This month, of course was our Master Masons Degree and The William D. Boker Thanksgiving Basket Program. Our degree conferral which included courtesy degrees for four other Lodges pressed the limits of how many degrees can be granted in one night. And our charity food program in cooperation with The Jewish Social Services Agency provided and delivered 120 baskets, pushed us to find a way to make it possible to assemble so many baskets. Both events drew on brethren from other Lodges and involved many of our own brethren, included many who do not regularly participate in monthly Lodge activities.

While there was a lot of concern in taking on four courtesy degrees because of the time and added stress, the degree team did an excellent job of providing a high-quality experience for both the new Masons and their own Lodge Brethren. We had help with conductors, fellowcrafts, ruffians and a Senior Steward from our courtesy Lodges. In hindsight, having the added degrees made the effort of learning the degree parts feel really worthwhile as we made a difference for our Brethren. I personally found the large ceremony put added emphasis on the content of the degree and heightened the sense of engagement by everyone. I want to thank everyone again who participated in the degree and particularly our Degree Director, Sheldon Rappeport, PM who always gets the most out of our cast by having multiple rehearsals at his home.

The other exceptional event is of course our Thanksgiving Basket Program. When one of JSSA's

partner volunteer organizations backed out of a commitment for adding 20 baskets just days before the event, Bro Jeff Greenwald



and his team were able to step up to fill the gap and allow JSSA to meet their commitment to those families. Really, I was very proud of our community engagement in our largest charity event of the year. I lost count of everyone who participated but we received support from Friendship Chapter No. 17, Order of the Eastern Star, District of Columbia, Washington Daylight Lodge No. 14, District of Columbia, and No. 198, Kensington - Bethesda Lodge. In The South

This is my last article as Junior Warden. As I have been elected to be Senior Warden for next year. This year has certainly been exciting as I look out at the Lodge from the South.

For the last few months, I have been working on the Worshipful Master's part for the Master Mason Degree we conferred on November 13th. I also learned the King Solomon part for the second half. I pretty much did nothing else, using just about every free minute I had during the day and evening to practice and try and memorize all the pieces. I am pretty sure my co-workers think I discovered religion, as I am sure they have seen me looking at the cipher all of my free time, which is a little black book could easily be mistaken for a Bible.

My commute both ways, to and from work is between 30 and 40 minutes. I discovered that if I started just as I made the turn from Georgia Avenue to the ICC, I would be finished just a few seconds before I had to go through the guard gate where I work. I normally make a cup of coffee just before I walk out of the house to drink on the way. I know exactly where on the trip, I can safely take that first sip. On many days in the last few weeks, I arrived at work, to realize I had a full cup of rather cold coffee, as I had not touched it at all. Being raised as a Master Mason is a very emotional experience for the Brother being raised. What really crept up on me without any real warning, just as we finished the first section and sitting in the East, was how emotional it is to make new Ma-

sons. I was relieved that I got through the whole part with only a few errors, and no major misstep. At the same time, I felt really excited that we had just raised a bunch of new Masons. With all the months of practice, I had never really stopped to think about what we were preparing to do. When that all sank in, as I was doing my last set of lines, it truly touched me.

Then we slipped elections in between the sections, and I was elected to be the Senior Warden for next year. It is a humbling experience as the Brethren have entrusted in me to be the second in command of the Lodge for the next year. We have an outstanding line for next year that is building on the exceptional leadership from the Masters of the last several years. A very hard act to follow, but all of us are dedicated to keep doing the same great things we have been doing.

After the elections, we started the second section of the degree where I got to do the King Solomon part. Once again the emotions really crept up on me by the end of the section. I was emotionally drained as I ran the slides for the lecture.

We did not finish and close the lodge until just before low 12. As has become our usual custom, several of us stopped on the way home to get something to eat. By the time I got home, it was 2 AM, but it took me over an hour to relax enough to finally fall asleep.

The next morning I slept in some and got to work quite a bit later than normal. I actually listened to the radio on the way to work and finished the cup of coffee too.

I will close with a quote from Brother George Washington:



- Strengthen the chain. Commit to improving the lives of every single officer and brother you meet.
- Live Masonry outside and inside the lodge 24/7 365.
- Accept an office. Take a role. Volunteer. Do your best!
- Roll up your sleeves. Help out; Stay humble. Give back.
- · Abandon all ego & foolish pride.
- Invite & involve candidates and brethren alike. Encourage them to take ownership of the lodge & their journey.
- · Avoid the "rumor mill." Avoid gossip.
- Build on the strengths of others. Encourage passion & new ideas.
- · All hands on deck! Many hands make light work.
- Never speak negatively about an officer or committee member.
- Build up the officers or committee members to the brethren.

- Pay your dues in advance. Donate often.
- Treat each other like family; with the highest regard, esteem, & respect.
- Plan, practice, prepare, persevere.
- Honor the past, preserve the traditions and culture of the lodge.
- Ask not what Freemasonry can do for you, but what you can do for Freemasonry.
- Follow the code: the great light, the obligations, charges, old charges, ancient landmarks, trial code, grand lodge code, by-laws, monitors, ceremonies, lectures, and several rituals of Freemasonry should be your constant guide; your modis operandi; & your standards of operating procedures. If you disagree, study the Code and take the proper steps within the proper venue to change them.
- Be positive. Never see a situation as impossible. Accept the challenge, overcome every obstacle, and produce positive results that benefit everyone.
- Embody due order and decorum. Follow proper protocol and etiquette. Avoid private conversations during meetings & degrees.
- Never harbor piques or quarrels against any brother. Go to him. Solve the issue. Make amends. Heal all wounds. Strengthen the bond.
