Several things have become quite obvious over the last ten months of social distancing. One is worship is possible without beautiful buildings, processionals, acolytes, crucifers, ushers, greeters, choirs, and detailed bulletins. While these things certainly add to the joy of worship, at least according to Martin Luther, the essential moments of public worship are reading and hearing God's holy word (including the presence and proclamation of Christ in the sacraments), and responding through prayer and praise.

This leads me to the second thing we have discovered - we can worship and be about the work of the church without being physically together — at least for a time - ....continued on Page 2

and we have done that through on-line worship services, phone calls checking in with the homebound, and supporting ministries like CCM, Opportunity House, Salvation Army, Our Father's House, the Blessing Box ministry we stocked this past month...and the list goes on.

But what has become most obvious during this time apart is how inter-connected our lives are as a country, and even more so as a church. And it's that last part I want to focus on, for the longer we are physically separated from one another, and the more we allow political, economic, and social issues to tear us apart, the more likely we are to forget that we are part of something greater than ourselves (the vine), begin to see the gospel as an individual possession rather than a gift to be shared, and dry up.

In the waters of holy baptism we are claimed as precious children of God, joined together as sisters and brothers to the one vine (Christ) and called to bear much fruit. And as Christ's body the church we are able to accomplish (bear) far more fruit together than any one of us can accomplish alone.

The same is true in our relationship with the churches that make up our denomination — the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America. Sometimes we can get so caught up in our ministry together as a congregation, and listen to all of the voices claiming that denominations are dying, that we forget we are one of over 9,100 congregations in the United States, and one of nearly 200 Lutheran congregations in North Carolina that share a living, daring confidence in God's grace - a grace that frees us to participate in God's work in the world — and that together we can accomplish so much more than is capable alone.

It is my hope and prayer that we are able to gather together again soon and know the joy of Christian fellowship, but until then we will continue to provide opportunities to worship and study the scriptures on-line, celebrate Holy Communion in drive-in worship services, and identify community needs we can safety support through our time, talents, and resources.

We will also in the months to come, be more intentional in seeking to renew and strengthen our relationship with the ELCA, and in particular, the NC Synod, by considering what a synod is, recalling our rich history as part of the NC Synod and the larger church, lifting up the ministries and resources we share as part of the synod and larger church, and reviewing how benevolence dollars are spent.

As part of this process, it will also be important to share both our joys and concerns of being connected with the ELCA and NC Synod, celebrating what needs to be celebrated and grieving what needs to be grieved, so that we may move forward together, abiding in the love, grace, and mercy of the one vine, for the sake of the gospel.

## SUNDAY, FEBRUARY 7 5TH SUNDAY AFTER EPIPHANY



In Isaiah the one God who sits above the earth and numbers the stars also strengthens the powerless. So in Jesus' healing work we see the hand of the creator God, lifting up the sick woman to health and

service (diakonia). Like Simon's mother-in-law, we are lifted up and healed to serve. Following Jesus, we strengthen the powerless; like Jesus, we seek to renew our own strength in quiet times of prayer.

## SUNDAY, FEBRUARY 14 TRANSIFGURATION



The Sundays after Epiphany began with Jesus' baptism and end with three disciples' vision of his transfiguration. In Mark's story of Jesus' baptism, apparently only Jesus sees the Spirit

descending and hears the words from heaven. But now Jesus' three closest friends hear the same words naming him God's Beloved. As believers, Paul writes, we are enabled to see the God-light in Jesus' face, because the same God who created light in the first place has shone in our hearts to give us that vision. The light of God's glory in Jesus has enlightened us through baptism and shines in us also for others to see.

### SUNDAY, FEBRUARY 21 1ST SUNDAY IN LENT



On Ash Wednesday the church began its journey toward baptismal immersion in the death and resurrection of Christ. This year, the Sundays in Lent lead us to focus on five covenants God

makes in the Hebrew Scriptures and to use them as lenses through which to view baptism. First Peter connects the way God saved Noah's family in the flood with the way God saves us through the water of baptism. The baptismal covenant is made with us individually, but the new life we are given in baptism is for the sake of the whole world.

## SUNDAY, FEBRUARY 28 2ND SUNDAY IN LENT



The second covenant in this year's Lenten readings is the one made with Abraham and Sarah: God's promise to make them the ancestors of many, with whom God will remain in everlasting covenant. Paul

says this promise comes to all who share Abraham's faith in the God who brings life into being where there was no life. We receive this baptismal promise of resurrection life in faith. Sarah and Abraham receive new names as a sign of the covenant, and we too get new identities in baptism, as we put on Christ.
