September Presbytery meeting where a committee is working to help churches establish a vision of their mission. Rev. Dr. Matt Meinke will be installed as General Presbyter in November.

Bibles and devotional materials were donated to St. Paul Methodist Church for missions. According to their sign, 1,277 Bibles were collected. A possible mission outreach for our church is Lifewise Academy. More information will be coming. Christmas Giving Projects this year will be Operation Christmas Child, Christmas Cheer (money donations only), and Project We Care.

Operations Team reported the new sump pump for the elevator shaft has been installed, but there is still a hose for drainage that must be replaced before winter. Session approved authorizing the Team to resolve the drainage problem for the church. There are also two major leaks in the roof, one over the Pastor's lectern and one in the hallway to the left of the chancel. There is a problem finding a roofing company that will work on a tile roof like ours. Fall Clean-Up projects have been assigned.

OUR PHILOSOPHY—WHY WE EXIST

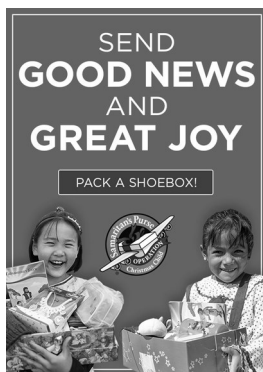

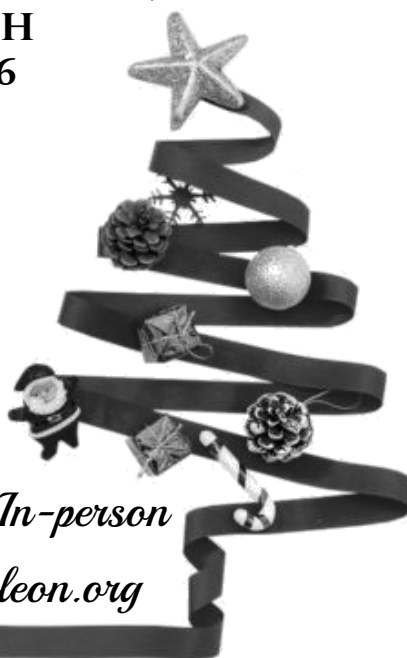
