### God is Faithful

The Lord is faithful in all his works, and gracious in all his deeds. The Lord upholds all who are falling, and raises up all who are bowed down. (Psalm 145:13b-14)

One of the buzzwords we hear a lot these days is *transparency* particularly as it pertains to openness and communication with others about what has been done, or is being done, or will be done, and therefore, keeping them in the loop and engaged.

And so, it is in the hope of being as transparent as possible and keeping you in the loop that I confess to those of you wondering when we will be able to re-gather for worship in the sanctuary...I don't know. The North Carolina Synod has recommended we not consider re-gathering until we are in the third stage of the governor's plan, and consideration of beginning stage three has been postponed to July 17<sup>th</sup> and may very well be postponed again if there is a spike in the statistics after the Fourth of July weekend. All that being said, it will probably be sometime in August (at the earliest) before we consider gathering in-person with specific protocols in place for physical distancing, masks, entering and exiting the worship space, etc... These protocols are currently being developed by our Health and Safety Committee.

If you are wondering when we can expect our life together return to normal (pre-Covid 19)...I don't know. All children and youth gatherings have been cancelled until school has resumed (and we don't know what that will look like yet); choirs and singing are particularly dangerous in the potential spread of the virus so our music will be limited; the same is true for fellowship meals, and greeting one another before and after church. I imagine that even after there is a vaccine, it will be a long while before many folks feel safe enough to gather again in person. So while I am not particularly fond of the phrase, we are transitioning into a *new normal* where masks, safe distancing, meetings using social media, and on-line and drive-in worship will certainly play an important part in our life together.

You may be wondering, what do you know pastor? Well, I know folks are lonely and miss gathering with others. I know people are grieving graduations and weddings and all sorts of things that didn't go as planned. And I know many people are frightened and weary from the uncertainty involving so much of day-to-day life.

And there is something else I know to be true that brings all of these things, even things we don't know into perspective. It not only gives us hope, but reminds us we have so much to be thankful for...and that is the reality the psalmist articulates, that the Lord is faithful and with us, and gracious in all his deeds. We are surrounded by signs of that truth.

I have witnessed God's faithfulness in our council as they call and check on you, and in various committees and individuals as they seek ways to walk with folks in crisis in the community, work to maintain our facilities, and develop safe gathering protocols. I've seen it in Mike Holt and the faces of our children and their parents as they gather on-line on Thursday nights; and in Rob and Jeremy and Golda Jay, and Keith and all those who help in the preparation of weekly worship and post to social media and keep you in the loop. I've seen it in the generosity of those who continue to financially contribute to our ministry together. I've seen it in your calls and notes and prayers of encouragement to me and one another.

Perhaps you have witnessed God's faithfulness as well. If so then you know as I know that whether we are talking old normal, or new normal, or uncertainties over viruses...God has this, God has us, and is with us, and is faithful... which is why I can say, and we can say, thanks be to God!
