

## CHURCH HISTORY

The Arenzville Methodist Church was organized at The Methodist Episcopal Church of Arenzville by Rev. A. C. Hunter of Concord in the conference year of 1894-95 with a membership of twenty-four. He endeavored to build a church building, but because of poor health and other difficulties did not succeed. Prior to 1895, Methodist Protestant ministers from Concord served this community in what is now the Presbyterian Church. At that time it was a union church, and was used by any denomination.

The Methodists worshipped in this union church from the time of organization in 1895 until 1905 when the present building was erected. The Methodist pastors serving during that period were A. C. Hunter, R. W. Ennis, W. T. Evans, T. F. Pierson, C. L. Flowers, and T. A. Adams.

In 1905, under the leadership of Rev. T. A. Adams, a new church building was planned. Rev. Adams, with a committee of lay members, consisting of John L. Weeks and Charles E. Williamson, assisted by the community and other lay members, built the present church at a cost of \$3,789.00. The lot was donated by Mr. William Arenz. At the time of the building of the church Rev. Adams reported a membership of 43. The large stained glass windows were given by Mrs. Ada

Saylor, in memory of her husband, by the Ladies' Aid, by the building committee, and by the Junior League.

This church was dedicated October 29, 1905. An all day program was held, consisting of morning, afternoon, and evening services. Sunday School was held in the morning, followed by a sacramental service by Rev. Robert Stephens, presiding elder of the Jacksonville district, and the dedicatory sermon by Rev. A. C. Byerly, presiding elder of the Springfield district. (At that time district superintendents were called presiding elders.) At 3 p.m. addresses were given by Rev. Stephens and by Rev. J. C. Nate of Beardstown. The services in the evening consisted of a sermon by Rev. Byerly and a consecration service by Rev. Stephens.

In 1939 the Methodist Episcopal Churches, the Methodist Episcopal Churches, South, and the Methodist Protestant Churches of America merged into one church and became known as THE METHODIST CHURCH. Now this church is known as "The Arenzville Methodist Church." It has always been a part of the Concord Circuit. We hope and pray that our church will be here for many years to come and we eagerly anticipate the day when it will become a station and can support its own minister.

#### ACCOMPLISHMENTS

The building committee of 1905 would scarcely recognize the present church. To make our church more inviting to others and more efficient, the following changes have been made:

Since 1905 a full basement, with finished walls and floors have been built.

Then a hand-fired furnace sat in a scooped out pit under the floor. This has been replaced by a modern stoker furnace with forced air.

A modern rest room has been installed.

Rooms have been equipped for the Junior Department.

Artificial lighting, originally, was furnished by kerosene lamps, then by acetylene lights, and now by electricity with modern fixtures and controls.

The musical instrument in 1905 was a piano. Later a reed organ was used. Now our church is equipped with a Hammond electric organ.

The following improvements were made for this fiftieth anniversary:

The church sanctuary was completely redecorated.

The basement of the church was redecorated by the men of the church.

A new Communion Table was presented by Mrs. and Mrs. Bob Hierman, Mrs. Laura Hierman and Mrs. F. H. Burrus in memory of their loved ones; Mr. and Mrs. E. B. Hierman, M. L. Hierman, and Charles M. Burrus.

A new pulpit and two chairs were purchased by the redecoration committee.

The dorsal curtain was contributed by an interested member and wife.

A lighted cross was given by a party of four individuals.

Another member and wife contributed a bulletin board with changeable lettering.

#### FUTURE PLANS

For over fifty years the Arenzville Methodist Church has enriched the lives of the people of Arenzville and surrounding territory. There have been countless ups and downs for all the citizens of the community and members of the church. But through it all God has been faithful. His promises have never failed.

When lives have been given to Christ, the church, the living body of Christ has welcomed them. When our youth have sought to link their lives together in marriage, the church has blessed that union. When babies have filled the church homes, those infants have been

blessed by the church. When the angel of death has broken the family circle, the church has laid away the physical body, giving the promise of a general resurrection.

In these fifty golden years of serving Christ, the church has grown from the 24 charter members to 152 members. Therefore in light of the past, the members of The Arenzville Methodist Church pledge themselves to expand the scope of Christ and His Church; and to render to the citizens of this community the same Christ-like spirit our fore-fathers reflected.

## EXPLANATION OF THE DESIGN AND SYMBOLS OF OUR CHURCH

The walls of our sanctuary are a grey-green. Green donates growth and when used in the church, means spiritual growth.

The ceiling is white which signifies purity.

The shade of pink used in surrounding the symbol above the arch and within the chancel, denotes life---Everlasting Life. (This color is made by mixing vivid red and white.) The vivid red signifies life's blood and the white is purity. Thus giving the Christian everlasting life through Jesus Christ.

In the symbol above the arch, you will find the Greek letter Alpha to your left and Omega to your right. The cross is used with these letters as a symbol of the redemption of mankind, through Jesus Christ. Then this cross and letter is placed in a shield, which represents faith. In the center above the arch is a fleuron.

It is a flower shaped ornament used in architectural decoration, which signifies the Holy Trinity: Father, Son and Holy Spirit. Then the grapes and vines mingled through the symbol are to represent the Tree of Life. The gold band around the symbol, tells us of God's riches and His bountiful love to mankind.

The Dossal curtain is placed to give a sacred spot to God's house. This curtain is of deep velvet, denoting the Regal power of God. He is King of kings and Lord of lords.

The lighted cross is the symbol of man's redemption through Jesus Christ and the light meaning the Light of the world. As you see this cross, may you be deeply grateful that: "God so loved the world, that He gave His only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in Him should not perish but have everlasting life."

The Ladies' Aid was organized in 1897 and served the church for many years. In 1935 the Pastoral Helpers group was formed and served instead of the Ladies'

Aid. In 1940, the Woman's Society of Christian Service became the women's organization in the Methodist Church.
