About the Composers

ERIK CHARNOFSKY enjoys a multi-faceted career as pianist, composer, classroom music teacher, and lecturer. He has performed as a collaborative pianist throughout North America and as an orchestral keyboardist with the Los Angeles Philharmonic and the Cleveland Orchestra. A graduate of The Juilliard School where he majored in piano accompanying, he also holds degrees in solo piano performance and composition. Mr. Charnofsky works as a Senior Instructor at Case Western Reserve University and also taught courses at the Cleveland Institute of Music. Mr. Charnofsky's radio program, "Not Your Grandmother's Classical Music," airs Monday afternoons on WRUW-FM.

RYAN CHARLES RAMER has been a member of the Composers Guild since 2012. He is currently the composer-in-resident for Cleveland Public Theatre. Since 2020, Survival Kit Art Gallery has held three gallery exhibitions of 20 visual artists who have created work directly inspired by Ramer's piano music. This year he produced two half-hour long suites of electronic music inspired by the geometric visual art of Mark Keffer and Christopher Richards.

TRISTAN WILSON is a composer and violist from Detroit, Michigan and winner of the 10th Annual Cleveland Composers Guild Collegiate Competition Contest. Following the premiere of his Sinfonietta for string orchestra in 2014, his works have been performed regularly around the Midwestern and Mid-Atlantic United States. As a composer, Wilson works in many genres, not limited only to contemporary classical, but also including film scores, musical theatre, and electronic music. His works are also featured on Petrichor Records' series *New Music by Living Composers*, published in 2021. His primary composition instructors have included Jon Anderson, James Hartway, and Sara Corry. Mr. Wilson is currently pursuing studies in viola performance and composition at the Cleveland Institute of Music in the studios of Mark Jackobs and Keith Fitch, respectively.

DR. KAREN GRIEBLING earned degrees from the Eastman School of Music, the University of Houston, and the University of Texas at Austin. She was Professor of Music at Hendrix College, held tenure as a violist with the Arkansas Symphony Orchestra, and was violist in the internationally acclaimed Cross Town Trio with whom she toured internationally. Dr. Griebing has composed operas, symphonies, ballets, and works full and chamber orchestra, wind ensemble, choir, film, theatre, mixed media, theremin, world instruments, chamber ensembles, solo instruments, and voices, and released several CDs. She returned to her native Ohio in 2019 and continues to teach at universities and to freelance as violist. throughout the region.

JEFFREY QUICK was born in Cass City, Michigan in 1956. He earned degrees in music history and composition from the University of Michigan and Cleveland State University, where he studied composition with William Bolcom, Leslie Bassett, Bain Murray, Rudolph Bubalo, and Edwin London. Until his recent retirement, he was assistant music librarian at Case Western Reserve University, and has been a professional church chorister for three decades, currently at St. Sebastian Parish in Akron. He lives in Windham, Ohio on six acres with his wife Rusty and assorted livestock.

CHRIS NEINER is a Cleveland-based composer of contemporary classical music with colorful harmony, diverse influences, and engaging energy. Neiner's style derives from his passion to foster

collaborative works with instrumentalists. His recent commissions include *Aurora Fanfare & Dance* for the Aurora School of Music; *Serenade for the Ghosts* for Musical Upcoming Stars in the Classics; *Playtime* for a consortium of collegiate horn professors across the United States; and an upcoming new work for NO EXIT New Music Ensemble. The music of Chris Neiner has appeared on programs by the Grammy award-winning Cleveland Chamber Symphony, Duluth Superior Symphony Orchestra, Minnesota Sinfonia, American Modern Ensemble, Boston New Music Initiative, Cochran Chamber Commissioning Project, and loadbang.

The music of **MARGI GRIEBLING-HAIGH** has been characterized as haunting, charismatic, yearning, lyrical, and insouciant. She has been Composer-in-Residence at the Kent/Blossom Music Festival since 2011. Trained as an oboist, Ms. Griebing-Haigh earned her BM from the Eastman School of Music and her MM from the San Francisco Conservatory of Music. Since 2020, *Rhapsody for Violin and Piano* and *Danses Ravissants* have been featured repeatedly on NPR's *Performance Today*. Recent local concerts have included *A little moment at the end of all* (Cleveland Jazz Orchestra) and *Cortège d'ascension* (in memory of Thom Moore). Two of her most recent works, *Weimarer Winterszenen* for English horn and piano; and *Lufthaltenlieder* for soprano, clarinet, horn, and piano, will be premiered at a special Valentine's Day concert at Fairmount Presbyterian Church next month. Ms. Griebing-Haigh is currently the Chairman of the Cleveland Composers Guild.

About the Performers

DENISE MILNER HOWELL, mezzo-soprano, is a versatile performer of opera, concerts, and recitals. Recent performances include the title role in Jonathan Dove's *Pinocchio*, *Little Women* (Meg), and *Amahl and the Night Visitors* (Mother). Ms. Howell is committed to the performance of new works and has been heard at Cleveland Ingenuity Festival and New to New York Concert Series. Ms. Howell is an active voice teacher and currently teaches at Cleveland Institute of Music/Case Western Reserve University.

A dynamic and versatile musician, flutist **LINDA WHITE** excels in an array of musical settings and plays the entire spectrum of flutes from the piccolo down to the contrabass flute. Her flute and guitar duo, Gruca White Ensemble recently released their CD *A Different Take* on PARMA Recordings Big Round label. She is a founding member of the Blue Water Chamber Orchestra and teaches at The Music Settlement.

