GREETINGS,

Years ago, author George Barna wrote a book discussing polling data entitled, *The Frog in the Kettle*. It was my first dalliance with seeking to understand the impact of the church on culture and culture on church, and first exposure to how faith matters were evolving over time.

The premise of the book was this. If you place a frog within a kettle of boiling hot water, it will frantically employ every means necessary to get out of the water. If on the other hand, you place that same frog in the same kettle with normal water and gradually turn up the heat until the water boils, the frog will comfortably remain in the water and boil itself to death.

The implication was, most things do not change radically overnight or even weeks. If it did, the screaming would be ear piercing (think COVID restraints). Most all change happens over time, without a perceivable sense of it happening. An idea might be considered radical or implausible when first mentioned, but over time it becomes acceptable and is established as a new sense of normal. Something that we might frantically seek to escape if brought on suddenly, we over time allow to comfortably boil us alive.

All significant change occurs over time. It unfurls gradually without much notice until all of a sudden we seem to wake up and ask, "How did we get here?" Think in terms of cell phones, on-line purchasing, video streaming (even church services), alternative lifestyles and sexual practices, the essential belief in and place of marriage, size of houses, and so much more. Years ago a prominent church leader declared, "What is shocking and extreme to one generation becomes the norm for the next." He is correct.

Unthinkable at one point is tomorrow's standard. Too hot to swim in now becomes just right for a plunge later. My oldest granddaughter just finished her high school play (she was amazing by the way). Afterward we sat around a table nibbling on snacks and talking about the cast. In the conversation she mentioned that two of the performers were transgender. Being masked and costumed for the performance, it was not noticeable. We had no idea. But here's the thing...Bree just dropped that information as if it is completely normal. Julie and I sat fascinated and we discussed the issue at length. It seems so strange to us...it is the norm for her. Trying to get into her world is hard work.

Some of us are old enough that we have opted out of much of this. We still hold to traditional values and live in yesterworld's mindset with yesterworld's accessories. We simply choose to swim in a different kettle. But that kettle is becoming colder over time rather than warmer. The danger in this, and you already may be feeling it in different ways, is that the alternative kettle is becoming irrelevant to the world around us. Participants swimming in that kettle are now considered unimportant to society as a whole. Eventually freezing to death in the kettle is the fate that awaits this group.

I'm not sure if freezing to death is considered better than or is to be preferred over being boiled alive. Neither sounds especially inviting to me. But I do know that the kettle is like the stock market, though there are occasional momentary outliers, culture is always heading to

warmer water and over time we find that the water that would have sent us scurrying years ago, is now considered comfortably warm. At some point I believe that everything will boil over. The expanding amount of stretch and expansion and heat applied to culture and the faith eventually brings about a breakdown.

I am not sure how hot the water is that we are in currently, but I am convinced that we are now a long way from the place where God walked with Adam and Eve in the cool of the day. And that is the point of my article. If you allow yourself to sit for a moment and take notice, our walks with God now are experienced in the heat of the desert comparatively speaking. We have become so far removed from the original model our Creator had in mind that we as God's people are barely recognizable. All seems normal because over time we've adapted to temperature increases without knowing it. But it is not nor-

mal. At least it is not normal compared to the Creator's grand design and purposes for us.

Culture's heat has over time moved the whole essence of faith into something built upon the ideals of: personal comfort, consumerism, celebrity ministry, civil religion, personal freedom, tribalism, and judgmentalism. Long gone is a faith rooted and grounded in laying down our lives for others, servanthood, obedience, humility, compassion, empathy, community, and sacrifice. Contrition, repentance, and spiritual disciplines have given way to cheap grace. Counting the cost of following Jesus is now replaced with counting your blessings. Ambassadors of reconciliation has given way to political activism and partisanship. All with barely a whimper or sense that we are so lost.

It's getting hot in the kitchen. Are we aware of it? That's what I'm thinking about these days.

All is well here, but did not go to Florida this year.


