



BALTIMORE — Staff from Lutheran World Relief and IMA World Health, both of the Corus International family, are assessing damage from the Aug. 14 Haiti earthquake, urgent needs and how to most efficiently respond.

Lutheran World Relief and IMA World Health have committed an initial \$100,000 to the emergency response, which will likely focus on providing support for essential health services, as most of Corus' programs in Haiti are focused on health. As critical needs are being determined, the organizations are exploring the possibility of a joint response with other INGOs; coordination with international organizations and the government central to is response planning.

"There are huge medical needs, people who are wounded and in care," of need said Glen Bouchard, IMA World Health country director in Haiti. "Already, the food situation was tenuous. Markets and the infrastructure have been badly damaged. Even getting clean water is а challenge."

The magnitude of the disaster is still emerging, Bouchard said.

"The full impact on many of the earthquake-affected areas is yet to be determined as they remain inaccessible. Most of the urgent as needs will multiply they visible become more and tangible," he said. "Unfortunately, this disaster is not getting due attention and international media has focused on concurrent major humanitarian crises in other parts





of the world. We are far from getting the commitments of resources that the 2010 earthquake received, though the needs are dire."

YOUTH SERVANT DAYS





Just as we planned and hoped for, A Big Servant Day came our way and we accepted the challenge.

What is a Servant Day? On our way back from a Mission Trip, the Youth shared in a conversation about another successful mission trip where we accomplished our goal. But, that wasn't the end of the conversation. We questioned ourselves as to how can we take what we have learned over many years of participating in the mission trips and applying what we have learned at home? How can we create a mission trip at home and help even more that might need a helping hand? So, we started our plan by contacted those that are in the field, Social Workers, who are seeing the needs of others firsthand. Once they see the need, they will contact us and then we will make a visit to see how we might be able to share our talents. We also have partnered with McGill Baptist Church Youth Ministry in helping make this happen. Just as planned, we received the call for one of the Social Workers about a single mom who has really tried to make a better home for her two girls. She has worked really hard, saved and with the help of family, was able to put vinyl siding on her home and new windows as well but, she needed a little help with her deck, and so we served. We took on the major task of taking down and replacing a deck with a roof. Our adventure started on a Thursday with a total of 9 people jumping in to make a difference, and so we started by tearing off the roof, then the deck. We worked that day until 5:00.



Friday came with 3 people showing up to serve and we called for the reinforcement of a friend and for an hour and a half, we were a mighty group of four. We finished taking down the deck, put up a anchor board on the home and started digging holes for the posts. 5:00 came, all but one of the first shift went home, and two powerful friends made up second shift. We finished the framing for the deck and closed down around 8:00 that evening.

Saturday came and with it came a powerful force from the McGill Baptist Youth Ministry and the pace picked up. Framing on the new roof went up, railings and pickets, steps and rails. We worked until 5:00 and took Sunday off.







Monday and Tuesday two gentlemen came and then a third to assist with the loose ends, railings going down the steps, capes were placed on the railings and new tin went up on the roof. We were done by 1:00 on Tuesday.







Our adventure created a new ministry that involved a lot of people in order to make this happen. It started with a Social Worker and it quickly grew to be intergenerational, while including three churches and two denominations. Jesus said to "Love Your Neighbor", and He also said, to "Go". And so we went to show the Love of Christ. What a combination of success. You all shared your time and your talents so that a single mom with two girls could enjoy the benefits of a new deck with a roof. Congratulations! We did a very good thing.