Guitarist **ROBERT GRUCA** is an exciting guitarist who performs a wide range of solo, chamber, and concerto repertoire. Possessing powerful musical interpretation and complete technical command over his instrument, Robert Gruca has earned several first prizes in national guitar competitions. Other awards and honors include receiving the 2007 Distinguished Alumni Award from Grand Valley State University.

LUKE RINDERKNECHT, marimba, has performed as soloist with The Cleveland Orchestra, CityMusic Cleveland, and Rogue Valley Symphony. Chamber orchestra performances include Metropolis Ensemble, Alarm Will Sound, Cleveland's baroque orchestra Apollo's Fire, The

Knights, and CityMusic Cleveland, where he has been principal timpanist since 2013. Luke is on faculty at Cleveland State University and CIM's Academy.

Tenor **BRIAN SKOOG'S** 2022-2023 season includes performances as Jake in Matthew Aucoin's *Second Nature* Lurcanio in Handel's *Ariodante*, and Mozart in Rimsky-Korsakov's *Mozart and Salieri* with The Cleveland Opera. A champion of living composers, Skoog was recently the tenor soloist for the world premiere of Margaret Brouwer's environmental oratorio *Voice of the Lake*, and in 2022, he gave the world premiere of the song cycle *Quarantine Poems for Tenor and Three Bassoons* by Ryan Charles Ramer.

The **ALL THUMBS BASSOON ENSEMBLE**, comprised of Akron-area bassoonists, has been performing together since 2012 in various configurations, with a mission to educate the public about the bassoon through the performance of arrangements, new music, and existing bassoon ensemble repertoire. The group regularly provides free concerts that educate and entertain audiences at venues such as Stan Hywet Hall and Gardens, the John S. Knight Center, and numerous public libraries, art galleries, and healthcare facilities. Today, All Thumbs is represented by founding members **JENNIFER KOWALSKI** and **EMILY CAMPBELL** as well as newcomer **ALEX MORRIS**. This particular trio has performed multiple new works by Ryan Charles Ramer over the past year.

Soprano **LEXY JENSEN** is an undergraduate soprano at the Cleveland Institute of Music studying with Dr. Mary Schiller. Previous credits include Witch 2 in *Macbeth* (CIM), and the soprano solos in Hailstork's *Four Spirituals* and Rossini's *Stabat Mater*. She was the recipient of the Ann Gillespie Achievement Award from Key Bank as well as artistic awards from Berea Arts Fest and Mighty Goliath Productions.

Violist **PABLO RONDEROS** studies at the Cleveland Institute of Music with Wesley Collins and Robert Vernon. He is a member of the Astro Quartet. He has performed with the Canton Symphony Orchestra and the Cleveland Orchestra at Blossom Music Center. Pablo was the recipient of the 2022 Robert Vernon Prize in Viola. Other mentors include Si Yan Li, Todd Phillips, Phillip Setzer, Mahoko Eguchi, and Dr. Alina Kirshon Goldman. Pablo is additionally pursuing a music theory degree at CIM.

JACK FISCHER is a percussionist from Orchard Park, New York. He is currently a third-year undergraduate student the Cleveland Institute of Music, studying with Paul Yancich and Marc Damoulakis of the Cleveland Orchestra.

GABRIELLE HAIGH, soprano, released her first solo CD, *Il Circolo Respighi* in the summer of 2022 to excellent reviews. Recent performances have included the role of Euridice in Monteverdi's *L'Orfeo* at the Miami Classical Music Festival (2022). She will appear as soloist in several songs by Richard Strauss and in Dvorak's *Te Deum* with the Canton Symphony Orchestra in April, and will sing the role of Donna Anna in Mozart's *Don Giovanni* this summer at the Lyric Opera Studio Weimar (Germany). Ms. Haigh holds degrees in Classics from Cambridge University (UK) and voice from the San Francisco Conservatory of Music.

BRIAN KEITH JOHNSON, baritone, has performed many roles in opera from Figaro in *Il barbiere di Siviglia* to Ford in *Falstaff*. He has performed operatic and musical theatre roles across the United States including performances with The Cleveland Orchestra, Akron Symphony Orchestra, Canton Symphony Orchestra, Cleveland Opera, Lyric Opera Cleveland. This year's engagements include *Sweeney Todd* at Weathervane Playhouse, Handel's *Messiah*, Menotti's *Amahl and the Night Visitors*, and Brahms' Requiem.

Treble **ALEX COSMA** lives in North Royalton, Ohio and studies music with Olga Druzhinina. He earned first-place in two consecutive Stars of Summer Competitions in 2021 and 2022 and has performed in St. Petersburg, Russia, the Mozarteum Salzburg, New York's Carnegie Hall, and locally at concerts of the Fortnightly Musical Club. His first appearance on a concert of the Cleveland Composers Guild was in a work by Mary Ann Griebing composed as part of the 2017 Creativity: Learning Through Experience program.

ROBIN "ROB" BROWN is a native of Liverpool, United Kingdom. A salesman, Rob appeared in advertisements on behalf of the shops he served around greater Manchester and Leeds. His specialties include audio and video equipment and Japanese motorcycles. He is an audiophile and avid motorcyclist as well as a sports enthusiast, movie buff, and music-lover.
