


# Love Stories of Our Members and Their Ladies




















# **Another Successful Virtual Meet-Up**

Warm cookies and cold milk are good for you



I heard Robert Fulghum give a graduation commencement speech where he emphasized that almost all Americans knew this basic nursery rhyme and could repeat it on the spot, but apparently, it is not taught in other parts of the world. Instead, each region of the world has their own rhymes or songs that could be considered comparable. In Europe, they are somewhat more "cultured" and everyone from Britain to Germany to Spain and Italy can easily recite at least the melody to Beethoven's Symphony #9, otherwise known as "Ode to Joy". What Robert Fulghum did next in his speech was have everyone in the audience sing the Itsy Bitsy Spider to the tune of "Ode to Joy." It actually worked!
