



What is a Masonic Funeral? Do You Want to be Honored by Your Brethren?

Brethren, one of the very few public duties we are asked to participate in as Mason is a Masonic funeral service. While this type of funeral service may be unfamiliar to your family and friends, it can be an incredibly meaningful and solemn way to honor your life and legacy.

You may have participated in many or you may have never attended one. Consider making this decision for your family.

When we are notified that one of our Brethren has passed to the Celestial Lodge, the first thing that happens is the Secretary reaches out to the family to try and determine if they would like a Masonic Service. Of course, some families know that the Brother would want one, but many are not familiar with the ritual. During these services, Freemasons seek to provide comfort and solace to those mourning the death of their loved ones by honoring their memory in a dignified manner. Most typically, the Masonic Service is conducted after any Military Rites, but before the religious service. Recently, one of our Brethren who does not live in the Washington D.C. area added a note to his Grand View record. It read, "Please know that I would like to have a Masonic Funeral". I called the Brother to ask how he was doing and if he needed any help. But he was only making sure that if his son did not contact us, we would know.

There is a lot to the ritual of the service, which is performed publicly and may be the only time that the extended family learns something meaningful about Masonry.

In our ritual, we travel to go to a different job. Something fundamentally important if you were an operative mason. Especially once the building you were working on is completed.

As a speculative Mason, I view traveling as going to visit other Lodges. What is in it for me, I am occasionally asked? I am not sure I have an answer for that, but I can share some of my experiences.

We meet one night a month. That means I see many of our brethren only once a month. Going to a Lodge meeting is very different for me than going to work. One, I go, because I want to, and one because I need to. One, I am happy to see the people I will be meeting with. The other may be some of them, but definitely not all of them. One, the people are friendly and I always get a handshake, and often a hug when I arrive. None of that happens at work. One, there is almost always an opportunity to sit and have a meal with people that come from a totally different place. This is a good thing. I meet brethren I would have never met before, and get to hear and share life's, successes, trials, and tribulations with them. All in an environment where everybody in the room has trust and respect for all of the other brethren in the room. Again, very different from work.

Now time for a short story. About a year ago, I received an email that was forwarded from one of our brethren that had been forwarded to another brother. East Gate Lodge #34 was trying to pull enough cast members together to do a first-degree. I volunteered to help.

One of the wonderful things we do at SG-BF #45, is once you enter the officer's line, and by the time you have sat in every chair, including the Master's, you should have learned every part in every degree, plus all of the officer parts when opening and closing on all of the three degrees.

I was asked to be the Senior Steward for the degree. That means I would become a brother's, first contact with our rituals. This is something the candidate is always going to remember, as first impressions are important. I think more so in the first degree than in either of the other two.

We pulled it all together and made a new Mason that night. A couple of months later, I had the privilege of being the same brother's conductor for the second degree. He had to wait a little bit, but I got to be his conductor when he was raised.

In the process, I got to know the brethren of East Gate Lodge #34. They are very different, in many ways from our #45 brethren. When I attend their Lodge meetings, it is a wonderful experience. They truly understand and practice true fraternal brotherhood. I always feel welcome. Many of the brothers speak French. I do not, but somebody will always translate the joke for me so that I do not feel left out. And the food, usually with an African flair, is delicious, and often with quite a bit of wonderful spice.

In the last year, I have traveled to many other lodges. Often to help out with a degree. Knowing all the parts often ends up with me sitting in a chair for the opening and closing. On several occasions, if I had not attended, they might not have been able to open the Lodge. In the last year or so, I have managed to sit in every chair, except the Master's, Treasurer, and Chaplain.

Most of our DC lodges follow the same opening and closing ritual. Several lodges have additional customs that go with them. For example, one lodge lights a candle on the altar as a memorial to those brethren who have ascended to the celestial lodge. It is always interesting to see how many and which books of Sacred law are on the altar. At another Lodge, all of the officers, wear Morning coats instead of the traditional tux. And always interesting, is what hat the Master wears. One of my favorites, there is a lodge that uses a dollar bill as a bookmark in the bible.

