

Reflections on Attending a Fellowcraft Degree



The WM declared that on Sunday, October 19th, at 3:00 pm, in the Takoma Masonic Center, there will be a Special Communication for the purpose of conferring the Fellowcraft Degree on our Candidate.

The Fellowcraft Degree marks an important milestone in the Masonic journey, signifying the Brother's progression from the stage of initiation toward a greater understanding of knowledge, duty, and self-improvement. To attend such a degree as a participant is to witness both the beauty of Masonic ritual and the transformative nature of its lessons. It is in this degree that the symbolism of labor and learning come more clearly into focus, reminding us that the pursuit of wisdom is an essential part of our growth as Masons and as men.

The Fellowcraft Degree emphasizes the importance of education, moral reflection, and the steady application of one's faculties toward virtuous living. As participants, we are reminded that the tools of the Craft are not merely ceremonial, but emblematic of the values we should apply to daily life. In watching a Brother advance through this stage of his journey, we are encouraged to renew our own commitment to these teachings, strengthening both the individual Mason and the Lodge as a whole.

Equally profound is the sense of fraternity experienced during such a degree. Each moment serves as a reminder that we travel this path together, offering one another guidance, encouragement, and the light of fellowship. The Fellowcraft Degree is not only a step of advancement for the candidate — it is also a time of reflection and reaffirmation for all present. In attending, we are united in the shared endeavor of building character, honoring tradition, and striving ever closer toward the principles of truth, brotherly love, and self-knowledge.

Please read our WM Jerry Keilsohn's "Light from the East," and let him know that you are able to assist in the cast for this important Degree. RSVP's for attending should be made to the Secretary. Following the Degree, the Brethren will retire across the street to Bus Boys & Poets.

View From the East

One of the commitments a Worshipful Master makes is to provide Light to his Lodge. That Light can take several forms. Education is a common method.

For this article, I am going to call it hard facts. Some good news and some bad news.

Good News

With the August 17th Stated Communication, we have held a total of five meetings this year so far:

Three Stated Communications: February, May, and August

Two Special Communications: a Fellowcraft Degree in April and an Entered Apprentice Degree in June

At the recent August Stated Communication, there were a total of twelve Samuel Gompers-Benjamin Franklin Lodge No. 45 Brethren present, one of them being an Entered Apprentice, plus two visitors, for a total of fourteen. To open the Lodge on the First Degree, I had to ask two sideline brethren to take up positions. And, in a rather embarrassing moment for me as Master, I had to ask one of the visiting brothers to fill the last chair.

Bad News

There are 104 registered members, plus two honorary members of the Lodge. That means that 90 of the brethren of the Lodge—yes, 90 percent of the brothers of the Lodge—did NOT attend.

It is extremely frustrating to spend hours planning and coordinating a Lodge meeting, including feeding everybody, and having nobody turn up.

There are a dozen parts for a First Degree. For the Special Communication to confer the Entered Apprentice Degree in June, I had to ask five brothers from other Lodges to take roles. Thankfully, the brethren of L'Haitienne Lodge, including the Worshipful Master, came to assist, along with the Grand Lecturer.

For a Lodge that has been known to do an outstanding job with the ritual of Initiating, Passing, and Raising new Masons, it is rather embarrassing that we were not able to pull together enough of our own brethren to do a degree. We have definitely fallen in an undesirable direction.

In the five Communications this year, we have not had

a single one where all of the elected and appointed leadership were present. The last time that happened was at the Installation of Officers back in December 2024. One of the officers has left the area, so the prospect of ever having all of the officers in their places is rather slim.

We went to five Stated Communications a year, instead of monthly, because attendance each month was horribly low. I find it un-Masonic and an affront to our fellowship, that the overall attendance is now worse.

Looking Ahead

What does the future of the Lodge look like? We (the officers) have agreed on a plan for next year, which unfortunately revolves around me staying as Master for another year. It does have a huge hole in it: no Junior Deacon.

I am challenging every brother of the Lodge to lengthen their cable-tow and attend a Lodge meeting. Remember, coming to Lodge is about making the time, not finding the time. The next Stated Communication is in November.

The Lodge needs a brother to step up NOW as Junior Deacon, and to agree to sit in that chair next year as well. And if somebody wants to really step up and be Master next year, I am more than happy to assist in making that happen.

In October, we are going to try and confer a Fellowcraft Degree. There are openings for roles. Let me know whether you are able to participate.

Centennial Year


