Meeting Minutes August 2019

PIEDMONT FIBER GUILD - GENERAL MEETING - AUGUST 18, 2019

The meeting was called to order at 2 pm by President Sue C.

Treasurer Maurice B. announced that the guild has \$4304 in the main account and \$3128 in savings.

Maurice also shared that he has been developing a budget for the guild for 2020. Our financial year now runs January-December. He has been running a new version of the budget with \$100 for monthly rent to reflect the rent at the new location (starting in September). He stated we should now break even. Five hundred dollars is allotted for speakers for the remainder of 2019; \$100 is allotted for speakers in 2020. Maurice has details of the developing budget should anyone care to see them.

Secretary Sallie O. had no announcements.

Pam R., co-chair for Programs, announced that Varian Brandon will be presenting later this fall.

Pam R. raised the question of liability insurance going forward. Sue C. stated she has talked with Carol W. about this. Sue C. plans to discuss with an insurance broker the possible need for a different sort of policy than we currently have. The guild should be covered under the church's liability policy at our new location. Sallie O. questioned if we need liability insurance for when we are demonstrating at other venues.

Sue H., Program co-chair, announced that the September program will be on Buttons. Sue will teach how to make crochet buttons. Sallie O. will teach how to make Dorset buttons.

Gail B. was unable to be at today's meeting to discuss Events due to her recent move. Chris D. spoke to the guild about upcoming Events for Gail. For Matthews ALIVE Festival over Labor Day weekend, we need people to demonstrate; Gail has a chart breaking the time up into shifts. Please contact her if you can be part of this big event. It is a major money-maker for the guild.

Sue H. spoke to the need for people to volunteer and not leave the same core group to do all the work.

10/12 and 13 - Cotton Ginning Days in Dallas NC.

Linda E. has agreed to serve as the Workshop committee chair.

Sue C. thanked all who had completed the survey for the guild.

Charity chair Carol W. is collecting chemo hats and blue hats for "Hats not Hate".

Librarian Sonia S. had no news.

Newsletter Editor Bill D. spoke to the need to use first name and last initial in articles in the newsletter to protect members' privacy.

Hospitality chair Peggy reviewed who is signed up for September's meeting.

A question was raised about the June 2020 meeting falling on Father's Day. It was decided to leave the meeting on that date.

Sue C. presented information about the guild's upcoming location change. We will be moving to South Tryon Community United Methodist Church at the intersection of South Tryon and Remount Rd. in Charlotte. We will have locked storage. Boxing day will be Friday 9/6/19. Please contact Sue if you can help. Morning shift starts at 10 am, and evening shift starts at 6 pm. Moving day will be Saturday 9/7 at noon. We need boxes, dollies, and people to help, please.

The 'Sabina' 4H 6T 36" weaving width loom which belongs to the guild is for sale; \$400 or best offer.

Our landlord at Remount Executive Center has been very nice about our relocation. They have waived the 60 day notice and waived the rent for the first week of September.

Sallie asked for someone to take minutes in October when she will be unable to attend the meeting.

Sallie O. made an announcement about CLTextiles upcoming show "Textures Fiber Art Exhibit". Opening reception will be Friday 9/6 7-10 pm at C3Lab, 2525 Distribution St., Charlotte. There will also be an artists' gallery talk on Sunday 9/8 2-4 pm. Please see their Facebook page 'CLTextiles' for more information. There will be at least two PFG members showing their work in this show.

After a refreshment break, the group reconvened at 3:05 pm for the program.

Debbie Davis, owner of The Fibre Studio at Yarns to Dye For in Charlotte, discussed how different fiber density and composition affects dyeing. Debbie first started her retail business in September of 2008. In 2014 she closed her retail yarn shop and began dyeing full-time. She recently moved to a new location at 540 Griffith Rd., Charlotte, behind the Costco on Tyvola Rd.

Debbie uses acid dyes with vinegar or granulated citric acid. She dyes wool, silk, nylon, and some blends, but not plant fibers. One needs to use fiber reactive dyes for plants (fiber reactive dyes also dye animal fibers).

Debbie soaks fibers in water with Dawn dishwashing liquid prior to dyeing. Acid dyes are safe, but when in powdered form, particles are so small they can be inhaled. Debbie and her staff use masks when mixing the colors for dyeing. They do not 'sprinkle-dye'; all their dye is mixed to liquid before use.

Blends take up the dyes differently, for example merino/bamboo or silk/linen. Linen is especially hard to dye. Debbie and her staff dye lace weight to bulky yarn, also novelty yarns. The Fibre Studio is known for its gradient yarns.

Debbie also gave out 'Yarn Tasting' gifts to all attending today: a wine glass with eight samples of different yarns all dyed the same color to show the difference the fiber content makes in the finished yarn appearance. Also, Debbie reminded the group that the Charlotte Yarn Crawl occurs September 20-28; seven stores are participating in the Yarn Crawl this year.

Chris D. commented on the safety aspect of dyeing as well. She added that the small powdered dye particles that can enter the lungs cause a small cyst to form around each particle. Long term, this results in decreased lung function, and could possibly be carcinogenic.

Following the program, the guild participated in drawing for 'Opportunity' items and 'Show and Tell'.

The meeting was adjourned at 4:05 pm. The September meeting will be in our new location.

Job Description: Weaver Must Be Mechanic!

This story begins with this warp threaded through 2 heddles (12.5dpi) on my rigid heddle loom. Threading was very complex as this set-up actually produced a version of Rosepath...on a rigid heddle loom!



This warp happened to start out with a couple different grists of wool yarns. Most were lace weight but I had two that were closer to sock weight. I found the problem with the light yarns (sock ones) after threading, tying on and beginning to weave. These were extremely stiff, hard and had NO elasticity.

With the complex threading and weaving sequences of this project, these yarns almost immediately showed a great difference in tension and ability to mesh with weft yarns woven same as warp.

Solution?



Weaver Becomes Mechanic!

First, I was determined NOT to cut this warp off the loom! It had taken me 2 days...almost 6 hrs...to thread the heddles. I know to floor loom weavers, 6 hours might not seem unreasonable depending on the complexity of the pattern being threaded, but part of the beauty of rigid heddle weaving is that it's quick to thread, right? Not complaining; just also not going to dump this warp.

I found other softer yarns in my stash in similar colors and grists. Each warp thread was measured individually and approximately, once all 8 threads for each stripe had been measured and knotted on, one at a time, all threads for that stripe were wrapped around cardboard storage perns.

After all the threads were attached, and the bundles wrapped, I needed something to approximate the tension of the other threads. These glass bottles turned out to be the best solution for weight as well as a way to attach the weight to the warp threads.



The finished piece is too short for a scarf due to all these changes (54") and the selvages were uneven due to difference in the weight of the bottles but I did get a finished piece that will make an acceptable wall hanging. I'm still amazed that you can get Rosepath on a rigid heddle loom and have learned a great deal from this project. I plan to do another one of these soon. Even with all the challenges, this project was great fun!

Discharge Dye Workshop
Saturday, October 5, 2019

I've had requests for another discharge dye workshop, and this weekend opened up for me. Here's the info!

Discharge dye is the removal of color from cloth or yarn using thiox and thickener. By making a paste with the discharge mix, you can remove color in specific areas and in specific shapes. Unlike bleach, the thiox mix is safe for use on silk! We will work with yarn and cloth to explore ways to transform colors. I'll show you stamping, stenciling, and other techniques for cloth. We'll also explore techniques for color removal on skeined yarn and warps. I'm generous with the supplies, but more will be available for purchase.