Another item I find interesting is the actual Lodge halls. I have learned to appreciate all of the various architecture used for actual Lodge halls. We have many in DC alone. From the huge one at the House of the Temple to the really tiny one in the Grand Lodge building. At one, 50 people will look like nobody showed up, while at the other, a dozen is very cozy. Attending a meeting at either is a different experience. I would be remiss if I did not mention the ornate one. That is Naval Lodge with its wonderful history and unique Egyptian motif.

Maybe the answer to why I like to travel, is that it enriches my life.

FROM THE ARCHIVES: A LOOK AT OUR LODGE'S PAST

This month's "From the Archives" is on a significantly heavier topic than past editions of this column. Although our lodge has members of color-and has had officers and masters of color in the past-for a very long time, this lodge was overwhelmingly white. That by itself isn't surprising, given the fact that African-Americans were banned from joining "mainstream" lodges for most of the 19th and 20th centuries in the United States. It wasn't until the Grand Lodge of

Connecticut officially recognized its Prince Hall Grand Lodge counterpart in 1989 that the process of racial reconciliation within the lodge hall even began.

Today, we still fall short of the ideal of brotherly love and esteem, with only 31 Prince Hall Grand Lodges being recognized in the United States by the Grand Lodge of DC. Our Grand Lodge's policy of recognition of these 31 is predicated by the "mainstream" grand lodge in each jurisdiction first. This policy has never particularly sat well with me. If the other 20 Most Worshipful Prince Hall Grand Lodges in the United States have legitimate Masonic issues, I might be able to understand it, but to the best of my knowledge, the only reason the Grand Lodge of DC has refused to recognize these Grand Lodges is that the white Grand Lodges in their states haven't recognized them. Is this a sufficient reason?

How do we, as Masons in 2023, reconcile with our overtly racist past and heal the wounds our Grand Lodge structure continues to perpetuate? I think our Grand Lodge has done a fantastic job of incorporating non-white members into its ranks, but is this the case across the country? The fact that we still have 20 Grand Lodges that do not recognize their Prince Hall counterparts tells us that, no, this is not a common enough practice yet. Our Grand Lodge has the ability to buck tradition and recognize the remaining 20 Prince Hall Grand Lodges unilaterally, though such a move would undoubtedly create a kerfuffle amongst the rest of "mainstream" Freemasonry in the United States. But that's politics that go beyond what I can do with my little column taking a look at our lodge's history.

I would like to take a moment and return to our lodge to finish this column; specifically, I want to return to April 22, 1947. On this night, after the regular lodge meeting (back when we still met on the 2nd and 4th Tuesdays of the month), our lodge hosted an "Amateur Nite." Most of the acts from that evening are lost to history-at least the history that our lodge currently has access to. However, five acts are immortalized with photographs in the lodge's May 1947 Bulletin, including the one that prompted me to write this column: two brethren put on a sketch in blackface in the minstrel fashion in the style of "mammies." The caption reads the two brethren put on "a clever sketch" for this talent show. For those unaware, "mammy" characters were typically dim-witted, large-bosomed, and full of love for the white children they were hired (or enslaved) to care for. Perhaps the best-known mammy in the American zeitgeist is the character from 1938's Gone with the Wind, appropriately named Mammy, though the now-defunct Aunt Jemima pancake mascot also fits the stereotype. For two white men to dress up as mammies in 1947 would not have caused anyone to bat an eye. In 2023, such an act would be unimaginable-to the point where I am not even going to include the photograph in this bulletin to accompany the article. I would hope that in 2023, this lodge would decry such a performance from our now-distant past. But reconciliation requires recognition: we can't make progress as an organization or a society without first acknowledging the structural racism in our own past. It is my hope that we will one day be able to meet on the level with all regular Freemasons around the United States, regardless of the color of their skin or the history of their Grand Lodge's charter.
