Elijah House is a nonprofit organization committed to the principles of Malachi 4:5,6 and Matthew 17:11. Mission of Elijah House Schools

The school of ministry is designed to teach Elijah House's prayer ministry model of sanctification and transformation, and break it down step-by-step to easily apply it in a ministry setting. Each school is prayerfully planned to provide an atmosphere for opening the heart to receive truth, renewing the mind, and resulting in life transformation through Christ. The key to the Elijah House (EH) prayer ministry model is partnering with Holy Spirit. We are co-workers with Christ, acting to restore broken and hurting hearts and to reconcile relationships. In keeping with the Elijah House vision, the school's mission is to equip, encourage, and release "Ambassadors for Christ" (2 Corinthians 5:18-20), who will pick up His mantle and continue His mission of restoration, healing, and reconciliation!

- •To equip and train saints for the work of ministry, using the Elijah House Prayer Ministry Model.
- •To apply essential scriptural elements of healing through confession, forgiveness, repentance, and restoration; which is sanctification and transformation.
- •To provide a safe setting for building relationships, learning, and practicing prayer ministry in small groups.
- •To teach, model, and provide opportunity to practice ministry to one another according to the Word of God and in the power and sensitivity of Christ through, the Holy Spirit.

Course Expectations

With each lesson and small group practicum students will gain understanding of and be given principles of healing that will empower them to bring others into a transformed life. The lessons are taught in sync with a small group experience, and every small group will build upon each previous group. Our small group sessions are a very important part of the school training experience, because it's in small group where the lessons are put into practice and students are activated into one-on-one ministry with each other. The small group focuses on the EH ministry model; no other ministry models will be used during this training (for further explanation please see *General School Requirements*, section *Small Group*). Many find that while going through our schools, they are exposed to their own hidden opinions and attitudes of the heart for the first time, which can be unsettling. EH makes every effort to make our small groups a safe atmosphere which allows for those sensitive parts of student hearts to be exposed.

Because of time restraints and the fact that groups are learning together, not all personal life issues uncovered will be dealt with during the school; but some healing will happen. This is a lifelong process. The school's focus is to equip students to minister to others using the EH model and to further student healing. Many students find the need to seek ministry once the school is complete. If students are aware of significant life issues prior to attending the school, we advise students to receive prayer ministry before attending the course. Doing so will enhance their school experience. They will receive healing and have first-hand experience of the model they are learning. If there is no one in your area that can assist you with prayer ministry, we know ministers who can help you through digital platforms. General School Requirements

- Acceptance of the Lord Jesus Christ as your personal Savior at least one year prior to enrollment.
- Must agree with EH's Statement of Faith (see Elijah House Statement of Faith)
- Must be a member of a Christian church in good standing, participating in regular worship and church ministry opportunities. (EH does recognize home churches and small groups in this respect.)
- Must submit an application with recommendations from one character reference and pastoral leadership.
- Must uphold and agree to Confidentiality Agreement (see Confidentiality Agreement)
- Payment of all required fees at the time of registration.
- Attendance: is required for all lessons and small group sessions. Missed lessons (no more than 3) and a missed small group session (no more than 1), must be completed for graduation. Special arrangements must be made by the student with the person conducting the school or small group, to hold an additional session for student to complete the school.
- Small Group: Small groups consist exclusively of students within the school, and the small group leader's role is for coaching purposes only. There are roles students are to take on in the small group and they are as follows: seeker, prayer minister, assistant prayer minister, and intercessor. Participation in each role is a requirement. Based on the size of your small group, the expectation is that you will serve each role a minimum of 2 times. This is a time to practice and apply principles being taught. We place couples, associates, and friends in separate groups (if possible) for confidentiality reasons. All things discussed and prayed over are to remain confidential within each group (see Confidentiality Agreement).
- **Homework:** Teachers or facilitators may assign written homework at the end of the lessons.
- Reading: In order to fully comprehend the material taught, students are required to read the books listed in the Course Overview. We suggest reading the books, which have been discounted on our web store (search "student book packages"), prior to attending a school.
- Additional Requirements: based on the format of the school, there may be additional requirements, please see the *Course 201 and 202 Formats* section.

Course 201 and 202 Formats

There are two ways to attend EH schools of ministry; through Facilitated Video Schools in your area or Intensive Two-Week Schools at EH headquarters. Each format is explained below:

Facilitated Video Schools

These schools are offered through authorized Elijah House Facilitators in many locations in the United States and Canada. Most video schools are local to students, and most of these schools meet once per week in 2-to-4 hour progressive sessions. Others are done through consecutive intensive weekends, or other schedules that serve the needs of students at the facilitator's discretion. Registration for Facilitated Video Schools is done by contacting the facilitator directly. Their contact information is available at elijahhouse.org under the Events/Training tab. Select the level of course you wish to take and then scroll to the bottom of the page and use the "Click Here" button to see the list of facilitated schools posted by state. We encourage students to attend facilitated schools whenever possible. This allows students to take the course at a slower pace and to be in relationship with others in their own communities.

