## ABOUT THE CLEVELAND COMPOSERS GUILD

The Cleveland Composers Guild is one of the oldest continuously operating composers' groups in the United States. It evolved from the activities of the Manuscript Section of the Fortnightly Musical Club. The club had been recognizing the importance of the work of Cleveland composers as early as 1912, when compositions by James Rogers, Wilson Smith, Johann Beck, and Charles Rychlik were performed. Later other composers, such as Arthur Shepherd, Herbert Elwell, F. Karl Grossman, Patty Stair, and Harriet Ware were included on programs. This interest led to the creation of the Manuscript Section in 1928, which became the Cleveland Composers Guild in 1959. Consisting of professional composers resident in northeastern Ohio whose works have been performed locally, nationally, and internationally, the Guild presents concerts, produces recordings, and does educational programming throughout the musical season. Support by the Kulas Foundation allowed for early recordings of music by the Guild membership with Composers' Recordings, Inc. Later recordings on the Century Advent, Crystal, and Capstone labels followed. Publication projects with Galaxy and Ludwig Music Co., have been undertaken, and there have been special concerts in New York City, Pittsburgh, Cincinnati, and elsewhere. Generous support each year from the Bascom Little Fund as well as the Cleveland, Kulas and Gund Foundations over the years has allowed the Guild to engage numerous notable musicians and chamber groups from the area to perform on Guild concerts. A particularly special Guild Project, Creativity: Learning Through Experience pairs young performers and composers in a wonderful musical collaboration, which has been funded for many years by the Bascom Little Fund and in recent years has also received special funding from the Cuyahoga Arts and Culture (CAC).





## IN THEIR OWN WORDSPARTICIPANTS REFLECT

The impact of *Creativity: Learning through Experience* is perhaps best expressed in the words of the composers, students, teachers, and parents who have participated in years past:

## Composer:

"I was looking forward to the opportunity to create a new work specifically for a young musician and having the pleasure of working with that musician to realize my ideas, watching them grow in the process. Beyond having another piece of music to love in my works list, I enjoyed working with the young player and her teacher, helping her to move beyond playing notes to bringing some of her own musicality to the project."

## Students:

"I really enjoyed working with the composer. After weeks and months of working hard on the piece it was very rewarding to see him satisfied with all the work I put into the way I played it."

"The most positive aspect about participating in this project was getting to play a piece where I could hear the composer's feedback, and also that I got to play with my friend."

"There were supportive parents, coaches, and teachers helping me to accomplish and finish this piece. They were a big part of this project. I also appreciated the other pieces that the composers made especially for us."

"I was really happy that there was a place to try out my music. I enjoyed working with the musicians. It was really helpful to see what musicians thought my music should sound like when they just saw it on the page."

## Teacher:

"It is always gratifying to see a young person be completely undaunted by "modern" sounds and techniques. I was pleased with the piece that was written for my student since it was challenging, interesting, but not beyond his level."

### Parents:

"I think the whole process of getting to the premier of a brand new work was a HUGE learning experience for our daughter. From learning the pieces to working with the composers to shape their work to being on stage to actually present the work—the loving labor of producing a new piece of music—made a tremendous impact on her and broadened her appreciation of compositions."

"As a parent, I appreciated watching my children grow musically. They played music new to them as well as challenging and bringing them to a new level. Having a coaching with the composers to find out their interpretation of the music was educational."

## **CREATIVITY**LEARNING THROUGH EXPERIENCE

The year 2017 marks the 25th anniversary of *Creativity: Learning through Experience*, which originally occurred in another guise chaired by longtime Cleveland Composers Guild member Katherine Warne. In the early days, young students from the Junior Fortnightly Clubs played existing compositions by Guild members. Twenty-five years ago, Cleveland area composer and pianist, Marshall Griffith took the lead in a reimagined form of the project, and *Creativity: Learning through Experience* was born. As Marshall states,

The [former] project had lost any momentum it had and it needed a fresh approach. The project was [run on a] volunteer [basis], and getting young students from many different teachers and matching them with composers was becoming more difficult. I decided two things: first, it should be a professional activity. Composers and students would be paid. At that time fifty dollars for a student could buy a decent pair of tennis shoes and the composers would be paid an honorarium of one-hundred dollars. Second, the Composers Guild would work with an institution to organize students. We did this program at first with The Cleveland Music School Settlement, and later plans included CIM [the Cleveland Institute of Music] and the Rainey School. To this end, I hired a professional grant writer [Susan Goldman] to help get a proper proposal to The Cleveland Foundation. The proposal was successful and the first of these concerts took place twenty-five years ago. It was and is still fun to see and hear this program and I hope it continues another twenty-five years at least!!

Since the first *Creativity: Learning through Experience* concert in 1993, the Cleveland Composers Guild has collaborated with the Music Settlement, Junior Fortnightly Clubs, Cleveland School of the Arts, Cleveland Institute of Music, and Baldwin Wallace Conservatory on this project. Professional composers are paired with talented musicians aged 6 to 18 from the other organizations to write pieces specifically for the students, coaching them with their teachers before the new works are premiered. More recently, the project expanded to include young composers selected to work with professional musicians, who offer advice before performing these student pieces publicly.

Over twenty-four annual installments, *Creativity: Learning through Experience* has been the venue for world premieres of nearly three-hundred pieces of music written for young student performers. Student participants have gone on to conservatories and music programs that include CIM, Eastman School of Music, Juilliard, University of Michigan, Oberlin, Baldwin Wallace, and others. Student composers whose works were performed at one of these concerts have won awards from BMI, ASCAP, the National Federation of Music Clubs (NFMC), and the Music Teachers National Association (MTNA), at the state, regional, and national levels. Numerous works premiered on these concerts are now on the required lists for the NFMC Festivals, reaching hundreds of clubs and thousands of students across the United States. Many of these works are now published and have been performed by professional musicians around the Northeastern Ohio area and beyond. In collaboration with fifteen student performers and their teachers, today's concert adds premieres of twelve Cleveland Composers Guild members' works, and works by three student composers to that growing legacy.
