BOOK REVIEW: The Handweaver's Pattern Directory by Anne Dixon

Containing over 600 weaves for four-shaft looms, this book is so full of ideas, it's hard to say where to start. This is NOT a "recipe book." There are no directions for making specific project such as a scarf or table runner. It IS a great resource for pattern ideas. Anne examines plain weave, twills, block weaves [Monks Belt, M's & O's, Overshot, Summer & Winter, lace weaves] and much, much more to provide inspiration for weavers of all levels.

If you are a beginning weaver, you'll love her clear drafts and the variations she shows. Advanced weavers can apply her creative ideas to more complex weaves, too. Along with the multitude of drafts, Anne has included information from yarn selections and calculations, to color theory and finishing techniques. There's something for everyone in this book, so check it out!

Back in March, Marcia Kummerle of Good FIbrations Mohair Goat Farm and Fibers came to present a talk to Piedmont Fiber Guild about her wonderful farm and her process in creating her gorgeous colorways. At that time, she invited us to come to her farm later in the year and share her goats and farm.

On August 25th, a small group of fiber lovers made the trip to Barnardsville, NC to Marcia's farm. Her cheerful welcome and the sight of all her 4 month old goats made the trip more than worthwhile.

We were able to go right into the field with the babies who were newly sheared and cute as could be. We shared lunch under the trees in front of Marcia's barn home.

Marcia had prepared and showed us three of her different processes whereby she creates her gorgeous colorways: dip dyeing for her Yum Yum gradients, crockpot dyeing, and hand-painting for the Joseph's Coat colorway.

Marcia and her friend Lynnie worked very hard to prepare these demos for us and the results were stunning. All dyeing was on Marcia's blend of mohair and merino processed for her by a small mill in Michigan that utilizes American Merino in their blends.

Of course, there was lots of shopping in Marcia's shop full of Mohair yarns and fibers.

We all had a great day together and want to thank Marica so much for inviting us to her farm.

The Well-Dressed Loom

1-day class for all levels
No equipment needed
Class - \$45, materials fee - none
If you're new to weaving or just want to improve your techniques, this is the class for you. We'll cover cutting the warp, dressing the loom front to back & back to front. You'll get tips to help with threading, sleying and troubleshooting.

Not Your Ordinary Overshot

2-day class for advanced beginner and up Equipment: 4-shaft loom dressed and ready for weaving Class - \$100, materials fee - \$5

Overshot is a fascinating structure with so many possible variations. In this class we'll go beyond the standard treadling patterns and explore the variations. The weave requires two shuttles, but those can be provided. Drafts will be provided in advance, and there will be plenty of hand outs.

Indigo Blues 1-day class for all levels

No equipment needed Class - \$60, materials fee - \$10 (includes dye, chemicals, silk scarf) Who knew having the blues could be so much fun? Indigo is a magical dye that can be used on both cellulose/plant and protein/animal fibers. You'll be able to dye skeins, warp yarns and cloth depending you your interests. Put on your old clothes and get ready to play!

Hyperbolic Crochet

1-day class for all levels Equipment: crochet hooks, yarn, scissors Class - \$35, materials fee – none Hyperbolic crochet is a method of using mathe when used to create the Crocheted Coral Reef

Hyperbolic crochet is a method of using mathematical ratios to create amazing, ruffled shapes. It gained popularity when used to create the Crocheted Coral Reef projects. It may sound difficult, but it's really quite simple. It only uses slip and single crochet stitches. You'll learn how to make linear, spherical and conical shapes without using patterns!
