SOUP JOUMOU: A TASTE OF HAITIAN TRADITION

A beloved Haitian dish, Soup Joumou is a rich and flavorful pumpkin soup made with calabaza squash, beef, vegetables, pasta, and dumplings, traditionally enjoyed on New Year's Day as a symbol of resilience and togetherness. Now, you can bring this cherished tradition into your own home—try the recipe below and experience the warmth, history, and community that every bowl of Soup Joumou brings!

INGREDIENTS YIELD: 6 TO 10 SERVINGS

For the Epis Seasoning:

1 large green bell pepper, stemmed and chopped 1 medium red bell pepper, stemmed and chopped

½white onion, chopped ¼cup white vinegar

¼cup extra-virgin olive oil

1 celery stalk, chopped 2 scallions, trimmed and chopped

1 fresh parsley sprig 5garlic cloves, peeled

1 chicken bouillon cube

½ teaspoon fresh or dried thyme leaves

1½ teaspoons kosher salt

For the Dumplings:

1¼ cups all-purpose flour

1 teaspoon extra-virgin olive oil

¼ teaspoon kosher salt

¼ teaspoon freshly ground black pepper

For the Soup:

1 pound boneless beef chuck, cut into 1/2-inch pieces

½ cup fresh lime juice (from about 3 limes)

5 tablespoons epis seasoning

2 pounds calabaza squash, peeled and roughly chopped

1 tablespoon extra-virgin olive oil

2 tablespoons tomato paste

1 chicken bouillon cube

5 medium potatoes, peeled and cut into ¾-inch cubes

½ small head green cabbage, shredded (about 3 cups)

4 medium carrots, peeled and sliced

1 large white onion, finely chopped

2 celery stalks, cut into ½-inch pieces

2 scallions, trimmed and sliced

3 fresh parsley sprigs

1 Scotch Bonnet pepper

14 teaspoon fresh or dried thyme leaves

2 teaspoons kosher salt

¼ teaspoon freshly ground black pepper

½ cup vermicelli

Step 1: Prepare the epis seasoning: Combine all of the ingredients in a blender and purée. Use epis or transfer to a large jar and refrigerate for up to 6 weeks. (Similar to sofrito, epis is versatile and adds extra kick and flavor. It can be used to marinate beef, fish or chicken, or stirred into rice or soup.)

Step 2: Prepare the soup: Rinse the beef with lukewarm water, then transfer the meat to a large bowl. Add the lime juice and rub it into the meat until coated. Add 5 tablespoons epis seasoning and toss to coat. Cover and refrigerate to marinate, ideally overnight or for at least 30 minutes.

Step 3: When ready to cook, purée the calabaza squash with 1 cup water in a blender; set aside.

Step 4: In a large pot, heat the oil over medium. Add the meat with its marinade, the tomato paste and bouillon cube, crushing it between your fingertips. Cook the meat, stirring occasionally, until the mixture caramelizes and darkens, about 10 minutes. Transfer the meat to a bowl to set aside.

Step 5: Add 6 cups water to the pot and bring to a boil over high heat. Stir in the squash purée, potatoes, cabbage, carrots, onion, celery, scallions, parsley, Scotch Bonnet pepper, thyme, salt and pepper, and bring to a boil again. Stir in the meat with its juices.

Step 6: Once the mixture comes to a boil, cover the pot, reduce the heat to simmer over low, and cook for 30 minutes, stirring occasionally.

Step 7: Remove and discard the Scotch bonnet pepper. (Do not let it burst. If it does, your soup will be very spicy!) Stir in the vermicelli. Cook, stirring occasionally, for another 10 minutes.

Step 8: Meanwhile, prepare the dumplings: Combine the flour, oil, salt, pepper and ½ cup water in a medium bowl and stir to combine. (You can knead slightly, if needed, to get the dough to come together.) Take about 1 tablespoon of dough and roll it between your palms into an elongated shape the width of your palm, about 4 inches long. Add the dumpling to the soup and continue to make dumplings with the remaining dough, dropping them into the soup as they are rolled. Cook over low heat, stirring occasionally, until dumplings are softened and cooked through but still firm, 15 to 20 minutes.

Step 9: If the soup is too thick for your taste, stir in water, about 1 cup or as desired. Remove pot from heat and serve warm.


A CARD OF FAITH: THE ROLE OF MEMBERSHIP CARDS IN HAITIAN CHURCHES

In Haiti, faith is more than just a personal belief—it is a way of life woven into the fabric of communities. For many churches, baptism marks not only a spiritual rebirth but also an official step into the church family. To recognize this commitment, newly baptized members receive a baptism membership card, a small but powerful symbol of belonging.

This card serves as an official record of one's baptism and membership in the congregation. It grants the individual certain privileges within the church, including the ability to partake in Holy Communion and to be married in the church. In many cases, this card also allows members to visit other churches and receive communion there as well. It is a sign of unity among believers and a way to identify those who have dedicated their lives to Christ.

At Path to Salvation Church, receiving a baptism card is a deeply meaningful moment. It is not just about membership—it is about committing to a life of faith and service. Pastor Wesley and the church leadership take great care in preparing new believers for baptism, ensuring they understand the significance of their decision. For these members, the card is a constant reminder of their faith journey and the church family that surrounds and supports them.

Instead, they set aside their monthly donations, believing that God would provide the right moment. That moment came when Pastor Wesley needed a way to distribute food in his community. Because of Relevant Church's faithfulness, those funds were available at exactly the right time.

Supporting Path to Salvation has become more than a mission project—it is a calling that the entire church embraces. Their missions team faithfully prays for Pastor Wesley and his staff, standing in the gap when challenges arise. They long for the day when they can travel to Haiti, to worship together, to serve side by side, and to see firsthand the impact their support has made. Do you ever think of Jesus as a teacher?

Other words may come to your mind more —Lord, Savior, Master, and Redeemer. But here's an amazing fact: of the 90 times Jesus was addressed directly in the gospels, **60 times** he was called Teacher. This was the word the multitudes used. This was how the disciples referred to him. Jesus himself used the term when he said, "You call me Teacher and Lord, and rightly so, for that is what I am" (John 13:13). When Nicodemus came to Jesus by night, he said, "We know that you are a teacher who has come from God" (John 3:2).

History has echoed the truth of that verdict. Theologian and one of the greatest preachers of the 20th century, James Stuart states, "The teaching of Jesus has had a power and an effect with which the influence of no other teacher can even for a moment be compared."

When Jesus had finished giving the Sermon on the Mount, Matthew tells us the crowds were so amazed at his teaching because "he taught as one having authority, not as the teachers of the law" (Matthew 7:29). The rabbis quoted each other, but Jesus spoke the true and authoritative words of God.

He never entered a classroom as we know a classroom. He never had a degree as we understand an educational degree, yet all the world was his classroom. No degreed teacher did anything greater than what Jesus Christ did. He was truly and absolutely the Master Teacher and the greatest teacher of all time

The most beautiful and amazing thing, is over 2,000 years have passed and Jesus is still teaching us today. This is our purpose, to follow Him, to learn from Him, to glorify Him and last but not least, to tell the entire world about him! Amen?
