Now Thank We All Our God Now thank we all our God With heart and hands and voices Who wondrous things hath done In whom His world rejoices Who from our mother's arm Hath blessed us on our way With countless gifts of love And still is ours today

FROM THE PASTOR

O give thanks to the Lord for he is good; for his steadfast love endures forever. (Psalm 107:1)

It is that time of year when our hearts and minds turn toward family gatherings, delicious foods, parades, holidays shopping and as we will celebrate on November 26, giving thanks for the blessings of a bountiful life. Except, 2020 has been anything but bountiful as many of the things we are often most thankful for

have been compromised or taken from us because of the pandemic and social distancing, not to mention the election taking place on November 3 and the potential consequences of the results. In a time where the one thing we seem to have an abundance of is fear and anxiety, how can we give thanks?

That is where Martin Rinkart, a Lutheran pastor and the author of the hymn "Now Thank we all Our God," is helpful. The hymn is thought to have been written during the Thirty Years War in Central Europe, where between 4.5 and 8 million people died, mostly from disease and starvation. Life was anything but bountiful. In addition to having trouble providing food and shelter for his family, at the heart of the plague in 1637 Rinkart was the last remaining minister in his village and did and many as 40-50 funerals a day. So how could he give thanks?

Rinkart's song of thanksgiving begins by recalling God's countless gifts of love:

Now thank we all our God with hearts and hands and voices, who wondrous things has done, in whom our world rejoices; who, from our mother's arms, has blest us on our way with countless gifts of love, and still is ours today.

It is Rinkart's focus and gratitude in God's past faithfulness that enables him in the second verse to pray for God's continued care:

Oh may this bounteous God through all our live be near us, with ever joyful hearts and blessed peace to cheer us, and keep us in his grace, and guide us when perplexed, and free us from all harm in this world and the next.

This in turn leads Rinkart to give praise and thanks for God's eternal nature and care: All praise and thanks to God the Father now be given, the Son and him who reigns with them in highest heaven, the one eternal God, whom earth and heaven adore; for thus it was, is now, and shall be evermore.

Ultimately, Rinkart's ability to give thanks and praise had little to do with his current circumstances and everything to do with the one who was present in the midst of his circumstances, the one whose countless gifts of love had always and would always sustain him and the world...and the same is true for us.

I invite you this month, to focus less on what we don't have and what might or might not happen, and more on what we do have, and the one whose goodness and mercy and countless gifts of steadfast love has always and will always sustain us!

Procedures for the Resuming of In-door Worship Saint James Lutheran Church — Approved by Council – October 13, 2020

Social distancing will be practiced and masks are to be worn at all times

ARRIVAL

- 1. The only entrance to the church will be through doors coming into the narthex (front) entrance. These doors and the doors to the sanctuary will be left open for ventilation.
- 2. Greeters/ushers will stand outside the entrance doors to take temperatures. They will maintain social distance while greeting worshipers. Individuals with a temperature of 100 or higher will not be permitted to enter.
- 3. Signage will be placed along the walkways to the doors emphasizing social distancing, the expectations for the wearing of masks, and other relevant information.
- 4. Tape will be used as markers on the walkways to maintain appropriate distance between groups if they must wait to be seated.
- 5. Two greeters (ushers) will check in and/or list the name[s] of the church member/group attending. All worshippers will check in and provide a contact number for tracing purposes if necessary.
- 6. Ushers will be at the doors entering the sanctuary to seat individual worshipers or family groups.

SEATING

- For social distancing purposes and to reduce the likelihood of overcrowding, the congregation will be seated according to a council approved seating schematic developed by the Health and Safety Committee.
- 2. Seating will occur in every other row of seats in the sanctuary. Signs will be placed in rows where seating is not allowed. ["PLEASE LEAVE THIS ROW VACANT"]
- 3. The balcony will not be used.
- 4. If two services are held, the rows of seats used and not used in the first service will be reversed and the signage will be moved from the rows not used in the first service to the rows that were used in first service. Therefore, no one will be sitting in the same seats used in the first service.

DURING WORSHIP

- 1. No nursery will be provided at this time.
- 2. Offering will be received in the plates in the narthex.
- 3. Bulletins will be placed in the pews prior to the service and available digitally for those who use a tablet or phone.
- 4. There will be no congregational singing.

DISMISSAL AFTER SERVICE

- 1. Remind the congregation before the end of service of procedures to follow after dismissal.
- 2. Ushers will dismiss the congregation by rows and sections to reduce the crowding that currently occurs at the entrance to the sanctuary.
- 3. Worshipers will exit through the narthex and not stop or gather in the sanctuary, the entrance to the sanctuary, or on the ramp.
- 4. Pastor Tony will move to the Portico entrance to talk with members that wish to drive by and speak with him.

AFTER THE SERVICE OR BETWEEN SERVICES [Volunteers / Outside Cleaning Service]

- 1. Wipe down the back and sides of chairs and pews.
- 2. Remove articles or trash that is left 3. Check and clean restrooms (only the second floor bathrooms will be accessible)

SUNDAY, NOVEMBER 1 ALL SAINTS DAY

All Saints celebrates the baptized people of God, living and dead, who are the body of Christ. As November heralds the dying of the landscape in many northern regions, the

readings and liturgy call us to remember all who have died in Christ and whose baptism is complete. At the Lord's table we gather with the faithful of every time and place, trusting that the promises of God will be fulfilled and that all tears will be wiped away in the new Jerusalem.

Gospel: Matthew 5:1-12



SUNDAY, NOVEMBER 8 23rd Sunday After Pentecost

Today the prophet Amos calls for justice to roll down like waters. Paul urges us to encourage one

another with the promised coming of the Lord. Jesus tells the parable of the wise and foolish bridesmaids. Surrounded by the faithful of every time and place, we celebrate Christ's coming in our midst in the word of life and the feast of victory—the marriage feast of the lamb.

Gospel: Matthew 25:1-13



SUNDAY, NOVEMBER 15 24TH SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST

Our readings during November speak of the end times. Zephaniah

proclaims that the coming day of the LORD will be filled with wrath and distress. Paul says it will come like a thief in the night and urges us to be awake and sober. Jesus tells the parable of the talents, calling us to use our gifts, while we still have time, for the greater and common good. In a world filled with violence and despair, we gather around signs

of hope—word, water, bread, and wine—eager to welcome the good news of Christ's coming among us.

Gospel: Matthew 25:14-30



SUNDAY, NOVEMBER 22 CHRIST THE KING SUNDAY

On this final Sunday of the church year our gospel is Jesus' great story of judgment. In the end, the faithful are those who served

Christ by ministering to those who are poor, hungry, naked, sick, or estranged. In the first reading God is the shepherd who seeks the lost, weak, and injured and feeds them with justice. We gather this day to celebrate the reign of Christ and his victory over death, yet we await the consummation of all things yet to come. Acknowledging Christ as our merciful ruler, we go forth that his reign may be known in our loving words and deeds.

Gospel: Matthew 25:31-46



SUNDAY, NOVEMBER 29 1ST SUNDAY OF ADVENT

Stir up your power, and come! The psalmist's plea in Psalm 80:2 has become familiar to us in the Advent prayers. Isaiah wants God

to rip the heavens open. Both cry out for an apparently distant, angry God to show up, to save, to restore. When we hear Jesus describing the coming of the Son of Man with stars falling from heaven, it can sound dire and horrible, not like anything we would ever hope for. But when we really look at the suffering of people God loves, we can share the hope that God would tear open the heavens and come.