Two-Week Intensive Schools

The schools conducted by the headquarters of Elijah House USA offer direct teaching and personal contact with Elijah House teaching team and staff. There are 3 lectures per day, each concluding with a Q & A time. Practical experience is gained through 2 hours of small group ministry time with peers each afternoon, with daily guidance from leaders of the small groups. There are 3 or more prayer ministry demonstrations during the school, which involve volunteer students from the school. If interested in attending a Two-Week Intensive School, all registration information can be found on elijahhouse.org.

Graduation Requirements*

- 1. Student has met all attendance and participation requirements described in *General School Requirements*.
- 2. Student protects confidentiality of all fellow students.
- 3. Student completes all homework/quizzes associated with lessons, when assigned by facilitator.
- 4. Student demonstrates ability to put what they have learned into practice in personal life and in ministering to others.
- 5. Student demonstrates growth as a result of school participation.

Students who complete the course requirements will graduate from the school and are eligible to continue further training with Elijah House. * The graduation certificate only documents the completion of the course, it is not used for certification purposes.

Elijah House Refund Policy for Two-Week Intensive Schools

Elijah House must receive a student's intent of withdrawal, in writing through email, PRIOR to the cut-off dates outlined below:

Students withdrawing from the course prior to course start date will receive a refund minus \$50 application fee. Students withdrawing from the course after course start date are only eligible for a refund if they withdraw before the 4th lesson. Refund does not include the following:

- 1) \$50 application fee
- 2) \$50 study guide fee
- 3) \$50 small group facilitator fee

There will be no refunds given other than the two withdrawal conditions outlined above.

College Accreditation

Elijah House Schools provide substantial training and experience in the Elijah House model of prayer ministry which is a form of pastoral counseling. We are not an accredited institution offering college credit. However, for those pursuing degree programs, college accreditation may be available through their college, graduate program, or seminary. Many higher education institutions acknowledge and give credit for prior learning which can include work experience and non-accredited courses like this one. Contact your registrar and ask about their Prior Learning Assessment (PLA), Recognized Prior Learning (RPL), or Credit for Prior Learning (CPL) programs. Student certificate of completion and a copy of this handbook serve as documentation.

Confidentiality Agreement

At Elijah House prayer ministry schools, students come into contact with very personal and confidential information. To divulge such information can be very hurtful even if no harm is intended. In order to promote an atmosphere of trust, students must take great care in treating ministry information as confidential, and not share it beyond their small group.

- 1. All communication (both verbal and written) between students and their small group is confidential.
- 2. For the sake of mentoring and ongoing training in the prayer ministry process, topical information about the small group progress may be shared from the small group leaders to the supervisors or designated colleagues. This information will not include the name of any individual or those of his/her family members, friends or colleagues, or other information that would identify him/her.
- 3. Exceptions to confidentiality may occur in mandatory reporting conditions:
 - a. When a student indicates an intent, or is clearly a danger to harm themselves or others;
 - b. When the law and Elijah House policy requires specifically involving disclosure of the physical or sexual abuse or neglect of a child or vulnerable adult.*

Therefore: "As a student of Elijah House Schools and in line with biblical principles and for the sake of those to whom I minister, I promise to maintain confidentiality, and to protect the precious gift of trust entrusted to me."

Elijah House Statement of Faith

The Holy Spirit has led us to believe fully in the simple orthodoxy of the major creeds of the faith: the Apostles' and Nicene Creeds, the Augustinian and Wesleyan Confessions, etc. This means that for us the Lord Jesus Christ is the only begotten Son of God the Father, that He died on the cross for our redemption, was raised again, and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He has given us His Holy Spirit and the gifts of the Spirit that we might serve Him and His Kingdom. We believe we are called to be faithful members of His Church, regularly attending worship and submitted under the care and covering of pastors and elders. We believe scripture provides divine guidance for morality such as the Ten Commandments, definition of marriage as one man and one woman, and the consequences of sin described in Romans 1:20-31. To us, the mission of the Church is all-important—to evangelize, teach, and heal until He returns. Therefore, Elijah House remains orthodox in all respects, that we might be a faithful part of His mission to prepare God's children to live and fellowship with the Father throughout eternity.

In response to the dual mandates of Malachi 4:5-6 and Matthew 17:11, we are called to be instruments of writing, teaching, prayer ministry, and healing. We believe all teaching and healing is an expression of the love and mercy of the Lord Jesus Christ. Neither teaching nor healing is something we do, but rather it is the work of the Holy Spirit. This is especially true in heart healing—the internal cleansing of our "vessel" by the Holy Spirit.

Healing seems to imply that something is broken, so we need to repair it. But God does not intend to fix us—to put new patches on old garments. He means to slay us on His cross and raise us anew in Him. As prayer ministers, this calls us to constant death of "self" on the cross in order that we not lay practiced programs on people, but attempt to allow the Holy Spirit to write His lessons in the hearts of His children. He is not putting His laws in our minds, but writing them deep in our hearts.

