



The first of these firsts was in February (and in March), I finally got to sit in the West as the Senior Warden. I had expected to have lots of things to write about being in the West for the first time. The truth is, I have very little to write about. In February, we had a really short meeting. Took care of the things that needed taking care of, and then closed. I think I did pretty well on the Ritual part and did not make any really big mistakes. I am working on the parts I know I can improve on. March was more interesting. We opened on the Entered Apprentices degree, and while I made some of the same mistakes I keep making in practice, I did pretty well for the most part. There is always room for improvement.

Another first for me, I sat in the East for the Entered Apprentices Degree. The entire team had been practicing for months, and the whole team did an outstanding job. Being in the East meant I got to obligate seven new brethren. Yes, you read that number correctly, seven new brethren. There were five from our lodge and two as a courtesy for Freedom Military Lodge # 1775.

Because of the way our Lodge rotates all of the degree parts through all of the officers, I have now been the Worshipful Master for all three degrees. In the process, I have contributed to making lots of new Mason's. A little bit surprising to me, is how emotional the experience is. One of the things that really moved me just as I had finished this time, as we just made new Mason's using a tradition that is hundreds of years old, and has not really changed very much in those hundreds of years. Quite a humbling experience. One change, I am pretty confident in, that when MWB Benjamin Franklin knelt at the altar, the room was illuminated by candles and oil lamps. For our newly made Masons, the light was halogens and LEDs.

Spring is finally here, and Mother Nature is putting on her best show of the year. The daffodils are

just about, or by the time you read this, in bloom. Many of the cherry trees are strutting their stuff in those beautiful shades of pink. In the fall I had to take down a few dead trees in my yard. They were beautiful Ash trees but had gotten some disease that is killing all of the Ash trees. Instead of waiting for one of the now dead trees to fall on the house, I spent quite a bit of money to have them taken down. As a result, my side yard changed. I always wonder how such a small bird can make such a loud sound. And I have to admire his (only the males' sing) determination. He will sing for hours at a time. Chirping about once every 30 seconds or so. Another one of Mother Nature's wonders.

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Visitation to Union Lodge No. 6

On Saturday, February 23, WB Ray Horn, and SW Jerry Keilsohn had the pleasure of attending Union Lodge #6's quarterly Stated Communication. Union #6 is one of the unique lodges in our jurisdiction, as they only meet once a quarter, their membership is made up of Past Masters. Their mission is to provide service to the Grand Lodge. Although the Lodge was created in 1811, the original Union Lodge did not operate for long. On May 5th, 1835 the Lodge placed its charter in the keeping of the Grand Lodge, under a resolution that granted it a right of restoration upon application of seven or more "original" members of Union Lodge No. 6. The original members of Union Lodge No. 6 have been called to the Celestial Lodge. Acting in their stead, a body of Past Masters petitioned the Grand Lodge in 2011 for the right to restore the Lodge to Labor as a Past Master's Lodge in the service of the Grand Lodge

WM Jean-Paul Dongmo opened his Lodge in the Georgetown Masonic Hall. If you have never been to this hall, it is one of the more interesting ones, and certainly worth a visit. The actual Lodge meeting was relatively short, and pretty much to just take care of business. The membership of Union #6 is made up entirely by Past Masters, many of whom are not from Washington. There were brethren from Texas, Oklahoma, New York and several other locations who had come to town for the meeting.

During the short meeting, WB Michael Greenwald and WB Ray Horn's petitions to affiliate with Union #6 were presented and accepted as were several others.

After the meeting, the brethren adjourned to a local Georgetown restaurant, where the most important part of the evening took place. A loosely done table lodge, where the real purpose was to have a great time and share some

to have a great time and share some wonderful fellowship.

After drinks were served, and while we were waiting for dinner to arrive, the guest speaker for the evening was given the floor. The speaker was WB T.S. Akers from Oklahoma and his topic was "Freemasonry Among the Five Tribes." The five tribes are the Indian tribes of Oklahoma.


When asked during some of the post-talk discussion, about what he preferred as an identity, Native American, Indigenous person, or American Indian,

WB Akers said "Indian." He even referred to the part of Oklahoma he was from, as Indian Country.

WB Akers gave an interesting history lesson and as he is the descendant of one of the major leaders of a tribe, we got to hear about some of the politics and decision making from a very personal perspective.

His talk was riveting. We learned that many of the Indian leaders from well before the Civil War came to Washington, DC to negotiate, and were Initiated, Passed and Raised as Freemasons. Many of them did it as a way to connect with the people they were "working" with. An interesting and unique way to lobby for your cause.

These leaders took Masonry back to Oklahoma. Free Masonry was exceptionally strong among Indians before the Civil War. There are Lodges today that can date their existence to these pre-Civil War

Lodges. We learned that the Indians sided with the Confederacy during the Civil War, and as WB Aker noted, that association "did not work out too well."

We learned that Masonry is still going strong in Oklahoma, and is seeing the same issues we see locally.

Dinner eventually arrived and was a wonderful meal as the discussion around the tables continued all through the evening.

The whole evening was truly a fascinating and unique experience.



suggestions were heard. Members of the Grand Lodge Education Committee took copious notes and

will use the submissions and recommendations given to further the basic tenets of our institution.

Don't Forget to RSVP

Brethren, we are using our *Bulletin*, emails, Grand View Notices, evites and our Smart Phone App to provide notices and updates about events. This can be helpful as a reminder, or way to electronically add the event to your calendar but it can also be confusing. Which one should I respond to? Do I need to respond to every kind of notice? Who is keeping track of this craziness? How do we ensure there is enough to eat?

According to our Smart Phone App's activity report, of the 122 Lodge Members for whom we have an email address, 57 members have now installed the App! This is roughly half the members with emails and about one-third of our total membership. We do mail our *Bulletin* to the remaining members.

While there is a lot of interaction of our members through the App, including making new posts, sharing photos, posting replies to these notices either by text or a "like," we know that RSVP's are still a problem for getting an accurate count of attendees.

The Event Chairman does receive a list of who sends an RSVP regardless of how it is sent, however responding to evites, which we use for our major events and/or responding to the calendar on our Smartphone App is the most efficient way to respond. Evites are sent by email and have a simple Yes, No, response. Every calendar notice in the App has the ability to post an RSVP.



This is an example of a calendar notice in the App for a Stated Communication. At the bottom of the meeting description, is a Yes / No RSVP button. Anyone can check who is coming and see the count. At the same time you respond, there is an option to "add it to your calendar." This option will automatically add the event to your own Smartphone calendar.

We know that getting guests to RSVP to a Lodge meeting is like getting your cat to cook dinner, rare but appreciated.
