





The areas that are suggested are below, and it is the last one that really caught my attention.

- 1. Don't smoke—or if you already smoke, quit now.
- **2.** Watch your drinking. Alcohol abuse is strongly correlated with smoking in the study, but plenty of research shows that even by itself, it is one of the most powerful predictors of winding up sad-sick.
- **3.** Maintain a healthy body weight. Eat a diet with lots of fruits and vegetables and moderate serving sizes.
- **4.** Prioritize movement in your life by scheduling time for it every day and sticking to it. Arguably the single best, time-tested way to do this is by walking daily.
- **5.** Practice your coping mechanisms now. The earlier you can find healthy ways to deal with life's inevitable distresses, the more prepared you'll be if ill luck strikes in your 80s.
- **6.** Keep learning. More education leads to a more active mind in old age, and that means a longer, happier life.
- **7.** Do the work to cultivate stable, long-term relationships now. For most people, this includes a steady marriage, but other relationships with family, friends, and partners can fit in this category as well. The point is to find people with whom you can grow, whom you can count on, no matter what comes your way.

According to the study, the single most important trait of happy and well elders is healthy relationships.

The 7th habit struck me as one that applies to Masonry, our ties to the community and our Fellowship. This is the same message from the well-known book, Bowling Alone by Robert Putnam what was discussed during our "Idiot's and Dummy's" Lodge meeting a few years ago when there was a discussion of the changes to our culture that have impacted the membership of Masonry.

## **Light From the East**

There are many responsibilities and duties that fall on the Worshipful Master. Many of these are easy to do, and some that are time-consuming. One of them is, he is supposed to impart light to the brethren. That is not as easy as it sounds.

And then there is the one that I find the most emotionally challenging. That being Last Masonic Rites for a brother who has laid down his working tools. This last month has been particularly terrible as we have lost four brethren.

I have called Emergent Communications for two of them. Which is a rather odd practice. The Master opens the lodge with the bang of the gavel. None of our other ritual. Then the Masonic service is performed. And eventually, the Master closes the Lodge again with the rap of the gavel.

The emotions tied to participating in the Masonic service are for me mixed. It is a little terrifying standing in front of a group of very sad people. Many know little or nothing about Masonry, and there one is trying to give people a glimpse of what we as Masons stand for. At the same time, we are trying to pay our respects to our departed brother.

Extremely sad for me, is that many of the recent Brothers who have gone to the Celestial Lodge are not so much older, that I have never sat in Lodge with them, but rather that I have gotten to know them well over the last several years. Which puts me further into the sad group of people present.

The ritual we at Samuel Gompers-Benjamin Franklin use is a modified version of the official Grand Lodge of DC version. It has been modified to reflect that the actual funeral that follows is usually a Jewish Funeral and that we are often in a Synagogue.

And lastly, the Masonic Funeral seems like the mitzvah of putting dirt in the grave. It is one that the Brother can never repay.

This is not really the topic I was going to discuss this month. But I seem to have gotten sidetracked due to the number of our brethren that have passed away in the last few weeks.

I had been expecting to have a new Masonic first for me this month, which I was going to write about. But this unnamed event did not happen, so I am saving it hopefully for next month when maybe it does.

But, I had an unexpected Masonic first. I got to be the presenter/speaker at our February Lodge meeting. I hope everybody liked my very leftbrained approach to Geometry and the Number Three.

Working around when it is safe to meet in person, what precautions one needs to make, and figuring out who is comfortable or not comfortable with each is, in my opinion, impossible to resolve. And because there is no simple answer, extremely frustrating to me. I am just trying really hard to see the glass-half-full side of things, and am happy that we as Masons are slowly able to do some things. I know not everybody feels this way. And I fully support and respect each Brother's choice to make those decisions for themselves. I still have on my wish list for this year, a family event. My Plus one dinner. That was going to happen in February. I then moved it to March, but I am now thinking late April or maybe even May.

## The 47th Problem of Euclid, also called the 47th Proposition of Euclid, or the Pythagorean Theorem, is represented by what appear to be 3 squares.



To non-Freemasons, the 47th Problem of Euclid may be somewhat mysterious. Most wonder at the significance of this strange looking, 3-box symbol on a piece of Masonic jewelry.

During our February Stated Communication, WM Jerry Keilsohn delivered a lecture about Geometry and the Number III in Masonry. Central to his lecture was a discussion of the Problem of Euclid. The following was taken from the website: masonic-lodge-of-education.com

Most Masonic books, simply describe it as "A general love of the Arts and Sciences". However, to leave its explanation at that would be to omit a subject which is very important... not only of Pythagoras's Theory, but of the Masonic Square.

### What Are These 3 Black Boxes and Why Are They Important to Freemasons?

The math is the key to understanding this symbol's broader and universal meaning.

The Pythagorean Theorem, also known as the 47th Problem of Euclid or 3:4:5:

"In any right triangle, the sum of the squares of the two sides is equal to the square of the hypotenuse." (the hypotenuse of a right triangle...which is the longest "leg"...or the 5 side of the 3:4:5:).

The Right Triangle, below, shows the sides of 3, 4 and 5. The angle created between the 3 (side) and the 4 (side) is the Right angle of the square.

A little later, when we begin to build it, (with sticks and string), you will place your sticks at the 3 corners of this Right

triangle.

The square of 3 is 9.

The square of 4 is 16. The sum of 9 and 16 is 25. (25 represents the hypotenuse).

The square root of 25 is 5.

Therefore, the ratio is written: 3:4:5:

When we write down the square of the 1st four numbers (1, 4, 9 and 16), we see that by subtracting each square from the next one, we get 3, 5 and 7.

Ok, let's try it.

1, 4, 9, 16 4-1 =3 9-4 = 5

16-9 = 7

3:5:7: These are the steps in Masonry. They are the steps in the Winding Stair which leads to the Middle Chamber and they are the number of brethren which form the number of Master Masons necessary to open a lodge of Master Mason, Fellow Craft or Entered Apprentice. These are the sacred numbers.

The essence of the Pythagorean Theorem (also called the 47th Problem of Euclid) is about the importance of establishing an architecturally true (correct) foundation based on use of the square.

Why is this so important to speculative Masons who only have a symbolic square and not the actual square (the tool) of an operative Mason?

The 47th Problem of Euclid is the mathematical ratio (the knowledge) that allows a Master Mason to:

"Square his square when it gets out of square."

...I heard that! You're saying to yourself: "Why is that so important to ME in today's world...unless I'm a carpenter? Home Depot is only a few miles away."

### How to Create a Perfect Square using the 47th Problem of Euclid

Historically, a building's cornerstone was laid at the northeast corner of the building. Why in the northeast?

The ancient builders first laid out the north and south lines by observation of the stars and the sun...especially the North Star, (Polaris), which they believed at that time to be fixed in the sky.

Only after laying out a perfect North and South line could they use the square to establish perfect East and West lines for their foundations.

The 47th Problem of Euclid established those true East and West lines, so the rope stretcherscould ascertain a perfect 90 degree angle to the North/South line which they had established using the stars.

Now, take another look at the Masonic symbol for the 47th Problem of Euclid, above. You will see that the square on the top-left measures 3 units on each of its sides; the square on the top-right measures 4 units on each of its sides and the bottom square measures 5 units on each of its sides.


You can now see the right triangle (the negative white space in the middle) which is surrounded by the 3 "boxes".

From this day forward, when you see this graphic image denoting the 47th Problem of Euclid,...this Masonic symbol, it will not just look like 3 odd-shaped black boxes to you.