Sanctification is the application of the blood, cross, and resurrection life of our Lord Jesus Christ to deep wounds and practices in our hearts, setting us free to walk as God intended when He created us. These are applied by consultation and prayer, but it is prayer which is the basis of all our ministry. Transformation is the process of sanctification in which the Holy Spirit transforms all our degradations to glory, our weaknesses to strengths, and our deserts to gardens of blessing.

^{*}A vulnerable adult is one who - by virtue of age, physical injury, disability, disease, or psychiatric, emotional, or developmental disorder - is unable to independently provide for his/her own basic necessities and/or defend him/herself.

Prayer Ministry in Practice – What I Can Do with This Training

Having completed an Elijah House Training Course, how can you apply what you have learned? Before you can answer that, it will help to honestly answer the following questions for yourself:

- Has my own healing progressed to the point where I am stable and healthy enough to minister to others?
- Have I adequately grasped the approach presented in the course to be effective in helping others deal with their issues?
- Have I developed a habit of handling confidential information with integrity, and protecting the person(s) involved?
- Do I have adequate personal support and intercessory prayer cover to deal with the spiritual warfare involved?
- Am I under accountability to a church or ministry for pastoral covering?

There are four ways in which one can employ Elijah House prayer ministry training:

- 1. **Casual Ministry** that happens either spontaneously or occasionally in the course of relationships within your personal sphere of influence.
- 2. **Ministry Team** participation under the authority of your church or ministry.
- 3. Facilitate Schools in your home town and train others in prayer ministry.
- 4. Ongoing Professional Level Prayer Ministry with scheduled, repeated sessions.

Note: Although the training you have received from Elijah House is an invaluable foundation for prayer ministry, please understand that the Elijah House 201 and 202 certificates are not an official endorsement of one's readiness or qualification to minister to others. These certificates simply document training.

Peer to Peer Ministry

Anyone who has been exposed to Elijah House training is likely to encounter moments where the principles they have learned may be helpful to someone they know. It is our sincere hope that your exposure to Elijah House principles will have prepared you to be "instant" in that season and be able to help those you know and love as a "prayer minister of the moment."

Let the quality of your rapport with a seeker determine how you minister. Rely on their permission as a guide for how extensively you minister. For issues you are ready to handle, your friendship may be the very thing that is needed, and your ministry can be of tremendous importance and great blessing. For issues you are not yet ready to handle, your training may equip you in how to advise your friend. You could refer them to a person skilled in ongoing prayer ministry or, in case of mental illness, a mental health professional. Even in those cases, your friend will need to know that you are present to support them and intercede for them, even if they are processing their tough issues with someone else.

Ministry Team

This type of ministry should be under the direction of your pastor or ministry team leader. This could include altar ministry or teams that do ongoing scheduled sessions. You might have to educate the pastor or ministry leader about Elijah House and our training. It might help to share that the training you have received is a form of pastoral counseling that was developed by a pastor. It is very important that you be clear that your intent is to support your pastor or ministry leader in the context of their vision and mission. Some churches will not want Elijah House prayer ministry operating in their fellowship, and it is important to honor that. Other churches will leap at the opportunity and give you more to do than you can handle! Let the Holy Spirit guide you to a venue where your gifts are welcome.

A good use of Elijah House prayer ministry within a church or ministry is to minister as a team member to help ministry members or pastors deal with common and recurring sanctification issues. A volunteer ministry team can take a lot of pressure off the pastoral staff by reducing their volume of pastoral counseling. This can help to allow pastoral staff to focus on other pressing issues. The trust that is developed may lead to the pastor or ministry leader referring to you, and perhaps even consulting with you about cases they are working with. This may also provide a doorway for you to become a support for the pastor, and to be there when he or she experiences personal issues. Ministry Team ministry can be built upon nothing less than consistent, long term, loyal, and confidential rapport with the pastor of your church or leader of your ministry.

Facilitate Schools

Once you have completed both Training Courses 201 and 202, read all the required reading books, and have practiced prayer ministry to the point of becoming confident in prayer ministry, becoming a video school facilitator can be a rich and rewarding avocation. Video school facilitators are authorized by Elijah House through an application process to conduct official Elijah House schools of ministry. Facilitators are also authorized by the pastors of their church to conduct Elijah House training in the church facility. Facilitators oversee and administer the student registration process, presentation of the lessons, small groups, and documentation of student completion. A portion of revenue generated by the video school is returned to Elijah House, and facilitators are also compensated for their role through student fees. Ongoing Prayer Ministry as a Profession

Completion of Training Courses 201 and 202 with advanced courses and mentoring is highly recommended prior to attempting to set up a professional practice as a prayer minister.

For this you need these things listed below, but are not limited to:

- Establish a business entity according to state and federal laws.
- Accounting services for tax law assistance.
- Set up business account, liability insurance and office space (highly recommend apart from your home).
- A governing board and intercessor group.
